PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

It gives me great pleasure to present to you my first Presidential Report. No one appreciates more than I what large shoes (both literally and figuratively) I am attempting to fill since the Past-President, Geoff Gelding's departure from Canberra. I believe it to be the end of an era. During his five years as President, Geoff saw Wests win numerous premierships, the Club Championship, Twilight Competitions, attain direct affiliation with Western District Rugby Union Club Inc. and provide, in the season just completed, 22 teams in the Saturday morning junior competition - all this whilst retaining reasonably harmonious relationships within the Club. Quite a record!

The Management Committee maintained its usual high standards of performance during the year. It is a tribute to the depth of administrative talent available that the loss of stalwarts Alan Grigg and Tony Irvine during the season resulted in little disruption to Club management. My thanks to their replacements, Dave Matthews and Gary Beauchamp.

In particular, I must also thank Peter Murray for the tremendous amount of work he has done as Honorary Secretary over the past four years. Peter is not standing as Secretary next year so, with all that free time at his disposal, maybe we will see him on the paddock.

My special thanks to the "Club Sticker of the Year", Russell Rogers, for the many, varied and often onerous tasks he performed last year and to our Treasurer Extra-ordinaire, Gerry Garrity, for his guidance and financial expertise. How they find the time is amazing!

To the rest of the Management Committee, thank you for a job well done. I hope you will all be seeking re-election for the 1981/82 season.

At this stage of the report, I would like to look to the future and put forward what I consider to be practical suggestions for the betterment of the Club.

i. Currently we are not a "Club" in the usual sense of the word, but more like a gathering of four separate teams. First-graders do not talk to Third-graders, Fourth-graders do not know the names of the Second-graders, etc., and I believe this is reflected in the numbers who attend the social functions. I know this is not a problem unique to Wests, but I ask each player to give it some thought so a solution can be found. Maybe, for example, a double-wicket competition at the beginning of the season with a First-grade player and a Fourth-grade player combining against a player from each of our Second and Third grade sides may help.

ii. As you will read in the Management Committee report, we have received a grant from the licenced Club to provide a third synthetic practice wicket at Aranda. Obviously this is not a "one-way affair", so I would ask all eligible players to join the Club Inc. in order to strengthen the bond between us. Incidentally, grants to affiliated clubs are based on membership numbers secured by each club.

iii. In order to strengthen our social base, amongst other things, I firmly believe Wests should be represented by four grade sides and at least one team in the City and Suburban Association, preferably in the one-day competition. This would allow those players amongst us who, through some commitment or other, cannot see their way clear to saddle up every weekend. If you know someone who falls into this category (or even if he does not), bring him along when training begins. With three practice wickets, we have the facilities, not to mention the cheapest subs in town - A.N.U. excepted.

Before I close, I would be remiss if I did not mention that old bogy - finance. Cricket is an expensive sport and with the trend towards self-sufficiency of clubs, the only way to stay on top of spiralling costs is for more players to work for the Club.

My sincere thanks to those who worked so hard for the Club last year. I wish the incoming Committee similar success.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The past season was reasonably successful with the second successive Twilight Competition victory being the highlight. The Club did not maintain its own high playing standards and finished in its lowest position on the Club Championship since 1975/76. The firsts and seconds each finished in fourth place and qualified for the semi-finals, but did not progress further.

The Club experienced an even greater than usual influx of new members - a majority of which were in the younger age groups. While this was pleasing for the future, it meant that there was less interest by members generally in the traditional social activities of the Club. As a result, these activities were less successful than the previous season. There is a need to determine each season what type of social activities if any, should be provided for club members as a whole.

The social highlight of the year was undoubtedly the annual presentation night in April. It was a fitting place for Gerry Garrity to announce and speak to the nomination of Geoff Gelding as our first life member. The nomination will be formally put at the Annual General Meeting for 1981/82. The nomination was unanimously endorsed by the Management Committee prior to the announcement.

It was with much regret in November that the Club accepted the resignation of Geoff Gelding as President. After a presidential term exceeding five years of hard work and dedication to Wests, Geoff's loss was a severe blow to the Club in many areas of activity. The best wishes of the Club were conveyed to Geoff at an unofficial dinner in December as well as more formally at the annual presentation night.

During November the Club also received the resignations of Tony Irvine and Allan Grigg. For personal reasons, Tony resigned as first grade captain, player and Management Committee member. Allan resigned in order to return with his family to his former home in New Zealand. Allan was a staunch worker for the Club in many areas, including groundsman, assistant secretary, ACTCA delegate. His final duty for the Club was to construct the slips catching cradle available at practice.

Wayne Boardman was elected as President in December and Dave Matthews and Garry Beauchamp were elected to the vacancies on the Management Committee.

The start of the season finally saw the introduction of the new ACTCA Constitution and By-Laws as mentioned in the Eleventh Annual Report. The ACTCA also adopted revised Competition Rules covering eligibility to play, ground preparation and maintenance put forward by a special committee.

As was reported in 1979/80, irregularities in Competition Rules were brought to notice once again in 1980/81 with even greater repercussions. The Club was deemed to have played Greg Roberts in four matches without obtaining the permission of the ACTCA Cricket Committee. Greg Roberts had joined the Club in late January after playing earlier in the season in Brisbane. After the submission of a detailed case to the Independent Tribunal, the Club's appeal was upheld and the possible loss of competition points as a penalty was removed. Despite the provisions of the new ACTCA Constitution, it is notable that the Tribunal has yet to furnish the Club with the reasons for its decision. The Association is to again undertake a revision of the Rules prior to 1981/82. In view of the continuing problems with the Rules, it is to be hoped that legal advice is sought in the drafting.

For the second successive season, the grade competition saw the eight district clubs and the two provisional clubs compete in all four grades. Some of the problems of ten clubs which were mentioned in 1979/80 again occurred in 1980/81. The Management Committee re-affirmed its decision to favour an eight team competition in the long-term. The competitions, apart from the usual problems over grounds, were conducted under the usual number of one and two day games. Apart from the Greg Roberts matter, the Club again was not involved with the Cricket Committee on disciplinary or other matters.

At the start of the season, Woden Club suggested that an Association committee consider the future structure of district clubs, junior cricket and the administration of cricket in the ACT from 1981/82. In November, a Development Committee was appointed by the Association to report on the above matters by April 1981. (See addendum).

The Club again maintained a strong liaison with the Western District Rugby Union Club Inc. While losing the direct contact with the Board through

Geoff Gelding as a Director, a number of other members maintained strong links with the Club Inc. It can be said that the liaison has been strengthened in 1980/81 as has been the liaison between the Club Inc. and the other affiliated clubs. The Cricket Club is once again grateful to the Club Inc., the Board, staff and members for its financial assistance, provision of club facilities and its support of the first grade team at major matches. (see addendum).

After consideration of the available practice wicket facilities at Aranda Oval and their increased usage by various teams, the Club has formally asked the Club Inc. for assistance in the installation of a third synthetic wicket. This will involve expenditure on new wire netting, gates, concrete base and synthetic wicket surface. The additional facilities will be invaluable not only for this Club but for the Wests juniors and women cricketers who now use the Aranda Oval practice wickets. A report on progress should be available at the Annual General Meeting. (see addendum)

The collection of annual subscriptions and the incentive scheme introduced resulted in probably the best-ever response from members. Most took advantage of the early payment incentive and so the Club had an ample cash inflow when needed early in the season. The fact that the basic subscription rate actually went down in 1980/81 made it more attractive to pay early. Even late subscriptions caused less bother than in past seasons. It is therefore essential to maintain such a system in the future.

The other fund raising methods during the season were a 250 Club, meat tray raffles, ground hire and drink stalls at major matches. The 250 Club proved successful and was run fairly smoothly. The meat tray raffles were always a good money-raiser and there was a good response from members rostered to sell tickets. This activity is a good fund-raiser and must be maintained. Ground hire has not proved as successful as in past seasons, one of the problems was the time of a person to organise the hiring. The end of season football training helped the finances somewhat.

The Club lost the opportunity to operate drink stalls at major representative matches due to rain during the New Zealand match and a change of ACTCA policy for the Indian match. The rain caused virtually a complete washout of the New Zealand match, resulting in a big loss to the Association, which was indirectly passed on to the clubs. In an endeavour to offset this

loss the Association asked the clubs to provide workers at the Indian game, but for all moneys to go to the Association. While the Club had little choice in the matter, it is to be hoped that this money-raising avenue is not denied the clubs in the future. The change in 1980/81 had a marked offset on the Club's budget drawn up at the start of the season. With the Association now receiving considerable sponsorship, it should have access to other funds. Where there is an incentive to work for your Club, then it is far easier to obtain willing workers. As well, the Club provided workers for the other Association duties at these games on a voluntary basis.

The Association also assumed, at considerable cost, the right to stage the Twilight Cricket Competition. The clubs competing each week were then required to provide workers to organise the food and drink stalls and the other duties associated with the running of the matches. On most occasions, members came forward to help, but there was a lack of co-ordination of this task. The Club was in fact greatly assisted by the rival clubs' workers.

The Western District Women's Cricket Club became an affiliate of the Club Inc. during 1980/81. It fielded two teams during the season and used this Club's practice facilities on a regular basis and when possible, coaching assistance was provided. The Women's Club now has a direct voice to the Club Inc. through the Affiliated Clubs Committee. There is probably more that can be done to strengthen the links with the Women's Club, however the major problems are the usual ones of time and manpower to devote to such activities.

In January 1981, the Club Inc. appointed Greg Roberts as Junior Development Officer. While Greg's appointment was primarily for rugby union, the Affiliated Clubs have been asked to consider how Greg could assist their sports. Some affiliates have already indicated they would like to obtain Greg's services and this Club should give early consideration to a similar request especially as Greg is a member of the Cricket Club.

ADDENDUM

The A.C.T. Cricket Association met on 21 May 1981 to consider Development Committee's Report on the club structure and organisation. After all clubs and affiliated bodies had their say, the Committee's recommendation for a restructuring to provide for eight clubs from 1981/82 was convincingly rejected. It was disappointing that, after almost six months of hard work, including interviews, examination of evidence, etc., the fairly-well documented case was not accepted. The recommendation put forward was a strong call for a change, but in the end most delegates voted virtually to retain the status quo; i.e. eight district clubs and two provisional clubs.

West's, after much discussion for and against the concept for an eight or ten team competition, decided to support the Committee's recommendation. West's also voted against the recommendation for no residential boundaries. Both these decisions were consistent with the Club's views over recent seasons and after discussion the Club could see no cause to alter its views.

During April 1981, the Club Inc. appointed Wayne Boardman to fill one of the vacancies on the Board of Directors. It was most pleasing to see our close links with the Board, established by Geoff Gelding, continue with Wayne's appointment.

The Club was extremely pleased to receive the approval of the Board in April for financial assistance in the construction of a third synthetic practice wicket at Aranda. It will now be necessary to take action in readiness for the start of the 1981/82 season.

JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT

Once again the Juniors had a very successful and enjoyable cricket season. A record number of registrations meant that we were able to enter 22 teams in the competition; of these 15 reached the semi-finals, 6 the finals and 4 won premier-ships: Under 12 (4), Under 11 (1), and Under 10 (1) and (2). It was particularly pleasing to win two first division premierships and to have four first division teams contesting the seven finals: the other finalists were the under 15 (1) and Under 14 (1), the latter having the misfortune to lose by two runs. Congratulations to all teams and especially to Earle Gow's Under 11 team who went through the season (19 matches) undefeated! Overall the Club finished second in the Club championship to Ginninderra, being beaten 60.28 points to 59.86. The club is strong and we can certainly look forward to a good, enjoyable season again next year.

A number of boys gained selection in the A.C.T. representative squad. Among those selected and those who played the occasional match were: Michael Mills, Terry Szakacs, and John Graham (U-15); Mark Garrity, Marcus Cosgrave (U-14); Andrew Dawson, Tim Stockwin and Greg Eastman (U-12); Michael Bevan, Sean Walsh, Michael Duff, Christopher Taylor (U-11). Four were named and received awards as National Mutual "Cricketer of the Week": Paul Cornish (U-16), Damien Molony (U-15), Michael Bevan (U-11) and Sean Walsh (U-11). Congratulations to all.

The success of the Juniors was only made possible by the concerted efforts of many, including the committee members, age-group co-ordinators, coaches and managers - thank you all. I especially wish to thank John Graham (Registrar), Mike Roach (Kit Officer), Gerry Garrity (U-8 nursery), and the co-ordinators: Sid Smith (U-10), Earle Gow (U-11), Tim Healy (U-12), Alan Taylor (U-13), John Cosgrave (U-14) and Terry Hudson (U-16) for a job well done.

The Junior Committee notes with great pleasure the setting up of a Development Committee to chart the future of cricket in the A.C.T.. It is obvious that the development of cricket in the A.C.T. towards Sheffield Shield status depends very much on strong and healthy junior competition. We hope that the Development Committee will make some firm and useful recommendations concerning the Juniors and that its work results in the A.C.T.C.A. taking a great deal more interest in them.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

Statements on the following pages depict a successful year together with a sound financial platform to commence the 1981/82 season. As in recent years, a draft budget was presented at the annual meeting as a basis on which to establish fees in the ensuing year for members of the senior club. The incoming Management Committee then established the official budget. That budget made provision for a nominal surplus, the thinking being that an organisation such as ours should not live from year to year, but rather should look to improving its position. That a surplus of \$1,750 was achieved this year is a direct reflection of the Management Committee adhering to its expenditure target and, at the same time, attempting to maximise its income. Obviously success in twilight competitions cannot be anticipated and the \$1,000 prize money proved a windfall to the club. The Management Committee considered that the benefit should be passed on to members, and the presentation night was subsidised to the extent of approximately \$400.

Clearly our club does not survive on subscriptions alone and outside fund-raising is needed. There has been little pressure placed on members by way of internal raffles in the last few seasons and the efforts of those few people who look after the weekly raffles at the club should not go unnoticed, for \$735 was raised from this source last season, while the "100" Club also was moderately successful.

Though equipment generally has been well looked after by the Kit Committee, it is disturbing to note that saleable items, such as tee-shirts and caps, cannot be accounted for and this aspect warrants the close attention of the incoming Management Committee.

It is noted that the juniors' expenditure exceeds income from their subscriptions and, though a portion of donations and interest receivable are applicable to the juniors, they may have to look closely at a minor increase in their subscription rates for the forthcoming season.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP - G.W. GELDING

In presenting the fourth annual report, the Management Committee wishes it noted that it has considered the matter of life membership of this club. The Committee believes that an award of life membership is one that is not automatic, but rather earned by any member who contributes significantly over a number of years to the interests and administrative affairs of the club. Performances on the field are not considered in life membership proposals, for such an award is a reflection of contributions to the club.

By its very nature it would, in any circumstance, have been unlikely to have been awarded in the first decade of the club's existence. However, the Management Committee believes that there has emerged a person who, in all aspects, has earned life membership and that person is Geoffrey Gelding. The tables at the back of the report indicate the official positions held by Geoff in his association with the club. They do not indicate, however, that for many years he has been a junior coach, curator, constant worker on stalls, raffle-ticket seller, member of several kit, social, and selection committees. All those matters are right at the heart of the running of the club and Geoff has performed them for many years and this club has benefitted enormously through these efforts. If one were to peruse reports of the past years, one might get an inkling as to the amount of dedication displayed by Geoff. It is also clear that our happy association with the Rugby Club is attributable to Geoff's endeavours. Many hours of time have also been spent on our club's behalf by Geoff in being "the club's" representative at A.C.T.C.A.'s meetings and activities.

The Management Committee of the club unanimously supports the following motion to be moved by Mr. G. Garrity, seconded by Mr. R. Rogers, "that Mr. G.W. Gelding be made a life member of this club". The adoption of this motion would mean, not merely that Geoff would be our first life member, but also a recognition that he would have done more for this club than any other member, either past or present.

FIRST GRADE

It was another year of both ups and downs for the first grade side. Many other clubs would have been well pleased with a semi-final birth and a Twilight competition victory and yet I feel as if we could have done better; a feeling shared by other players in the side.

The Twilight Competition win was the highlight of the 1980-81 season, the second consecutive year in which Wests have convincingly defeated a determined Weston Creek in the final. From my point of view as captain the most satisfying aspect of our wins in twilight cricket this year was the overall team contribution to success. No single player has been outstanding; runs were scored in exciting fashion by Greg Roberts, Terry Khan, Glen Croker, Col Rowe, Russell Rogers and Graham Bush on different occasions and each of the bowlers, Glen Croker, Michael Brady, Wayne Boardman, Steve Bryant (in the final) and especially Terry Khan and Andy Macdonald bowled accurately and to their field. In addition, players like Steve Marshall, Dave Matthews, Peter Bradley and Ray Bubke, not called on to play a batting role threw themselves into the fielding in a wholehearted team effort. The planning before games and thought put into this by all players contributed to our success and the team can be well proud of their achievements. Worth noting is that Wayne Boardman has now played (and won) in three consecutive Twilight champion sides. The Treasurer must hope he's around in 1981-82.

There were some memorable moments this season in the main competition also. The new ball onslaught against Easts in the semi-final when unfortunately we had scored just too few runs in our innings to win; the brilliant bowling against Woden, Norths and City (twice); chasing 250 against Weston Creek for a tie, and against Norths for 6 wicket victory are examples.

For the most part though, it was our bowling department which was the most successful. In fact, in the past two seasons, it has been either the batting or bowling which has fired, but not both. It is obvious that consistency with both bat and ball are needed for the premiership success eluding us at present.

Throughout the year it was the pace bowling department that contributed most. Wayne Boardman (retiring to seconds as a batsman at the commencement of the season), had a most successful year, with 33 wickets and the top average of 15.09. He consistently moved the ball about, bowled at the stumps and was fittingly rewarded. Left-handed newcomer, Michael Brady, bowled superbly most of the season often without luck, especially early in the year. I believe at times he wondered how he was to get wickets as batsman after batsman played and missed. His hard work at practice was rewarded by his final tally of 31 wickets. Andy Macdonald after a slow start caused by illness tore into practice in his usual way, and near the end of the season was in excellent form. His 28 wickets takes him over the coveted 200 wickets for the club. The spinners Graham Bush and Terry Khan didn't get as much work as in the previous season. The batsmen didn't score the runs and Graham especially lacked opportunity. Both, however, bowled well on occasions.

Not nearly so exciting was the season's batting performances. Only Terry Khan and Glen Croker showed any consistency and even these two had their share of low scores. Terry for the third year in a row scored well - 364 runs at 33.09 - bringing him over 1000 runs for the club in only 3 seasons (not many Canberra cricketers can boast that sort of consistency - I'd hate to have to get him out; thank goodness he's on our side). Glen with some spectacular hitting had his best season in first grade.

Of the remainder, scores were rare; the captain seemed only able to score twenty or so before some indiscretion got the better of him. Col Rowe, after a fine season with ANU in 1979-80, returned to the fold and would prefer to forget his batting this year. This applies to opener Steve Marshall also. These two and others might have benefitted from more pressure from the seconds throughout the year. Two lights on the horizon were the arrival of Kiwi Greg Roberts, who showed touches of class which stamp him as a likely representative player of the future, and the limited appearances near the season's close of Peter Bradley who made some valuable contributions down the order. If Peter works very hard, rewards will certainly come his way. In only 11 games this year, Graham Bush also lacked opportunities with the bat. He showed enough talent to suggest he is a better bat than many other clubs in Canberra

give him the credit for. The loss of representative player and captain, Tony Irvine, was a severe blow to the batting strength of the side. Others to make a showing this year on occasions were Dave O'Neill who batted all day on a diabolical Kingston wicket and newcomers Dave Matthews, Ray Bubke and Tony Poidevin.

Wicketkeeper Col Rowe showed his class and deservedly held his representative birth throughout the season. He now holds the club record for dismissals with 117 catches and 18 stumpings.

Interestingly as I review the season, there is a correlation between consistent performance and effort at the practice nets. Terry Khan was first to arrive and last to leave and both Michael Brady and Andy Macdonald gave more than most at practice - food for thought.

After the difficulties experienced by the club in the early season, with absences of key players involved in representative cricket, changing captains, club president and selectors, I would personally like to thank all players for their consistent support throughout the season, especially the senior men Wayne, Graham, Terry and Col. Winning is one important aspect but personal enjoyment and fulfilment are also relevant in our playing each year. The team was involved (although in no way at fault) with one particularly unsavoury "sledging" incident on the field and this serves to emphasise how unnecessary this aspect of the game is, and how important reasonable and fair behaviour is to enjoyment and success.

My thanks also to the small group of first and second grade players who helped at O'Connor with wicket preparation.

Lastly, I would like to express my appreciation and that of the team to the band of wives, Jenny and Irene especially, who produced an afternoon tea spread to rival that produced by other ACT clubs. Where else would wandering pressmen and selectors find themselves at 3.30 except O'Connor - thanks ladies.

SECOND GRADE

A most convincing start to the 1980/81 season saw Wests defeat the previous season's premiers in the first innings by 116 runs and take six competition points - but that was the only occasion prior to Christmas where the side had any reason to smile. There followed two first innings losses and two hollow outright defeats. In these four games, the bowling was satisfactory, the fielding not quite up to standard and the batting abysmal. As a result, the side was absolute last in the ten-team competition and Wests' proud second-grade record of making the semi-finals each season since 1974 seemed certain to be tarnished.

Batting first in round six, the batting pattern continued with the team, at one stage, 7-50 but then came what was probably the turning point of the season. Steve Bryant (26 n.o.) and David Garrity (35) put on a stand of 58 and our bowlers took over from there with Steve (5-15) completing a match-winning double. The next game against Ginninderra could be described as Stuart Peacock's match. His 5-40 helped dismiss the opposition for 91, but when he came to the wicket at 7-40, it seemed that his bowling had been to no avail. However, a partnership of 47 with Gerald Garrity helped see the side through and at the closure he had contributed a most disciplined 21 not out; but Stuart had more to come and he capped his efforts with a haul of 7-24 in the second innings; our batsmen struggled for a time to wrap-up the outright, but a defiant 28 n.o. by Frank Jones made sure of the ten competition points.

In the next match, City was set 141 to win off 56 overs. Bryant, Shaun Michelle, and Brian Karey kept us in the hunt with tight and, at times, penetrative bowling. However, with the last over to be bowled a win/tie/loss was possible with City's score at 9-137. Brian proved more than equal to the task by getting the final wicket off the second ball - a win by two runs! The return match against Norths followed and the side reversed the earlier result with a comfortable win with Gerald Garrity (54 n.o. and 5-30) to the fore, supported in the batting by Ray Bubke (53) and Frank Jones (36) in Wests total of 7-191.

These four wins placed the side in contention for the semis and with our next opponents, Woden, lying sixth the match became a do-or-die affair. However, we returned to our worst batting efforts and at 7-37 it seemed a lost cause. Peacock (25), Bryant (9) and Gordon Wood (11) provided some rearguard resistance and our total of 83 was considerably better than it might have been. The opening bowlers did well with such a small target to play with but at 7-69 the odds were with Woden; but Wests rallied and Gerald Garrity (4-6) rounded off the innings.

and we limped home by five runs. A win against South Woden - not without a struggle, especially after putting down seven catches - followed and we were in the four despite a 10-run loss to Queanbeyan in the last round, with David Matthews' score of 67 being almost half our total.

Our semi-final opponent was ANU at ANU South - the ground where we had amassed our highest total in the first match and where Gerald Garrity (100), Peter Bradley (53) and Peter Reed (41) had stood out in the batting and Shaun Michelle (5-44) had made a most impressive second-grade debut. Wests batsmen applied themselves to the task at hand and the side passed 200 with loss of only five wickets. Peter Reed was backbone of the innings and contributed 79 runs in a purposeful display picking-up extra runs with improved running between wickets. David Matthews' score of 51 was a brilliant knock and he dominated a second wicket partnership of 84 in 96 minutes. Chasing quick runs, Wests last few wickets fell cheaply but with a total of 231 we held the upper hand. However, the pitch was the eventual winner and, after receiving 126 overs, ANU was 6-214 and the match drawn. While the result was disappointing and the side was eliminated without being defeated, it must be borne in mind that the competition is played over six months and ANU did finish 23 points ahead of Wests at the end of the rounds and thus were entitled to proceed to the final unless they were beaten. In fact, ANU's batting in the match was very sound and Wests can take heart in that they secured a draw and ANU then proceeded to win the final for the second successive year.

Some brief comments on individual players complete the report. Shaun Michelle, just out of the junior ranks, was an immediate success and he kept good control throughout the season; next season should see him increase his pace and, when given an opportunity, should prove a useful batsman; Steve Bryant, who (contrary to team-mates' opinion) considers himself an allrounder, again bowled tirelessly and always raised that extra effort when called upon - his tally is now 64 wickets in second-grade in just two seasons; just when he had established himself in second-grade, Brian Karey broke-down with a knee injury - he will make his presence felt next season. Gordon Wood was quite lively in his few matches, but needs to improve his fielding; having their first season in Canberra, David Matthews and Ray Bubke, suggested at times they were better than second-grade material, but Ray's downfall - impetuosity - will have to be curbed

if he is to be a consistent run-getter; two players, Peter Reed (wicket-keeping) and Ray Jones (opening batsman) assumed unaccustomed roles in the interests of the side and each enjoyed reasonable success; down the list next season Ray will score many more runs; available only for the last few rounds Kevin Balkin again demonstrated what a useful all-rounder he is; though having a lean year - somewhat through limited opportunities - Gary Beauchamp's determination and timely advice were of immeasurable value to the team; Stuart Peacock is definitely a spinner of the future while his batting possesses a degree of solidity which could see him as a successful opener; while Warren Blackshaw had a season he would probably prefer to forget, the experience will stand by him and, with confidence, he should be able to cement a permanent place in 1981/82; David Crockhart bowled useful leg spinners but unfortunately the side's batting gave him too few runs to play with, except in the first match where he himself figured in a record breaking partnership.

Overall the team can be well pleased with its efforts. After such a disastrous early season, it came back with the spirit and application so necessary for success.

Special thanks are extended to those players who helped out over the New Year period when the side was short and to Bob Scott, Paul MacLachlan and Brian Karey who chipped-in with their participation at the end-of-season practices.

THIRD GRADE

FOURTH GRADE

The 1980/81 season was a mixed season for the Fourths. A total of 34 players participated during the season which meant the stability of regular performance was missing. The absence of players, particularly mid-season, meant any chance of a semi-final position vanished at that time. The need to use four different captains did not improve matters. Of the 12 matches played, four were won, one drawn and seven lost. We finished in eighth position. Some games were only lost narrowly. The team showed great application right to the end of the season, and almost pulled off an outright against Woden, an eventual finalist.

The spirited way in which the players, many of whom have just entered all-age cricket, applied pressure on batsmen in support of their bowlers was most commendable.

Batting was our weakest point. The bowlers were able to restrict opposing teams to quite reasonable scores but our batting lacked any depth and application. Only eight times did a batsman exceed 30 runs in an innings and half of these were by batsmen who only played on a couple of occasions, or were promoted to a higher grade.

Mick Hunt was by far our most consistent batsman and was unfortunate to fail by only three runs to score a century in the last game. Dennis Smith began to show promise but was quickly claimed by thirds. Despite our generally poor showing with the bat, we were able to break two fourth-grade club partnership records (1st wicket - 106 runs, D. Fraser 86, D. Smith 68; 10th wicket - 52 runs, R. Reeson 39 n.o., G. Lalor 7).

It is easy to be critical. It is also easy to forget that for many of our young players the transition from the certainty of a concrete pitch to the uncertainty of turf is a major step in one's cricketing career. It takes a while to learn that "heads down and concentration" is the only way on turf.

Our bowling was generally more memorable. Glen O'Sullivan had a very pleasing introduction to all-age cricket and for a young spin bowler showed a great deal of nerve as well as skill. He stuck at his task and was rewarded with wickets even when the tide was against him.

Tgd Campbell showed good promise as an opening swing bowler, but was unable to complete the season. Ron Reeson and Greg Lalor showed the value of experience and consistent bowling was awarded. Greg reached 100 wickets for the Club - a fine effort. Paul MacLachlan bowled quite well at times and deserved a better average than the figures show. Rowan Pitchford turned in some good efforts towards the end of the season, and next year will have more speed and penetration - better length will bring more success.

John Francis was very solid behind the wickets. However, nine catches and two stumpings in six matches saw him quickly despatched to third grade. Glen O'Sullivan turned in the best all-round performance when runs, wickets and catches are all put together - a great start to his all-age cricketing career.
