FROM THE PRESIDENT

Gentlemen,

While this is to be deplored, particularly as the form of the A.C.T. "Accounts" downot enable

this activity to become cost-effective, we must face up to reality in this regard. As a result, your Committee has been investigating the possibility of "running our own ground" next season. If this becomes a reality, it will require the co-operation of all members, particularly as it is a step designed to lower the cost of playing cricket in Canberra, a most desirable step if the game is to make any headway in the National Capital. I hope every member can see his way clear to support the Club in this matter.

In conclusion, I would like to thank those members who contributed to the running of the Club during 1975/76 and to wish the Club and its incoming office bearers the best of luck for 1976/77. The A.C.T.C.A. is also to be commended for its efforts in the development of cricket in the City during the year. It is important to bear in mind the fact that in Canberra our administrators are also fellow cricketers and we can all play a part in the process of cricket development through working at the Club and/or A.C.T.C.A. level. Last but not least, I am indebted to Allan Casey and the Selection Committee for discharging those thankless duties of selecting teams each round of the season.

The season proved a real milestone in the Club's brief history. It was certainly a series of firsts and must provide a springboard for greater achievements in future years.

The Club was represented in the three grade semi-finals and it was only the late withdrawal of several key players that may have prevented us from taking out more than one premiership.

Your First Grade side took out their first Minor Premiership and Premiership Flag and the Club finished the season as Club Champions, another first.

The season saw the introduction of a Sub-District Competition in two grades to replace 4th and 5th Grade in the District Competition. Conducted on a non residential basis the competition attracted an additional 18 teams and appeared to raise the overall standard of play in these grades.

The Club fielded two teams, one in each grade, and both teams performed creditably in finishing fourth. The A Grade team lost its semi-final to Ginninderra the eventual premiers.

The season was experimental and matches were run in parallel with the Grade competition; however it would seem certain that radical changes will take place in the coming season with the formation of a sub-district committee with the A.C.T.C.A.

I cannot let the work of our Social Committee go upmentioned. The efforts of Dene Moore and his party were responsible

for the seniors keeping their "heads above water" financially and for putting on some great evenings at "Humpy Hall".

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Club's financial position was consolidated during the season, and the opportunity was taken to open an account with a building society so that we obtain increased benefits from cash which may from time to time be available.

Only one raffle was run during the season, and although this raised around \$350 it was something of a disappointing result. A similar raffle run during the previous season resulted in a profit of nearly \$550, and it would suggest that the latest raffle did not receive the full support of members.

The biggest success was the prawn morning run in February. This was well supported, was enjoyed by those who attended, and brought in more than \$480 to the Club. Unfortunately this was organized by only a few, but functions of this nature may well be the way to raise a significant proportion of our funds in the future.

The West Indies game in January provided us an opportunity to operate a drinks stall from which a profit of around \$250 was obtained. Unfortunately once again only a few members were around for the work.

Most of us enjoyed Dene Moore's barbeques and other functions during the season. Apart from being good value they were also profitable, as "Dene's does" ran at a profit of over \$120 during the season - a painless form of fund raising.

There were however disappointments and unsatisfactory aspects of the season;

• The annual dinner incurred a loss of \$124-40. This arose from a number of people not attending after

having indicated their intention to do so, with the result that the function was over-catered for.

of the total profit while the Juniors contributed over \$460. Last season the roles were reversed, with the Seniors contributing over \$760, and the Juniors incurring a loss of around \$200. The Juniors obviously pulled their weight this season, and the Seniors must ensure that they emulate this example next season.

Despite our relative financial health, the coming season will impose considerable demands on our resources and administration. Apart from cost increases in gear etc, there is the problem of ground rent increases and/or ground leasing arrangements to be entered into. We cannot afford these matters to erode our current sound position.

JUNIORS REPORT

With one exception the competition took the same format of previous years; age groups 10 - 12 contested fourteen one-day games and the Under 13 - 16 lads competed in seven two-day fixtures. The only variation was that an Under 15 competition was reintroduced. However, when it was apparent that some of the stronger clubs would by-pass this age group, our Club did not enter a side but nominated four Under 16 teams. Late in the season the Club decided that as there were instances of some boys being ineligible, by a few months, for Under 14, it may be prudent in future to enter an Under 15 team, even if not in the first division.

The policy adopted by the Club this season was that winning of premierships was secondary to other aspects. It was considered that the main goals were:

- (a) to assist in the development of each boy's ability, and
- (b) to provide the opportunity for boys to play in an enjoyable competitive atmosphere.

It was for the first reason that two sides were entered in the Under 16, Division 1 Competition. The teams chosen were, as far as possible, of equal ability. In this was twenty-five players were exposed to the higher grade rather than half in a lower division. By so doing the possibility of winning two premierships was rejected in the belief that each boy would benefit more by participating in a stronger competition.

Nine of the fifteen sides made the semi-finals, with one of our Under 16 sides winning the top division, and coaches generally reported development of players during the season. Some features of

the season included:

- twelve of the coaches completed the Rothmans Cricket
 Coaching Course a course supported by the Australian
 Cricket Board designed to assist those people who are
 looking after young sides;
- . for the first time, practices were held on weekends prior to the start of the season;
- . there were three issues of a Club Newsletter comprising mainly coaching material;
- coaches attended committee meetings;
- . group practices were arranged for wicket keepers;
- for the second successive year an Under 16 match against a visiting side from the Bankstown Churches Competition was played at Kingston Oval.

The team was fortunate to have the services of Dennis Driscoll as coach until his departure for the U.S.A. Peter Croker and Pat Wilson carried on the task after Dennis's departure.

With so many talented under 16's this season the Club took the unprecedented step of playing two teams in Division 1. The sides were very evenly balanced with Wests 2 finishing second on the points table and Wests 1 third. Unfortunately for Wests 2, Wests 1 reversed the result of the first round in the semi-final and went on to win the

Premiership in fine style. Congratulations to the Wests 1 boys who proved to be the better team on the day.

The side was strong in batting with Alaistair Meek who made 296 runs (av. 42-3) outstanding. Alaistair recorded his maiden century against the minor premiers and scored another half century later. David Lindenmayer also with a half century was in fine form later in the season. David Reed, Mark Barley, Bruce Willett, Stephen Leppert, and Lance Morton all made good scores throughout the season.

The bowling honours went to David Reed who, switching to leg spinners for the first time this season finished with a bowling average of 6-4 and 49 wickets. With Reedy averaging 5-5 wickets an innings, there weren't many left for the others, but David Lindenmayer picked up 16 and the Mitchell brothers, Mark Barley and Alaistair Meek also bowled well.

The fielding was also of a high standard with skipper Bruce Willett making 16 dismissals behind the stumps.

A special mention should also be made of the good teamspirit and considerable improvement of Michael and Stephen Lancaster, both of whom were playing their first season in junior cricket.

Seven members of the team were represented in the ACT Under 16 squad and several also played grade cricket for the Club with good performances in grades as high as third.

The team was fortunate to have Eddie Willett as coach. Bruce Lindenmayer was manager for the side and Mike Lancaster also provided valuable assistance.

This team commenced the season with 14 players of whom 8

had not previously played competitive cricket. Therefore is was necessary to concentrate on teaching the players the elementary rules of the game and the fundamentals of batting, bowling, fielding and running between wickets. Our basic philosophy was to encourage the players to continue in the game and we felt this aim could best be met by having as many as possible bowl and bat in each game. Winning games was not our main objective but as the players learnt the skills and applied them we in fact won 3 games for the season.

The players by application and a willingness to learn and generally to support each other moulded into an effective team which by the last two minor round matches gave the top two teams strong competition. In fact the coaches of those teams were both complimentary about the sportsmanship and ability of our team.

Bill French captained the team very well. He was brilliant in the field and was our most successful bowler with 21 for 103 runs. Peter Ranyard took 12/107. New players Alan Johnston (6 wkts) and Bruce Timbrell (5 wkts) were opening the attack by the end of the season.

Three players made over 100 runs for the season and each of these made 1 half century. Mark Treloar, who opened in most matches, made 126 with a topscore of 54 retired. Paul Southwell made 117 including a magnificent innings of 61 not out against Daramalan when all others failed to reach double figures. Paul a first year player also kept wickets very well taking 2 catches and making 2 stumpings. Peter Ranyard compiled 107 for the season, scoring 57 in the final match when he opened the innings with Mark and they made a half century partnership. Simon Allatson (19), Bill French (25), Alan Johnston (25), Chris Gibbons (23) and Bruce Timbrell (21) were others to contribute significant scores in various matches.

Wesley Slater captured 2 wickets in the last match with his spinners. Brian Hare, David Aumann and Graeme Whinam were always keen at practice and played an active part in the development of this team.

Well done men! Both the coach and manager enjoyed the season with you and wish you well in your cricketing future.

The majority of the team will be eligible to play U16 again next season and with the experience gained this year the 1976/77 season should see some vastly improved performances.

The Captain of the team, Michael Deegan, was the most outstanding performer, topping the batting and bowling averages for the season. Tony Raby was an able assistant to Michael and turned in some good efforts with the ball. Chris Selman also bowled very well and with an ounce of luck might have taken more wickets. David Simmington has the potential of being a good all rounder and next season should do well. Mervyn Jones was an able and reliable wicket-keeper.



Opening batting stalwart Sid Smith started slowly and except for a few isolated innings struggled to find form until well into the season. Few of us doubted that Sid would "click" sooner or later. He put it together in Round 13 and his innings of 63 N.O. was one of his best. It augured well for the team going into the finals. In the finals his performances were classical opening batting. Sid may have put together many higher scores in his career but none would have been more vital than his 12 runs in the Grand Final on a wet track when he took the brunt of some quite ferocious bowling for over an hour.

Although Sid has mentioned the likelihood of his retirement from first grade cricket I would not be alone in the hope that he will re-consider this decision and that the obvious enjoyment he gets from taking on the young quicks around the place (no matter how much he denies it) will get the better of him there are plenty of runs left.

David Munt was a model of consistency in scoring 261 runs at 16 apiece. It was rare that he did not give the side a start. David is a fine example of a player who tries 100% and makes the most of his ability. He still needs to tighten up, especially around off-stump, and if he can put the loose ball away more effectively will become a very, very good player indeed.

Barry Andrews was a very welcome addition to the side this year and although renowned as an opener spent most of the season at number 3. He had a fine season and topped the aggregate with 382 runs. His highlight was at O'Connor Oval against University and we all shared his disappointment when he chopped one on at 99 after a positively swashbuckling innings. Other fine efforts were 68 N.O. against Woden and 34 in the semi-final.

In the grand-final he hung on undaunted against some very quick bowling and while not one of his most impressive innings it was certainly one of his most memorable.

Neil Boden cemented his place at number four despite the fact that the combination of weather, injury and some unusual umpiring decisions saw him getting little match practice early in the season. He displayed a fine technique and hits the loose ball hard. His 37 N.O. against Norths and 27 against Woden are indications of things to come.

Doug Osborne had a better year than last and showed more application and a tighter approach. There are few bowlers who can tie him down when in full flight and his 54 and 45 against Woden were fine knocks. Doug's fielding also improved greatly this year.

At number six Col Rowe's batting improved out of sight and he obviously enjoyed the break from opening. He won the batting average with 301 runs at 27 and showed himself to be one of the finest stroke players in the A.C.T. Particularly impressive were his 63 against Easts and his punishing 81 against Woden. He just seemed to get better as the season progressed and I'm sure we can look forward to even bigger things next year. Col kept wickets most competently again and constantly demonstrates a class which is generally lacking in Canberra. While on the subject of this player it seemed an awful injustice when he was overlooked by the A.C.T. selectors for the game against the West Indies. How a player who wins the batting average for the premier team and is the best wicket-keeper in town can be omitted while a team which cannot make the four gained five representatives is completely beyond me!

Vic Cristofani was a welcome addition to the Club just after the season began and played his initial game with the firsts in Round 4. Vic's wealth of experience and obvious delight in the game of cricket are most apparent and despite his unorthodox approach his batting is founded on good defence, a dazzling array of shots and abounding confidence. It is rare in Canberra that one is fortunate enough to see an attack completely demolished as Vic did against University. His batting in the Grand-Final saved us from a very dicey position and I cannot praise it too highly. I still think Vic needs to remember that runs on the board are always more important than winning the psychological battle — but keep up that entertaining approach! Our thanks are also due to Vic for consistently making the change rooms look like a cross between a jumble sale and a red-cross centre during an earthquake!

Bob Samarcq was tried at a few places in the line up in an attempt to find his niche. Overall he didn't have the most successful year and often paid the price for leaving a gap between bat and pad. He possesses as fine an array of strokes as anyone in Canberra and although only giving us a taste of his wares we all felt that he could have fired at any time. One cannot overestimate his contribution to the grand-final win when he batted solidly and sensibly under extreme pressure. Bob can look forward to a better season next year.

Mal Hall at number nine had to be the best batsman in Canberra at that position. He hits the loose ball hard and despite limited opportunities gave several indications of the depth of his batting provess. It is important for a side to bat well down and

Mal's ability gave us an edge on all other clubs in this department.

While on the subject of batsmen Brian Lloyd started the season with 31 in the first round but found runs more difficult to get after that and left us for the seconds. Eye trouble forced an early closure to Brian's season but it is hoped that this experienced player will return to the run making fold next season.

Our attack was based on a duo of fast and medium-pace, bowlers who were second to none in Canberra. Dene Moore did a lot of the solid work and finished with 59 wickets at 7.1 each. Andy Macdonald possesses real pace and the ability to blitz any side around. While early in the year he lacked accuracy his control improved as the season progressed and his 5 for 22 against South Woden and 5 for 49 against Easts were outstanding. It was a cruel blow when Andy injured his back with one round to go before the finals and despite a valiant effort to get fit did not play again for the season. We all shared his disappointment and were aware of his great contribution to Wests first flag. Andy's approach to the game improved a lot this year and he learned a great deal — I'm tipping a really top season next year.

Mal Hall is a fine medium-pacer who gives very little away, can bowl long spells and possesses fine variety. He was unplayable against South Woden when he took 6 for 13 and also bowled well against Woden with figures of 6 for 29. He finished a fine season with 31 wickets at 12.7 each - a most impressive first season in Canberra.

The depth of the Club was apparent when Andy Macdonald was replaced in the finals by Bob Allan. Bob is a great team player and a talented medium-pacer. He made a valuable contribution during

the finals especially a very accurate and lengthly spell in the Grand Final. Bob also peeled off 42 N.O. in the semi-final second innings and pulled in a screamer at fourth slip in the same game.

In the spin department we made limited use of Vic Cristofani's "leggies" and David Munt's array of left arm wristies — they are unreal! Both players suffered the normal limitations which Canberra imposes upon spinners but played useful roles at various times. Vic's 4 for 16 against South Woden clinched our outright and his eleven wickets from the limited opportunities available was not a bad performance.

David didn't get the opportunities he needed but I admired and respected his constant practice. He will get wickets and is a potential match winner with a few runs to play with. A bit more confidence and a realisation that there hasn't been a left—arm wrist spinner around who hasn't given away a few runs will see him doing better in the future.

Geoff Gelding bowled particularly well in his few first grade games and was unfortunate not to hold a permanent place - such was the strength of the side.

Our fielding was often criticised and although we were a bit slow and didn't have too many arms, it was in retrospect, pretty safe. With the talent available to us it appears that we will be the side to beat but it won't be handed to us on a platter. We will have to work harder, improve our general fitness and practice keenly. I'm sure it will be a challenge we shall all relish.

SECOND GRADE

Despite five losses, the side completed the home and away rounds as joint minor premiers. In the semi-final which followed against South Woden, fortunes fluctuated with Wests at times holding the upper hand. However, a determined 7th wicket partnership enabled our opponents to secure a first innings win. Wests were thwarted by two batsmen who applied themselves to the task - a facet which our batsmen seldom achieved throughout the season.

The strength of the side was in its attack, which normally comprised three pace bowlers and two or three spinners. Medium pacer, Bob Allan, was the team's most consistent performer and his efforts often swung possible defeats into victories or alternatively converted first innings leads into outrights. Bob's absence from the semi-final lineup was a crippling blow to the side. Howard Lipscombe, the side's speedster, had a mixed season, displaying great hostility at times while on other occasions he lapsed into periods of inaccuracy, For most of the season, Bruce Coe figured prominently in the attack and his honest displays assisted materially in outright victories against Easts and Woden. In the later part he was replaced by Ron Winter who proved an able foil for the other pace bowlers. Spinners, John Bice and Geoff Gelding were ever reliable. John took wickets in every match, displaying ability to bowl accurately for long periods. With his righthand leg spinners, Geoff was an integral part of the side's attack in the eight games in which he played, bowling with splendid control.

Except for two games against South Woden, the bowlers were given splendid support from their fieldsmen and many catches bordering on the superb were accepted. John Bice, Bob Allan, Gerald Garrity took more than their share in the slips area, while Greg Beacroft was outstanding in the outfield. The catching against

Woden in the last round would rank high in any level of cricket. The wicket keeping position was shared by Allan Casey and Bill Pattinson. Allan kept for the early games but suffered a finger injury which adversely affected his performances. Bill turned in some inconsistent performances - sometimes displaying shoddy glove work while at other times proving most competent.

When we consider that half the games were played at O'Connor Oval which provided a splendid batting surface, and with outfields cut generally to acceptable heights, high scores by our batsmen could have been expected. While four new partnership records were established, these were isolated instances of purposeful batting. The side suffered from its failure to obtain sound starts and though various combinations were tried, no solution was achieved. Batting slumps were frequent and there was evidence of too many wickets being presented meekly to bowlers. Poor attendances at practices could be given as a reason for this together with the fact that most players gave the impression that in scoring 20 or 30 they felt they had done their job. There is no doubt that the side had the ability to produce bigger totals and no batsman, except Bob Samarcq, can escape criticism in this regard.

Ken Brazel who gave many gritty performances, particularly after Christmas, showed that a disciplined approach to batting can lead to higher scores. His application in the semifinal and in the match against Norths, stood out. The most gifted batsman in the side was Greg Beacroft who failed to produce runs commensurate with his ability. A magnificent back-foot player, Greg delighted all with his stroke play, but invariably did not go on with his innings. He has the ability to be a representative player in the near future and with more experience will learn how to produce high scores.

the middle order batting and though consistently retrieving positions, each failed to register a half century in the season despite being on top of the bowling on numerous occasions. One player who had two scores in the fifties was Steve Marshall. Unfortunately, Steve was run out in four of his last five innings, mainly through faulty calls of his partners, but for this, his aggregate would have been much higher. Mark Gray, John McCormack, Graham Evans and Keith Jenkins did not do justice to their ability but each is capable of earning a regular place in the side next season.

The enjoyable season which included five outright wins, saw most matches have interesting passages of play. The spirit of the team was excellent and in the quest for outrights, batsmen were prepared to risk their wickets attempting to score quick runs for the side. There was sufficient evidence that individuals had the ability to form a premiership winning combination, but when the pressure was on, slip shod batting nullified these hopes.

THIRD GRADE

This side had a very successful season, finishing third in the ladder but were beaten in the semi-final after having many chances to win.

The strength of the side was spread evenly between the batsmen and bowlers. From 17 innings, we scored more than 200 runs on one occasion and more than 150 runs on four other occasions, whilst the bowlers restricted the opposition to 200 runs on one occasion and 150 runs on two, from 20 innings. No batsman really dominated the scoring but mention must be made of Graham Goodman's fine 84 against South Woden, Mark Gray's dashing 50 against Woden and the consistency of Kevin Balkin who on many occasions guided us out of trouble.

The brunt of the bowling was carried out by Bob Neal who captured 57 wickets for the season and Kevin Balkin who finished up with 41 wickets. These two were ably assisted, at times, by Bruce Coe, Ron Winter, Peter Clarke and in the semi-final by Des Kiernan. Our fielding, especially our catching, ranged between average and poor but I am sure like any side that does not practice this part of the game seriously, this was the best that could be expected.

Our outright win against Woden in the last round will be remembered for a long time by those who were there. We required 145 runs to win outright (for what we thought was a place in the semi-finals) from 10 overs. I was very dubious whether we should even attempt such a task but after discussions with some of the players, namely Kevin Balkin and Allan Casey, we decided to attempt (in my view) the impossible. A smashing 52 by Mark Gray, a lucky

38 by one Ian McLennan and solid batting by Edward Willett and Kevin Balkin saw the necessary runs on the board from 9.3 overs.

In closing I would like to make special mention of the Juniors who played in the side during the season. Dave Lindenmayer was a regular member of the side and showed that with both bat and ball he has the ability to play much higher grade cricket.

Simon Heggen showed in his few games that he has a lot of ability with the bat, proving very stubborn for the opposition bowlers to shift. David Reed played two games, whilst not getting a chance to perform in the first game, in the semi-final his catching was a feature and his spin bowling will, I am sure, be an asset to the Club in the future.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who played in Thirds during the season for the support they gave me and for the team spirit that made my role as captain much easier.

SUB-DISTRICT A GRADE

The "A" team participated in the inaugural Sub-district A competition which brought together twelve teams of a wide range in standard. Some players, notably from the premiers, Ginninderra, would probably gain places in many second grade teams, and overall the competition contained few "easy" teams.

The "A's" were successful in reaching the semi-final, but were then soundly beaten by the eventual, and deserved, premiers. Circumstances caused the team to be significantly altered two days before the game and one can but speculate as to the outcome of the game had these changes not occurred.

The team was a successful blend of young talent and older "experience". Thirty five players were in the A's teams during the season, and eleven, five from the "under 16" junior sides, played seven or more games, thereby providing a regular nucleus which I believe paid dividends during the season. Many victories resulted from a genuine team effort, with our batting and bowling being usually steady and efficient and the fielding, as a rule, well above the competition average.

On the batting side, several outstanding efforts were recorded. Perhaps the highlight was David Lindenmayer's innings of 110 not out, during which he had a partnership of 165 with Glen Croker who scored 79 not out. John McCormack's 93 not out in quick time which enabled us to win the match against Queanbeyan was also outstanding, and ended any hopes we had of retaining his services. Alan Goodman had some good innings, particularly his 52 against Woden. Gary Beauchamp was a consistent opener and was unlucky not to take out the batting award. Although not reaching 50 during the season he exceeded 25 on five occassions.

The bowling attack had generally more steadiness than variety. Ivan Hamilton took 28 wickets and the bowling award. During the season, he took a fine 7/15 against Queanbeyan and an accurate 5/13 against Easts. Bruce Dockrill took 37 wickets in all, including 9/45 against Woden and 5/46 against A.N.U. The most remarkable figures were, however, turned in by Des Kiernan, whose spin was virtually a match winner in his two matches with us and he was undoubtedly a major reason for us reaching the semi-final. Des took 20 wickets for 119 runs off 35 overs, with a best of 6/15 against Ginninderra who, I believe were astounded and delighted to find that he was not in our semi-final side. The Club will miss Des next season.

No report on this team would be complete without special reference to the "kids". The Club is very fortunate to have so many talented young players who have been "turfed" (or blooded) for season before setting their sights on higher things. Glen Croker, who won the batting trophy, David Reed, Bruce Willett and Alistair Meek all impressed with their batting ability and temperament. They all scored a half century and have the ability to form the nucleus of the Club's batting strength in the future. David Lindenmayer, who only played three games with us, also has undoubted ability. David Reed was a useful member of the attack and took 20 wickets, mostly with his leg spinners. Bruce Willett was our regular keeper and participated in 25 dismissals which nearly set a Club record. Batting apart, Bruce is unlikely to stay in A's much longer.

The fielding of the team was generally of a high order and our "under 16" slips cordon was probably the best in the competition. There were even occassions when the "old fellows" fielded well, perhaps inspired by their more youthful team mates.

Finally, I would express appreciation to my vice-captains,
John McCormack initially and later Gary Beauchamp, Both offerred

thoughtful advice and suggestions making my job just that bit easier and helping to make the season one of the most enjoyable and certainly the most rewarding I have experienced.

The team comprised a distribution of senior and junior players. The standard of all was very high and certainly above normal B team standards. It was more case of people playing in this grade because of the large number of good players available, not that they were not good enough for higher grades.

He never pushed himself and was quite happy to bat last until we found out he could bat! Once given the opportunity, Des showed tremendous concentration and application to his task, whether batting or bowling. In the batting department, the innings of the season was undoubtedly Allan Grigg's 126 not out against Queanbeyan. This innings which lasted for a full days play was chanceless and regarded by all who saw it as one of the most complete innings ever seen in this grade of cricket. Allan's influence was shown in the fine supporting innings by David Lindenmayer, who scored 73 and shared a record partnership of 137 runs.

The fielding, catching and wicket-keeping of this team were of a very high standard. Some remarkable catches were held with Max Wilson's efforts certainly outstanding among other fine efforts. The keeping of both Allan Grigg and Warwick Peirce was of a very

high standard and they could certainly hold their own in higher grades in the future. "Keeper" Kevin Berry filled in capably when required and despite contrary reports did hold a catch of Des Kiernan's bowling!

It can be said of the "regulars" that the young player of the future would be Stephen Brooks. As an opening batsman, Stephen improved every time he batted and seems assured of a bright future.

The selectors were saved many embarrassing problems by the regular unavailability of players in all grades. Apart from Greg "crow" Cameron who bowled better every game and took some very fine catches, usually found himself 11th or 12th man at selection time. If only once we fielded our best teams....
