Responsibilities of Membership of the Western District Cricket Club Inc

The Club has the right to enforce penalties where there are proven breaches of reasonable conduct in these matters.

As a player, you should endeavour to be available for all matches as membership carries with it a commitment to the Club. Part of that commitment includes working cooperatively with the captain, team members and officials to ensure your side achieves its optimum performance.

While there is no requirement to undertake administrative duties, members should be aware that the workload in conducting all aspects of the Club's activities is considerable and should not be left to a select few. Your contribution to assist in making the Club work harmoniously and efficiently is encouraged.

WESTERN DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB INCORPORATED PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2002 – 2003

Two disappointments ushered in the season. Whereas for nearly two decades Wests provided the strongest women's side in the Grade competition, in 2002/03 the Club failed to field a team. In the winter of 2002, a meeting of players, officials and members of another Club was convened to address the problem. There followed an approach to the ACTCA but there were insufficient numbers to mount a side. What lies ahead in 2003/04 is uncertain but at the time of going to press, the dearth of names and officials portrays a pessimistic position.

The second setback was when the ACTCA announced a loss of \$157,620 for the 2001/02 financial year, and proceeded to reduce development grants to clubs and re-introduce affiliation fees. This unsatisfactory financial performance is particularly disturbing when it is realised that in excess of \$650,000 is received by the ACTCA through grants from the Australian Cricket Board, surpluses from the Prime Minister's match, and sponsorships. From such revenue, the eight clubs each received \$3,000 from the ACTCA and were each required to pay \$500 in affiliation fees. As the playing strength and future of ACT cricket vest in the grade and junior clubs, a re-positioning of the Association's focus is essential.

The Management Committee drew up its budget in August. That budget was based on the need for a surplus, \$3000 being the agreed figure. Occasionally members query why a surplus should be planned when there are no shareholders to divide the spoils. There are several reasons for such an approach and these include:

- 1. surpluses lead to reserves and are thus available for the procurement of assets;
- 2. grants available to the Club, particularly from Government, are usually on a 50/50 basis. Thus, if the Club seeks funds, it has to contribute the equivalent amount to that which is sought;
- 3. the accumulation of funds provides annual income by way of interest; and
- 4. a surplus budget often acts as a buffer for unexpected expenditure. Budgets set to break even are a recipe for financial disaster.

Consistent with this approach it follows that reserves should not be used to prop up a budget. It is poor management that says "we have thousands so let's spend some of it on trophies, representative players, coaching or training". Such an approach once started, would recur each year thereby dissipating reserves and leaving the Club in financial straits.

At a special Management Committee Meeting in December, the Club took steps to address the drift in its finances with a reappraisal of its own budget. Its coaching budget was reduced by \$2,000, the \$750 allocated for the opening of Jamison Oval was withdrawn, and other expenditure cuts were imposed. A successful Trivia Night and raffle eased the budgetary problems. The continued financial support from the Western District Rugby Union Club (Ltd) was welcome. Even so, the budget surplus of \$3,000 was not achieved.

Jamison Oval came into use at the end of November, being allocated lower grade fixtures. There is an expectation that the oval will be become one the top cricketing grounds in the ACT but this will only be achieved if the standard of both pitch and outfield is improved. The burden on clubs in the preparation of pitches for three grounds each week is considerable and financial relief from the ACTCA is warranted. As Aranda Oval was seldom required after Christmas this season, the Club should consider whether it is justified in continuing to prepare the pitch in future years.

The output from the Management Committee fell short of expectations. Part of this was due to disappointing attendances at meetings and the failure to make available a report on the activity covered by the absent person. Better decision-making requires greater involvement by those responsible. A special meeting of the Management Committee was held in December to address this deficiency and also to tighten the budget in the light of events that had occurred since the budget's approval at the August meeting.

At its February Management Committee meeting, most members indicated they would not seek re-election in 2003/04. The Committee then took the unprecedented step of cancelling a Thursday practice and scheduling a special meeting of players at the Rugby Club. Two critical areas were addressed – the lack of human and financial resources. The need for all positions to be filled in 2003/04 was emphasised. In addition to the constitutional positions, it was put that assistants would prove helpful. With numerous volunteers coming forward the response was indeed gratifying. A new Fund-raising Committee has since been established, while several potential office-holders have attended subsequent Management Committee meetings, suggesting that 2003/04 will not prove as troublesome as this season. To assist these new office holders, an operational manual now exists though it remains incomplete.

The Club entered a team in the NRMA Cup, a knockout competition in NSW and the ACT conducted by the NSWCCA. Participating against different sides was attractive, as was the possibility of winning prize-money. However, the travel conditions inherent in the tournament were troublesome. The Club's first scheduled match was an away-fixture against Leeton, on the day following a local grade match. This was an absurd situation. The Management Committee was successful in having the grade fixture converted to a weekend match, with the Leeton encounter contested on a Sunday with players travelling on the Saturday and arriving at a sensible hour. The Club needs to obtain more appropriate travel arrangements before entering teams in future competitions. The possibility of an away-fixture on the long weekend in October, before the Grade competition commences, is worth considering.

When one examines the number of players who participated in the various grades this season, it is not difficult to appreciate the difficulties confronting captains who take the field with a side that barely resembles that of the previous match. How can a team perform well when throughout the season 45 players played in that grade? This reflects on the commitment of some players, and while an unavailability will occur for a genuine reason, the resolve of some members falls short of the ideal. Members are referred to the Player Code of Conduct at the commencement of this Annual Report to realise what is expected of them.

At the international level the image of cricket has slipped and regrettably, down the line, there is a tendency for this example to be followed. The Club has written to the ACB deploring the behaviour of the Australian team. Player conduct in the ACTCA's competitions also declined and was the subject of considerable discussion during the season. On one occasion, umpires saw fit to submit an unfavourable report on one of Wests' teams though no individual was mentioned. All aspects of substandard demeanour need to be arrested. Our Club wholeheartedly supports moves to stamp out bad behaviour on the field and looks to all its members to uphold the traditions of the Club. The phrase "its not cricket" has lost its meaning – its up to Wests to join the drive to retrieve it.

After three years at the helm I have decided not to seek re-election. The infusion of new blood in any organisation usually results in different and often improved ideas and no doubt this will be evidenced in the years ahead. I wish the Club every success both on and of the field, and ask those members who are appointed to positions in the coming year to be unstinting in their endeavour. To those who have contributed to the best of their ability during my terms as President, I say a genuine "thank you".

WESTERN DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB INCORPORATED MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE'S REPORT 2002 – 2003

This season proved to be somewhat of a rebuilding year for the Club. Following one of the most successful seasons in the Club's history, the Management Committee faced an imposing challenge and, although the Club did not attain the successes of the previous season, much good work was done both on and off the field.

Although our 1st and 2nd Grade sides failed to replicate their efforts of 2001/02, several outstanding results were achieved:

- Fifth Grade took out the 2-day competition in a thrilling Final after finishing 2-day minor premiers. Congratulations to Andy Miller and his boys on a much deserved win;
- our 3rd Grade side, under the assured captaincy of David Jess, built upon its legacy by taking out the 1-day competition in a nail-biting final; and
- special mention should also be made of John Rogers who won selection in the Australian Under 17 side, and Nathan Greatz, who was selected in the Australian Country Representative Side.

It was a great source of regret that the Club failed to field either a Women's or Veterans' side this season. The absence of a Women's side was of particular disappointment, given its remarkable domination of the competition in recent years.

Members again benefited greatly from the use of Radford College's indoor training facilities, which were made available from September through the efforts of Social Director, Simon Young. Coupled with the expertise and experience of coaching coordinator, Darryle Macdonald, members once again enjoyed fine quality coaching and training facilities. The Management Committee thanks Darryle for his continued contribution to the Club, and acknowledges his invaluable input in developing the skills, fitness and mental attitude of our members.

The Management Committee felt it necessary to call an emergency meeting of its members in February to discuss the Club's precarious financial position and its immediate future. The outcome of that meeting was positive and moves are already afoot to ensure the long-term financial stability of the Club. From that, the Management Committee has taken great comfort in the interest expressed by the Club's members to fill management roles next year. The strength of any Club is constituted in its members and increased member participation at the management level can only translate to success on the field.

In regard to fund raising, the Management Committee acknowledges the efforts of Simon Young and Club Sticker recipient Paul Cecere, in organising several very successful events such as the games night, golf day, trivia night and presentation evening. As well as raising much needed funds, these events helped build upon the sense of Club spirit.

That said, the Management Committee must express its disappointment at the Club's inability to take advantage of several fund-raising opportunities afforded to it, such as paid work at the Prime Minister's XI and Summernats. Furthermore, there was a general failure to support the Rugby Union Club at several of its fundraising events (Christmas party and 'Mo-Tunes').

Despite some teething problems, Jamison Oval was finally opened this season. This was the realisation of the efforts of this and previous Management Committees' substantial efforts. Special thanks in this respect go to Marcus Cosgrave for his efforts to secure funding for the Jamison facility and in dealing with some problems with the equipment shed. The ACTCA has indicated that it wishes to establish Jamison Oval as the premier cricket ground in Canberra, behind Manuka Oval. The Management Committee is confident, with the infrastructure now in place and the continued support of the licensed club, this can be realised in the near future.

New nets were also purchased and installed at Aranda oval. Although this installation was not as smooth as it could have been, the Management Committee is confident the nets will, in the long term, prove to be a valuable asset to the Club.

One of the overwhelming positives this year was the Club's further integration with the Junior Club. This further consolidation of the relationship between the senior and junior clubs has already reaped significant benefits for both entities. Season 2002-03 saw an even greater number of juniors progressing through the grades and posting some impressive results and, more importantly, gaining invaluable experience.

The Management Committee congratulates the Junior Club for winning the Junior Club Championship for 2002-03, and welcomes their expressed intention to change its name from Evatt/Wests Junior Cricket Club to Western District Junior Cricket Club next season.

This season also saw the continued development of the Club Operations Manual by Swee Tin-Pang. This document will, when fully realised, ensure the smooth operation of the Club from year to year by providing guidance to the various members of the Management Committee through documentation of its role and responsibilities.

The Management Committee acknowledges the efforts of President Gerald Garrity, who has indicated that he will not stand for President next season. This year was Gerald's third successive term as President, and he provided invaluable stability and expertise in uncertain times for the Club. Gerald's tireless efforts over many years have proved inestimable and he will be missed.

In conclusion

It is not an overstatement to say that next season will be a pivotal one in the Club's history. It is essential that the Club ensure the stability of its financial position. This will be achieved predominantly by securing further sponsorship funds. The task will not be an easy one but, as noted above, there has been a great expression of interest by members to take a more active role in the management of the Club.

And, as my predecessor noted last year, the Club has developed a palpable sense of camaraderie and mateship, qualities that will ensure the prosperity of the Western District Cricket Club.

WESTERN DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB INCORPORATED 1ST GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT 2002 – 2003

2002/03 will go down as an unfulfilled season for many players. In last year's report I mentioned how great was our turnaround from the previous year and suggested that only slight improvement was required to earn that elusive 1st Grade premiership flag. Unfortunately, due to a combination of unavailability and injuries, we were unable to go that extra step. However, that said, we had more opportunities to win the close matches this season than in the previous summer.

We had a tough start to the premiership. The first three rounds saw us play last season's premiers, Weston Creek, and other strong contenders in Eastlake and North Canberra. Unfortunately against such high calibre opposition we failed to post a victory in these opening games – something we had to do to bring ourselves into contention for the semis.

After Christmas our side became more stable and confidence in each other grew, this being reflected in sizeable partnerships and team scores. Because of our early reversals, the opportunity to make the semis was in the hands of others teams and eventually we missed the cut-off by two games in finishing fifth.

The season saw ACT clubs entering the NRMA Cup, a 1-day competition conducted on a knockout basis by the NSWCCA with participants from the ACT and NSW country. We were eliminated in the third round, losing to Albury primarily because we failed to bat our full 50 overs.

Wests' batting this season was generally disappointing – it has been three years since we managed to score 300 in a 2-day match. However, some individual and team performances are worth mentioning. Against ANU with the first day's play washed out, we posted an impressive 4/271, due mainly to the opening stand of 144 between Darren "Richo" Richards (72) and Daniel King (71). "Richo" featured in most of our team's celebrated performances, partnerships and successes, and achieved the batting aggregate. His 98 against Weston Creek in the third match was an indicator of what was to follow. In all, he managed a score of 30 or greater in 11 out of 20 innings and set an example for the rest of the team. The opening partnership improved throughout the season while Tim Purser filled the role of No.3 admirably and I look to his securing that position in the seasons ahead.

With Ben Keens suffering a broken finger and Matt McGann frequently unavailable because of work commitments, considerable experience in our bowling attack – the strength of the side in past seasons – was missing. Andrew Jones took on the senior bowling role. With a revamped action and greater stamina, his form justified selection in the Comets side for their last two matches. In the first of these, he captured five wickets playing a significant part in the side's defeat of New South Wales – congratulations.

Congratulations are also extended to Daniel Callaghan, Daniel King and Tim Purser – all of whom represented the ACT in the Australian U19 Championships. The ACT U19 side participated in the Konica Cup, somewhat adding a new dimension – albeit Wests did not face them this season.

Special mention should be made of the selection of John Rogers in the Australian U17 development squad as a result of his efforts in the Australian U17 Carnival.

Looking over the season, irrespective of results, it was always enjoyable. Thank you to all those who played 1st Grade. I have learnt from this year's captaincy and hope to see everyone return next season and perform even better.

WESTERN DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB INCORPORATED 2ND GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT 2002 – 2003

Someone once asked Napoleon Bonaparte what was the most important quality he sought in a general. Some suggested strength and courage but Napoleon was quick to respond that he would always look for a general that was lucky. In both the 1-day and 2-day Semi-finals this season, 2nd Grade played without luck.

Coming off 1-day scores of 283, 206 and 268, 2nd Grade capitulated in the 1-day Semi-final at Kingston, being all out for 91. It was just one of those days. Similarly in the 2-day Semi-final, after Tuggeranong were 3 for 60 odd at lunch, they went on to bat, bat, and bat, finally declaring the following day at 9 for 531.

All the boys should be proud of their efforts this year, though. I am sure most would agree that we cruised through the season, occasionally losing games we probably should have won. But in saying that, we still made the finals of both competitions and managed to match it with the top teams.

There was a plethora of batting highlights throughout the season and they follow, in no particular order:

- John Rogers impressed early in the season with a steady 52 versus Queanbeyan at Kaleen. Affectionately known as 'Buck', young Johnny deserved his rapid rise to 1st Grade. It is also worth mentioning that Buck was selected in an 'Australian development squad' following his run feast at the Australian National Championships. He also scored 83 against Eastlake at Kippax. Well done Buck;
- Matthew Wheatley began his season with the bat like a man destined to make the next Ashes tour. After two match winning knocks in thirds, 'Wheats' was promoted to twos like a man possessed. He went on to score 73 at Kingston and 77 at Weston Creek, before being sent to 1st Grade labelled as the Club's batting prodigy;
- David 'the Love Boat' Roberts began the season pretty much where he ended last year; struggle-town. But something happened to 'Robbo' late one Saturday night at O'Malleys. I was lucky enough to be there and I witnessed Robbo jump on the LOOOVVVEE Boat. From that day on, Robbo's batting reached a new level. Against Queanbeyan, he belted 45 off 30 or so deliveries, which included two BIG sixes. Robbo also belted 78 not out against Ginninderra a few weeks later, and the love boat was headed to 1st Grade. Fingers crossed Rachel will be around next season:
- Ben Philips had another strong season, scoring the most runs in 2nd Grade, and there were some memorable innings. He blasted 65 against Canberra North at Majura, and destroyed the Ginninderra bowling attack after belting 87 at Kippax. During this innings, 'Folds' resumed after tea on about 50. Most batsmen would be content to see off the first over. Not so with Folds: the first delivery fell a metre short of the long on boundary; he attempted to put the second delivery into orbit but missed; the third and fifth deliveries were sent into orbit. Twenty-two runs were taken off the over and the Ginninderra skipper has apparently not bowled since;

- Lachlan Funnel impressed in the games he played in 2nd Grade. Of note was an innings at Kippax where Lachlan scored more than 50 against Ginninderra;
- Gerard King trained hard at the start of the season but found himself in the lower grades. He soon gave training away and found his way back to twos. Coming off an 80 odd in thirds, 'Hoots' finished the season in style, scoring 55 against Ginninderra at Kippax 2, and 70 against the students at ANU North;
- Along with Buck, Matt Lucas led the young brigade, impressing with a stylish 63 against Tuggeranong at Kaleen. Matt was undoubtable the best fieldsman in twos and probably the Club. The contributions he made in the field were a pleasure to watch and we all hope Matty makes a return to Canberra later this year;
- Matty Burfoot played several games in 2nd Grade and impressed with the gloves. Matty was always keen to support the boys whether bowling, batting or fielding and he proved to be a real asset of the team. He also held his own in 1st Grade when he was promoted during the season. Unfortunately, Matty suffered some injuries late in the season so fingers crossed he comes back injury free next season.

Some other memorable moments worth mentioning include:

- James Harrison taking the Bowling Award with daylight a clear second. Jimmy bowled some absolute 'jaffers' during the season, and was often just too good for the blokes we played against. He deserved his time in 1st Grade and the poms better watch out when Jimmy heads over to Chipstead next year. Well done Jimbo;
- Andrew 'all you can eat' Appledorf being pumped for a huge raking parabola of a 'zac', literally out of the Kaleen enclosed cricket ground;
- The low point of the season occurred during a game against ANU where 79 year old (full-time groundsman) Vic Cristofani batted at number 6 and comfortably dispatched both our opening bowlers for several runs. These names have deliberately been omitted.

And so back to the final game of the season, or rather the season debacle. Fate had it that stand in captain Marcus 'Cossie' Cosgrave won the toss and, on a perfect deck, elected to send Tuggeranong in. Big mistake! From there it went something like this:

- Westies on top at 3/66 after 22 overs;
- 4th wicket partnership of 251 between ex Comets player John Robson and a young lad that we affectionately referred to as the Gimp (who humiliated us by eventually compiling a "scratchy" 150 if there is such a thing);
- Tuggeranong eventually smashed 9/531 declared off 170 debilitating overs;

WESTERN DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB INCORPORATED 4TH GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT 2002 – 2003

This will be the last time I compile a Captain's Report for the Western District Cricket Club. After many years I have decided that enough is enough and it is time for someone new, with a fresh approach and keen ideas to take over the role. Fourth Grade has not enjoyed the successes it deserves in recent times, so I'm hoping that with a change of leadership will come a change of luck that the Grade and Club desperately deserve.

I found this season even more difficult than the previous one. Whilst the constant player change is not uncommon, having yet more restrictions on who could be called up into 4th Grade proved too much to put up with in successive seasons. Cricket is a game where players need to put the Club first, the grade second and personal interests third. After all, if you don't have a Club, the rest disappears.

Adding further frustration to this season was the constant unavailability of players. It is understood that people have personal commitments that they have to attend to, but playing senior Grade cricket is also a commitment that requires attention and effort. Not turning up on a Saturday affects more than just the individual, it impacts on the other 11 players (ten in some instances) who were relying on your input. Also, the grades below at the death knell have to shuffle players and try to find replacements with little or no notice. Consideration for others is something that unfortunately does not seem paramount in the decision making process of certain people.

One additional impact on the season was the inadequacies of the curation of Jamison and Aranda Ovals. Friday night before a game is not the appropriate time to test the automatic sprinkler system. Nowhere in the Club Handbook does it describe, under the duties of a captain or player, the expectation that match preparation for the lower grades includes mowing, rolling, marking and sometimes relocating of pitches to ensure play is possible. We in the 4th Grade pay the same amount of fees as those in 1st and 2nd Grades, so I don't see why it would be acceptable that we should have to endure substandard playing conditions on a regular basis.

With that off my chest, I will now address the actual performances of 4th Grade for the 2002-03 season. Without being too harsh, I don't think there would be too many people who played 4's this season who would say they played to their full potential. Whether they were experienced players from higher grades, juniors in their second or third season looking to consolidate on lessons learnt, or new guys to the Club, all in all we let ourselves down badly through a lack of application and consistency in all that we did. To support my comments, only one person qualified for the batting and bowling awards at the end of the season. When you consider that you only have to score 200 runs or take 20 wickets to qualify, I don't believe it was a fact that the bar was set too high, it was more that people simply didn't put their best foot forward on a consistent basis. As a consequence, when a team consistently fails to score more than 120 runs in a game, they cannot consider themselves unlucky if they do not feature in finals cricket.

The highlight for me this season was the return of Wests' Walking Wisden, previous Club Champion, brown jacket winner and Life Member, Jeff Clark. Clarky adds a lot to any side and he is also invaluable to the Club as a whole. The fact that he brought his love child, Mark 'Mennis' Ennis, with him was an added bonus for all who were lucky enough to play alongside or simply have a beer with him during the season. Mennis is a

living example of why so many Englishmen play cricket, and possibly why they are not so good at it either. Seriously, if a few guys who have been with the Club for more than five years had the same clubmanship as Mennis, who played less than a season, we would not be holding extraordinary meetings during the season to discuss the Club's future. Mennis, it was a pleasure to not only play cricket with you, but just to meet and socialise with you – you are a great bloke and I hope you got from Wests as much as we got from you. Just a pity that the phone number collection didn't run second at the end of the season

Of the 45 players that passed through 4's this year, it was great to see Glenn Smith receive his just rewards by being a solid member of 3's later in the season. His approach and attitude were outstanding this season, matched only by his training efforts and his mum's fruitcake. If anyone wants to know why they should work hard at their game, simply have a look at the result Glenn was able to achieve as he climbed the grades at Wests. I don't think anyone will forget his spell of bowling in the 3rd Grade 1-day Semi-final, especially the guys from Tuggers.

Welcome new faces to the Club that graced the 4's were Kris 'can't anyone hold a catch' Archibald, Jeremy 'did anyone see where the ball went' Little, and Peter 'l've trimmed down a bit' Snowden. These guys added a lot to 4th Grade, both on and off the field. It would also be remiss of me not to mention those guys who actually came out of retirement to help 4's field a full team, and whom put the Club before their personal needs: Craig Henderson, Stuart Miller, Rick Bushell and Club Coach Darryle 'Grimace' Macdonald. A special thank you to Grimace for playing, as the season had been quite a long one from a coaching perspective and I'm glad he enabled me to finally play a game in the same team as him after some 30 years of knowing each other. May I also thank my wife for putting up with yet another cricket season during a time of great change for us personally. After all is said and done, I am a better person for having her in my life and I really do appreciate her patience and tolerance.

Lastly, I thank the Western District Cricket Club for allowing me to captain 4th Grade. Whilst I may have played the game hard, I also played it fairly and am proud to have had the title of 'Captain' within such a great Club. Few things in my sporting life have meant as much to me and I will always have fond memories of my playing days with Wests and the people I met, played with, encouraged and pushed through to greater things within the Club. Thank you WDCC, the pleasure has been all mine.

The 2002-03 cricket season was a very successful year for the juniors with six teams playing in the ACT Junior Cricket Association Grand Finals, as follows:

- Under 11 Division 1
- Under 12 Division 2B
- Under 14 Division 2
- Under 15 Division 1
- Under 16 Junior Girls
- Under 18 Division 2.

Both the Under 12 Division 2B and Under 18 Division 2 teams were successful in winning their respective Grand Finals. To top off a great year, our Club won the ACT Junior Cricket Association's "Speakers Shield", the award presented to the champion team, based on results of all the competition games during the home and away season. This is the first time we have won the award. Well done to the players and coaches of all our teams.

As in previous years, there were further increases in parent involvement, particularly at the younger age groups where it is most needed. Thank you to all the parents who helped out during the year. Our success is a result of your involvement.

The joint program with the seniors to aid the development of junior players and their transition into the grade ranks, which commenced two seasons ago, took on greater emphasis this season. A total of eleven current and former players played regularly in the various senior Grade teams this season.

Highlights of that were:

- John Rogers's selection in the Under 17 Australian Development Squad and a number of appearances in the firsts;
- Nic Death's hundred playing in the thirds;
- Senior 1St Grade players attending and conducting training with our juniors, along with specialist training sessions undertaken by Darryle Macdonald; and
- the support of Graeme Death, Mark Hatton, Gerald Garrity, Richard Cromley, Ian Fulford and Peter Wilson in fostering relations between the Seniors and the Juniors.

Around 200 players registered with the Juniors and once again we welcomed newcomers to our team over the Christmas break. Whenever possible, our policy is to foster involvement in the game for those that want it. It was pleasing that most of these players could be placed in a team.

In the non-competitive levels we fielded at least two teams in each age group, in most instances three, and coaches and managers reported good levels of player and parent participation. A number of coaches and managers continued their roles from last season and their dedication and enthusiasm are appreciated.

We again entered a team in the Under 11 Division 1 competition and were minor premiers and eventual runners-up to Grammar.

The Under 16 Junior Girls also performed extremely well during the season, finishing runners-up to Tuggeranong.

As in previous years we had a number of players receiving awards for achieving 50 and 100 game milestones. One player received an award for having played 150 games, a rare feat at junior level. This has been possible because we have conducted a successful Have-A-Go program for so long, and many of these players have had the opportunity to play more than one game per weekend. We were also able to honour some of our coaches who have coached 100 games (Peter Wilson was awarded a trophy for coaching more than 150 games – thanks for your efforts Peter).

Our Have-A-Go players and their parents enthusiastically participated in the development of the skills so necessary for later age groups. A special thank you goes to the coordinator of the program, Andrew Bewick, as well as to his chief helpers for making the sessions so helpful, whilst creating a good time for all. Our Club has sponsors who provide player awards and perpetual trophies and I particularly thank McDonalds Charnwood and Deans Trophies, Mitchell.

We also thank the Western District Rugby Union Licensed Club, whose sponsorship through commission for selling meat raffle tickets helps us to balance our books and keep costs down to a reasonable amount for the players. I would especially thank their General Manager, Andrew Patterson, and the Board of Directors for providing funds for our T-shirts and allowing our Have-A-Go players to have their sessions within the safe confines of the Jamison Enclosed Oval.

Finally, acknowledgment is made of all those coaches, assistants, scorers, umpires and spectators, who provided assistance to the players week in, week out. Without you, our Club could not operate as successfully as it has.

WESTERN DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB INCORPORATED HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2003)

Financially, season 2002/03 was going to be an unyielding one for the Club from its commencement. The expenses relating to the belated move to Jamison Oval together with adverse sponsorship results meant that the Club needed to be extremely prudent. Given our circumspect position, it is with a great sense of satisfaction that I present the audited financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2003, which disclose an annual operating surplus of \$690.

Grant Funding

Grant income this year was provided by the Western District Rugby Union Club (WDRUC), the ACT Cricket Association, as well as Sport and Recreation ACT. The Rugby Club again offered its ongoing support to the Club, to the extent of \$10,000. Securing these funds is subject to the satisfaction of the Affiliated Clubs Criteria. It is in this regard that I encourage members to return the generosity of the WDRUC by supporting them where they can. We are most appreciative of the continued assistance of the WDRUC and look to nurture this relationship long into the future.

The Club secured a \$3,000 grant from the ACT Cricket Association for the purposes of coaching and development. This grant provided us with the means to employ a senior coach for the year. The grant was also applied to the development of our junior members.

In addition to these grants, Sport and Recreation ACT provided us with a \$1,800 capital works grant for the further upgrade of the Aranda Oval practice facilities. This amount will be used in season 2003/04 to replace the worn synthetic turf that currently prevails.

The Management Committee sincerely thanks all of the above-named for their support.

Subscriptions

For the third successive year, subscription fees stayed constant at the following rates:

Overall collection reached \$17,000 (see note 5), surpassing budget forecasts. Geoff McKinnon is again to be commended for his exemplary efforts in collecting subscriptions this year. I sincerely thank him for his assistance in this matter.


Following the belatedness of much of last year's subscriptions, a \$20 late fee was introduced, and imposed on those members missing the cut-off date for each instalment. Incidences of its application were low, justifying its adoption and proving itself as a deterrent to late payment. The junior subscription rate that was introduced last year for those players playing junior matches who also made themselves permanently available for senior selection was continued this year. The result of this initiative was again seen on the field.

Other Income

Due to the relatively high funds held throughout the year prior to the acquisition of the Jamison Oval assets, credit interest again was abnormally high, totalling \$2,153. And the efforts of Paul Cecere, Simon Young and Mark Ennis generated in excess of \$5,000 in fundraising revenue through the various social functions throughout the year as well as the club raffle. The raffle yielded a profit over \$700 for the Club compared with a possible \$3,000. This is evidence that it is a worthwhile venture that requires help from many more members to realise its potential. We recorded over \$3,500 in other income, being travel subsidies provided by the ACT Cricket Association for our participation in the NRMA Cup, together with a refund of our Affiliation Fees from prior years.

Expenditure

A comparative depiction of this year's expenditure follows:

Salient items included:

- a bad debt write-off of \$7,000 relating to grant income from season 2001/02. This
 amount is an abnormal item;
- Curating Fees of \$5,540, which were higher than last year, and attributable to our inability to secure the services of qualified curators, causing us to resort to the resources of the ACTCA; and

 costs of Ground Hire, Umpires Fees and Ball Purchases which were less than in 2001/02, due to fewer games, with the Club not fielding a women's team and participating in less finals matches.

The control of our expenses after the bad debt write off played a major role in generating the result achieved.

Capital Expenditure

The Committee in season 2002/03 purchased over \$28,000 worth of assets for use at the Jamison Oval. This is reflected in this year's balance sheet.

The acquisition date of these items was effectively year's end and as such, this year, no depreciation expense was booked. However, next year a depreciation write-off of over \$2,000 must be expended.

This year the W.D.C.C overcame what was expected to be a fiscal hurdle. Next year will not be a bright one financially without the successful rallying of sponsorship dollars. Despite our strong performance this year, we are heading into turbulent waters. I encourage members to offer their help wherever possible in raising money for the Club.

I thank the Committee members for their work over the course of the year. I also express my gratitude to Marcus Cosgrave, whose guidance this year is greatly appreciated.
