

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

It is with much pleasure that I preface our 15th Anniversary Annual Report for the 1983/84 season - a season to remember with much pride as President again, having been in self-imposed exile for two seasons in Merimbula. My thanks to Wayne Boardman for keeping the Chair warm in my absence and for his fine contribution towards the ongoing development of our Club.

Well, where does one begin in the journey back over the 1983/84 season?

We are Club Champions again for the third time in our fifteen year history - we are minor premiers and premiers in second grade for the fourth time - we made the first grade final for the fifth time only to lose to minor premiers Ginninderra in a washed out disappointment, after being well placed for a victory assault. However, we congratulate Ginninderra on their first premiership in First grade since entering the ACTCA. It would seem to highlight the fact that cricket in the Belconnen area is continuing to gain in strength and its impact on the ACTCA is becoming more measurable each season.

I would like to pay special tribute to Dave Matthews and Gerry Garrity for their untiring efforts on the administrative front this season - Gerry has notched up his seventh season as Treasurer and steered the Club into a healthy financial state - Dave has injected his quiet efficiency into the Secretarial position, as well as making a meaningful contribution as a member of the ACTCA Executive Committee. I thank you both.

Special thanks also go to Russell Rogers and Club Sticker winner, Peter Cook for great work as Ground Curators this season. Looking at the overall standard of pitches this year, I feel Russell and Peter did us proud in their efforts to present and maintain pitch standards on behalf of the Club.

This season saw the end of an era with the retirement of stalwarts Dene Moore and Andy Macdonald. I thank you both for your significant contributions to Wests over the years.

While I cannot speak for the past two seasons, I could not help but be impressed with what to me seemed a resurgence of enthusiasm throughout the Club this season. Having been with the Club for fourteen seasons, I detected a greater degree of player commitment and competition, which I feel led to a more cohesive and enthusiastic Club spirit.

Mind you, there is still much to be done!

I was particularly pleased with the response by members to our aftermatch get togethers at the Club Inc. It is most encouraging to note the emergence of an oratorial strength within our ranks. Many oscar winning performances were given! This aspect of our socialising contributed, I believe, to our cohesiveness this season, with all grades contributing evenly and enthusiastically to the 'Mug of the Day' awards.

Next season we must build on the gains this year. This is not always easy. It was pleasing to see the emergence of many of our younger brigade, both in the player and administrative senses. The key to our continuing success will be to encourage our younger members, of which we are fortunate to have many, to contribute ideas and instill their presence throughout all facets of club life. I was particularly impressed with the contributions made by the likes of Glenn O'Sullivan, Rohan Pyne, Marcus Cosgrave, Jeff Clark, Geoff McKinnon to name a few.

There has been talk within the ACTCA of the possibility of amalgamating some existing district clubs and admitting some new 'district' clubs into provisional, if not permanent district status. This is an extremely important, and, unfortunately, an unnecessarily emotive and parochial issue. One thing all district clubs must come to grips with if the ACTCA is to progress to the status it is seeking, is the fact that we must continually review the progress of EACH district club, to ensure its ongoing viability and contribution to the 'promotion and development of cricket in the ACTCA'. I just hope logic and sanity prevail. To my knowledge, there have been 2, maybe 3 reviews into the future of ACTCA development, none of which appear to have borne much fruit. I just hope that if we are to talk about amalgamations, and new district Clubs, all parochial and emotive issues be put to one side. We should be able to speak constructively and openly about where we feel things should be going. As you know, it has been the view of this club for some time that 8 district clubs would be the optimum number for the

present and foreseeable future to ensure a more competitive, qualitative grade and administrative structure. For example, it would appear to make sense for the ACTCA to comprise two Clubs in Belconnen, two clubs in the 'inner' City areas, two Clubs serving the 'outer' south of the city, including Tuggeranong, plus the claims of 'Academia' and those of our closest NSW neighbours. Perhaps we may have to resort to a reconsideration of some form of genuine 'district' cricket, with boundaries and player options given some further thought. This vexed issue must be thought through objectively if the ACTCA is to progress.

Now that I am back down off my soap box, I can say that Wests will be making submissions to the ACTCA on the size and nature of the district competition. If you have any views, please let them be known for the club's consideration as soon as possible.

I would also like to record my thanks again to President John Hensley and the Board of Wests Club Inc. and to Phil Harris and his staff. We must never forget that we are one of over fifteen affiliated clubs within the Wests banner and how important it is to contribute to the welfare of Wests as a whole. Those of you who have not yet joined the licensed Club should do so right away if you are eligible, and make the Westies stronger.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone for their support during the season (those afternoon teas were great, ladies) and look forward to a bigger and more successful season in 1984/85. It will mean working that little bit harder, particularly with our junior brigade, but if this season is any guide, the results make it all worthwhile. Let's make it 'Wests to the fore in '84'!

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The 1983-84 season proved the most successful for Wests since 1978-79, winning the Club Championship for the third occasion in 15 years, winning the 2nd grade premiership and being most unlucky in not also collecting the 1st grade trophy. In other grades, 3rds and 4ths both finished fifth and the fifth side playing in the 4th grade City and Suburban competition finished 2nd in the minor premiership but were rather unfortunate to be beaten in a semi-final.

A second District competition was introduced this season based on one day Macdonalds Cup rules. Performances in this competition, which was reduced by poor weather, were disappointing. Perhaps performances reflected attitude towards the competition, particularly Sunday play. One day cricket is here to stay and if A.C.T. cricket is to gain higher recognition it is imperative players improve standards in this style of cricket. Thus, as a Club we must support it and endeavour to achieve better results.

The Twilight Competition again proved elusive, however as a beaten semi-finalist the side performed creditably and with an ounce of luck could well have been in the final.

In a season spoiled by poor weather it can be concluded that the Wests on field performance was outstanding. Club spirit no doubt played a major part in the results. There is an excellent crop of young cricketers waiting in the lower grade wings to press their chances for 1st grade status. It is interesting to note that more than half the victorious 2nd grade team of 1981/82 are either playing in lower grades or are no longer playing, so that the premiership win by this years side is even more meritorious. Much credit must go to Rob Bradley in his first season as Captain for moulding the talent available into a top unit.

Results in lower grades were, as seems normal, affected by player availability. Fifth grade utilised 42 players, half of those playing one game only. A special word of praise to Leo Wyche for his handling of that situation; it was a pity to see the side beaten in a semi-final.

The Club was fortunate to obtain the services of several new players, including the return of Graham Bush and Mike Brady after 2 seasons in

Sydney cricket. The influx of talent compensated for the loss of such players as Dene Moore and Andy Macdonald. Several youngsters from the juniors took the big step into senior cricket with pleasing results. However more effort must be put into nurturing youngsters if the Club is to prosper. A special thanks to Glenn O'Sullivan for looking after the under 16 team which reached the semi-finals. Unfortunately his example was not followed by other senior players. I reported on the relationship between senior and junior players in last year's report. It is disappointing to report that the relationship did not improve. The 1984/85 Management Committee must look at this aspect seriously.

On the social side, although very few social functions were held as it seems is the want of most members, after-match activities at the Wests Club were generally popular and hopefully will continue in the same vein. This is where the club spirit needed to win a Club Championship develops. The Annual Presentation Dinner was a successful evening, no doubt success flavouring this occasion.

The Management Committee remained reasonably stable during the year. Special thanks must be paid to Keith Ross for overseering a highly profitable Friday night raffle team. Outside the Committee several people were able workers notably Peter Cook and the Taylor brothers, Nick and John, in their efforts at Aranda Oval. Russell Rogers again was untiring in providing good wickets at O'Connor Oval.

A.C.T. cricket progressed a great deal in 1983/84 and continues to become more professional in its outlook. There were many changes at the helm of the A.C.T. Cricket Association for the 1983/84 season. The new Executive was overburdened early in the season due mainly to the re-introduction of the Prime Minister's XI match. However the match was an outstanding success and did much to uplift cricket in the Territory. With the West Indies here again in 1984/85 the prospects are for another outstanding season. Another highlight of the 1984/85 season will be the staging of the Australian Under 16 Championships in January 1985. The success of the PM's match may mean the playing of a Sheffield Shield match here soon.

The A.C.T. representative team performed well, winning the inaugural Roadfast Cup. Club members Jamie Pyke, Mike Brady and Craig Henderson contributed to that victory. Plans are already under way for the 1984/85

season. The ACTCA Executive recently met for two days to determine the way ahead.

Liaison with the Wests Rugby Club Inc. continued in a strong vein, although it was disappointing that the Club was not represented at a Sportsman of the Year function. Last year's report indicated the licensed Club was seeking the long term lease of Jamison Oval with a turf wicket as part of the plans. Whilst that proposal was initially rejected there is still some hope that it may proceed. The licensed club supports the Club well. We must ensure our support is strong. Remember the Club fees can remain low whilst grants from the Licensed Club continue.

In conclusion the Management Committee extends congratulations to all members for their participation and contribution to the successful season. A special mention to "retired" members Wayne Boardman, Allan Middleton and Allan Price who filled in on occasions when numbers were short. There were many others who played the odd game especially in the fifth side. A successful season does not necessarily mean all is running smoothly and we must not sit back and wait for it to happen again. A positive approach is necessary particularly with regard to the junior element of the Club.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

The accompanying statement shows an improvement in the Club's finances for the year ended 30 April 1984. Within these statements, members will note considerable increases under several headings and explanations of some of these movements follow.

The Management Committee decided to enter a Club team in its own right in the Canberra City and Suburban Cricket Association's Competition. This was a change from the previous season where a team was entered merely in the Club's name. Thus 1983/84 saw the Club with five senior sides and hence revenue from subscriptions and equipment costs reflected sizeable increases over the previous season.

Subscription rates were the subject of lengthy discussion at the Annual General Meeting. The 1982/83 Management Committee proposed a social levy to be included with the normal subscription rate. The ultimate decision was a \$10 levy for each member with normal subscription component being \$65 for wage earners and \$32.50 for non-wage earners. A surcharge of \$10 and \$5 respectively was applied to those who failed to pay the total amount before their first match; 80% of players took advantage of the reduced rate by prompt payment. This proved administratively easier to collect as well as providing ready funds for equipment procurement.

As regards the social levy, the Management Committee subsequently determined that before any part of the \$10 could be utilised, four weeks notice of the relevant social activity had to be given. This was to ensure that having paid the amount, members were alerted in sufficient time to attend. In the event no such social was arranged and the amount was applied towards the Presentation Night with members being admitted free of charge.

While an amount had been provided in the budget for that Presentation Night, the amount was reconsidered in February. In view of the successful raffles conducted at the Rugby Club on Friday evenings, it was agreed that if the original target for fund-raising (\$1220) was exceeded, then three-quarters of that excess could be applied towards trophies. The total cost of cricket books presented on Presentation Night was \$510.

It would be remiss of me if the efforts of Keith Ross and his workers in staging those raffles were glossed over. The amount raised was outstanding representing approximately \$25 per member, i.e. subscriptions

for all members would have to have been higher without such revenue. The appreciation of all members is extended to Keith and others for their work is recorded.

Another major source of revenue was the \$1000 donation from the Western District Rugby Union Club (Inc). The generosity of that club - both financially and in the use of the facilities, is acknowledged. While the amount formed part of overall funds, the principal beneficiaries are those members attending secondary and tertiary institutions. Some 40% of the Club's playing members fall within this category. The subscription rates referred to earlier reflect the non-wage earner component as being half the full component. Without such a donation it is clear that the difference in rates would have to be reduced and I'm sure students (or their parents) are appreciative. Also the cricket club provides financial assistance to its representatives in the ACT Under 16 and 19 teams - in recent years the amount provided by the club has been the amount which representatives have been required to contribute. The cricket club is pleased to provide such assistance but in so doing recognises that it is able to do so because of the Rugby Club's generosity.

Members will have noted, particularly in second grade that official umpires have been more numerous than in the past. It is hoped that this trend will continue as the presence of qualified umpires adds to the standard and atmosphere of a match. However it has added to the cost of cricket but it is one cost that no-one will begrudge.

Members will note that net winnings from competitions was \$5. Actual proceeds totalled \$100, but entry fee and other costs associated with the Twilight Competition came to \$80, while \$15 entry fee was paid for the indoor competition.

At the start of the year, the budget was set and the management Committee has worked closely to adhering to that budget. It has not been easy but the end result has been satisfactory.

In conclusion I would like to thank those who have assisted in the financial tasks over the season, particularly to David Matthews and Kevin Flaherty.

JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT

The 1983/84 season was an enjoyable and moderately successful season for the Juniors. Wests fielded a record of 27 teams of which eleven reached the semi-finals. Unfortunately only one side was able to go on and win a premiership and hearty congratulations go to the Under 11 Division 1 side for a fine effort.

Although Wests did not win as many premierships as in the previous few seasons there were many good performances which resulted in a number of our boys being selected for ACT representative sides. Donald Pyke was appointed vice-captain of the Under 16 team which contested the National Championships in Brisbane. Others to gain representative selection were Glen Eveston (Under 14), Daryl Clifton, Sam Colman, Mark Cooney, Nick Flynn, Luke Healy, Jason O'Dea, Peter Sargent (Under 13), and Andrew Armstrong, Mark Browning, Murray Eastman, Ian Garrity, Jason Wells (under 12). In addition Hugh McDonald won a 'Cricketer of the Week' award for his century in the Under 13 Division 2 semi-final.

Undoubtedly the finest performance of the season was that by Stephen Mendl (Under 13 Division 1). Early in the season Stephen was found to be suffering from leukemia. He went to Sydney for treatment and throughout those difficult months maintained an interest in his team's performances. He eventually returned to take his place in the side for the semi-final in which he made second highest score for Wests. Stephen has made good progress so far and we all hope this continues through to full recovery.

This season saw the resources of the Junior Committee stretched to the limit because of the large increase in registrations over the previous season. Eventually coaches and managers were found for all teams but the problem of finding people to look after so many teams is one that the incoming Committee will have to face.

Up to now Wests have based the number of teams on the number of registrations, the philosophy being that everyone who wants to play should play. With the difficulty of obtaining sufficient people to run all the teams this policy may have to be changed and the number of teams restricted to the resources available. This may result in turning boys away but there is little point in having teams if there is no-one to look after them.

There may also be pressure on Clubs from the Association to restrict the number of teams because of the shortage of grounds. This season every available concrete pitch was in use both Saturday morning and afternoon. Next season it is likely that there will not be enough grounds to meet the demand.

Finally, the Junior Committee wishes to thank all coaches and managers for the time and effort they put in to help the boys, and all those who helped with transport throughout the season.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

This has been a great year for our First Grade side and one which with ordinary luck would have brought a Premiership victory.

The A.C.T.C.A. must give serious consideration to playing the Grand Final over the Canberra Day long weekend with the Monday being used if rain intervenes seriously during the preceding two days. It was a great disappointment for all players in the side to see rain rob them of the goal they had set themselves at the start of the season, a premiership. It was made worse by the fact that the side dismissed Ginninderra for 170 (after they had amassed 456 in their Semi-Final) and we were well on our way at 1-37 at the close of play on the first day.

The side also made the Semi-Final of the Twilight Competition; however it batted badly after being in a winning position against the subsequent winners Queanbeyan.

Batting was obviously the side's strength which is emphasised by the fact that the side scored a minimum of 235 seven times out of the eight completed innings in the two-day competition - a phenomenal performance in Canberra Cricket. Whilst the batting was remarkable, our bowlers performed well and our fielding was consistent without being brilliant.

I would personally like to thank Russell Rogers, Garry Wall and Graham Bush for their assistance with the handling of the team this year. They certainly went a long way in keeping morale high and made my job so much easier.

There were some memorable moments. Craig Henderson's hard hitting 94 against South Woden and that great six into the poplars at O'Connor off Brett Hannan. Garry Wall's magnificent 117 against Norths at Manuka and Mike Brady and Keith Ross' bowling in the same game. Greg Besomo's fighting 71 in the Semi-Final against Queanbeyan, and the team's great effort in the Grand Final. However, I think most will remember the win over Easts, when after being 1-80 at Tea chasing 261 Graeme Bush managed to hit the winning runs off the last over of the day to record a great victory.

Garry Wall's performance this year showed that he is a great accumulator of runs. Garry finished the year with 407 runs at 33.92. Our openers also had great seasons; Jamie Pyke finished with 291 runs and had a reasonably successful representative year. Peter Bradley and Ashley Weston always gave us a good start on which we could build a sizeable total. The fact that we scored well was in no small way attributable to their efforts. Peter really blossomed this year and he showed that he won't be dictated to by the new ball. THIRD GRADE REPORT

The season can be divided into two distinct parts - the first seven matches where no games were won and the last five where the side secured five first innings wins. The reason for such a mixed bag requires analysis but perhaps it can be explained by one word - AVAILABILITY (or UNAVAILABILITY) of players. Right through to mid-January it was disappointing to see so many 1st, 2nd and 3rd graders missing matches which inevitably meant that the thirds was virtually a fourth grade side bolstered by a few regulars. In the latter rounds when a full complement of players were available, the genuine third grade side emerged - and it was a strong one as indicated by the fact that included in its five wins were victories over two of the semi-finalists.

To illustrate the difficulites in fielding a stable side below is a list of the opening batsmen and bowlers in each match:-

If one were therefore to ask the question "Who were your side's opening batsmen and bowler?", what would be the answer?

Batting, particularly early in the season was a problem and lack of application saw some humiliating collapses - 8/55, 6/10 and 7/22 in successive matches being examples. The return of Glenn O'Sullivan for the last six rounds added solidity and it is more than coincidence that only once did he play in a beaten side. In his limited appearances John Peters added that purposeful spark and two partnerships with Glen of 60 and 72 laid the foundations for a win. One player who displayed application was newcomer Rohan Pyne. Unfortunately promotion and the lack of opportunity on his return denied him better figures. Stroke players Marcus Cosgrave and Darryl Quinlivan were rewarded with centuries in the last match in what had been for them an inconsistent season. Perhaps

the two outstanding innings were a blazing 178 by Dennis O'Malley in his only appearance - he would have won the aggregate other than for Marcus's century, and a scintillating 66 by David Matthews, against the odds in a limited over match.

The attack was limited because of the lack of an opening bowler of genuine third grade standard. Youngsters Jamie Clout and Rod Blackshaw, showed the need for an apprenticeship to be served in fourth grade - too often being wayward in direction; their selection was forced through unavailability and this was to their detriment. Long spells in fourths, and a haul of wickets will be more beneficial than fewer overs in thirds. Bob Pritchard and Ahjay Mehta proved steady toilers, while Darryl was a more than useful change bowler. Spinner Geoff Gelding stood head and shoulders over the rest. He carried the attack and on unresponsive pitches earned his wickets through control and persistence.

Wicket keeping duties were shared by Ian Chalker, Marcus Cosgrave and John Peters. Ian's frequent unavailability led to his omission in the latter rounds but he showed sufficient ability to be encouraged in the future. The side's fielding was inconsistent making the bowlers' task that much more difficult. Rohan, Glen and Darryl proved the safest as far as catching was concerned.

Aranda Oval is barely acceptable for lower grade cricket with an uneven outfield and a lifeless pitch. However the efforts of Peter Cook, John and Nick Taylor resulted in the pitch being in generally better condition than in recent seasons and with this period of curating behind them, perhaps in 1984/85 the pitch might even come to life. Thanks are extended to this trio for their work.

Despite the above there were several highlights which helped to make the season enjoyable. These were:

- the bowling of Wayne Boardman in his only two matches
- that record breaking partnership of Cosgrave/Quinlivan
- Glenn O'Sullivan's catch in the gully to win the match against City and keep the final's hopes alive
- Rohan Pyne's fielding
- the innings of O'Malley and Matthews referred to earlier
- the series of wins which nearly secured a semi-final berth

The captaincy was shared by Bob Pritchard and Gerald Garrity. Each believes that at full strength the side was a genuine final's contender and certainly better than its ultimate fifth place suggests. However it is unlikely that Wests third grade side will ever make the semis if it uses 29 players in a season. It is put to all players - in all grades, that they should have a commitment to cricket. In the fifteen years in which the Club has been contesting the third and fourth grade competitions it has won only a solitary competition - and perhaps unavailability is the reason for that abysmal record.

FIFTH ELEVEN REPORT

CANBERRA CITY AND SUBURBAN CRICKET ASSOCIATION'S 4TH GRADE COMPETITION

Let me first express my thanks for the opportunity given to me by Western District to captain one of the Club's sides. The thanks are somewhat in retrospect, as I certainly did not feel at all grateful at the start of the 1983/84 season.

It was never my intention to again get involved in the running of any team or club, but the season brought its own challenges and as with all challenges the rewards follow closely.

If I may presume to offer some gratuitous suggestions without presuming to press too much of my own opinions, let me make these points:

- (a) A predominantly young team must not be placed in the situation of playing nothing but limited-overs cricket. Any young player who has ambitions to advance through the grades must be given the opportunity to play real cricket and to learn its invaluable skills.
- (b) To develop the true skills of batting and bowling, not merely hitting wildly and bowling to restrain runs, it is essential to get as much play as possible on good grounds. The playing surface must have some semblance of life and the outfield must run, so that shots bring just reward and poor bowling brings its warranted penalty.
- (c) Seek some level of competition wherein young players can gain in stature as cricketers. Get them off concrete; at its best a feature-less surface, and at worst a cricketer's graveyard.

I was most fortunate in the core of players as they grew together in the past season. They were mainly very young and very raw, with just the right blend of maturity (not including middle age) to try to bring out their undoubted capacities. Our unfortunate loss in the semi-final brought its own lessons, especially the need for a scorer who is as fully aware of the need to concentrate on play as is the fieldsman at first slip.

Our young batsmen showed their capabilities for the future and not one of them can be written off for higher grades of play because their runs were made in the bottom grade. Four of them passed the 200 mark quite comfortably and two more reached the 190s. Don't ignore any of them in the future; they will repay watching.

A few words about Gerard Conway cannot be missed out. Gerard was by far the most successful of our batsmen, with 424 runs at an average of 38.55, and the winner of an Association award. Please, Gerard, learn to get your head down early and many more centuries and half-centuries will come your way. Don't throw your innings away!

His regular opening partner, Gerard Wyche, also Rob Scott and Phil O'Brien all did well with the bat and these players are ready for the future. Ian Woodward and Peter Wyche both narrowly missed the magic 200 figure, by scoring 193 and 191 runs respectively. Don't write them off either. Our bowling really centred around two players, Rob Scott and Greg Lalor. Although neither reached the basic figure of 20 wickets a look at the rate of runs scored against them (Rob only 120 runs off 83 overs and Greg 276 off 133) shows their incalculable value to the side. Well done to both of you!

Tom O'Donnell came into the side rather late but took almost as many wickets as the other two (14 wickets at 12.36) and Gerard Conway showed his versatility by taking 19 wickets at 12.79. If you doubt the range of Gerard's activities you should ask the 5th Grade wicket-keepers for an uncensored opinion.

Our other outstanding bowler was "Run Out" who accounted for 13 of the enemy during the season, off many arms from the field.

The player who springs to mind when fielding is mentioned is, of course, Dave Scott who seemed to spend the season sprinting for catches and cutting off certain boundaries. There was never really any doubt as to the identity of our top point scorer in the field and I was extremely pleased to see that his efforts brought some recognition. If justice were to be done he should be credited with at least 200 runs against his name and not the smaller number actually there, because of the great deeds he performed in the field.

Of course, it would be pleasing to mention every player by name, but that cannot be done. However, I cannot let this opportunity go by without a reference to Phil O'Brien's "mates", all eight of them who turned out to keep us in the field. Without those players we would have been "wooden-spooners" without any argument, as on several occasions they were the difference between our playing and not playing at all.

Our deepest thanks to all of them, through Phil.

Thanks to all of the 5th XI players for your efforts and the manner in which you helped me to do my job and to learn a whole new range of skills in the season just gone.
