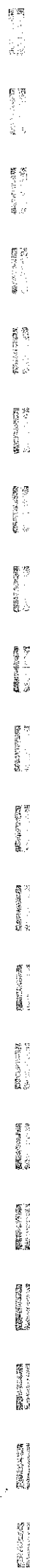

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

The 1984/85 season was one of mixed fortunes for the Club and presented us with much food for thought as to our 'goals' and future direction.

We knew the season would present certain challenges after our success in winning the Club Championship and Second grade premiership in 1983/84 and, while we realised limited success during the season, winning the Third Grade premiership and reaching the semi-finals in three grades, we need to review our present position to ensure we capitalise on the gains we have made over the last two seasons.

I would offer the following thoughts for your consideration.

To begin with, it is important not to lose sight of the fact that we have a very youthful Club. This is a positive factor in regard to our future development. It also presents challenges in regard to development of administrative skills and the encouragement of cricketing skills and performances through our junior structure. Our biggest challenge before us is to develop a more effective and cohesive junior coaching program, to ensure our junior base is not further eroded due to lack of a conscious program of action. The Management Committee has given this matter further thought during the season and will recommend that a Junior Coaching Panel be appointed next season to systematically provide expert coaching facilities to both junior and senior players. Co-ordination of the Panel's work will be carried out by a member of the Management Committee.

This is a positive step to help rectify a deteriorating situation and should go a long way towards ensuring our junior base, in particular, is given access to coaching expertise so necessary if we are to grow and prosper as a Club.

Our other most pressing need relates to the continuity of our administrative structure. The success of a club is often measured by the soundness and expertise of administration. We have been fortunate

over the last 15 years or so to have had a relatively stable administrative structure. However, this is undergoing gradual change. while it is always necessary to undergo change, we must never lose sight of the need to maintain a satisfactory standard of administration. I believe our standard has been good over the years and we have been able to inject a degree of expertise into ACTCA matters, while satisfying the needs of Club members. Our links with the Wests Club Inc. should not be forgotten, particularly when we recognise the valuable financial assistance and 'home base' facilities which are provided to us.

The point I am making is that we cannot afford to sow the seeds of complacency and rest on our laurels.

It is imperative that each club member evaluates his commitment to Wests and asks - it is not what my club can do for me but what can I do for my club? (apologies to JFK!)

This season sees the retirement of our Treasurer of many seasons - Gerald Garrity. I would like to pay tribute to the way Gerry has guided the club into a healthy financial position. His astute financial management has borne fruit for the club's 'sideboard' and these hard won gains must be respected by incoming committees. I thank you, Gerry, for your invaluable work over the years. You will be a difficult act to follow. I would also like to personally thank the following dedicated members for their efforts during the season:-

- . Secretary, Phil O'Brien
- . Chairman of Selectors, Russ Rogers and Dave Matthews
- . Keith Ross and Ken Norris for their untiring efforts in fund raising and social activities
- . Peter Cook and Mick Brady for co-ordinating pitch preparation at Aranda and O'Connor
- . Rob Bradley and Mick Brady for continuing on the work of last season with practice co-ordination.

At the annual general meeting, it is imperative that all executive and management committee positions be filled by members who are prepared to work for the club and who are concerned to ensure we build on the

efforts of those who have worked so hard in the past. Unfortunately, in the past too much work is done by too few. The load must be spread further throughout the club. I urge you to consider what input you can make towards the efficient functioning of our fine Club.

Let's strive to keep 'Wests alive in '85' and this can be done effectively if we all work in some way towards improving our individual contribution.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in presenting the following report of your Club's Management Committee work during the 1984-85 season.

Management Committee

The Committee held its first meeting of the 1984/85 season on 13 August 1984 and subsequent meetings have taken place on the second Monday of each month since. New faces to the Committee Ken Norris (Social), Dennis O'Malley (ACTCA delegate, affiliated clubs), Peter Cook (kits) and Peter Wyche (Publicity) were able to provide the club stalwarts with plenty of fresh ideas throughout the season. Keith Ross again contributed significantly with the club raffles while Neil Davidson and Glenn O'Sullivan were both notable workers.

It was with regret that the Committee accepted, early in the season, the resignation of Kevin Flaherty from his Assistant Treasurer position. Kevin was a valuable performer for the club both on and off the field and it was pleasing to see him do so well in his first season with Tuggeranong.

Although there are matters that the Committee didn't "get around to" in the season past we did, I feel, pave a lot of groundwork in important areas that I hope the incoming committee can further develop for the benefit of the club and all club members.

A.C.T. Cricket Association

The ACTCA's hardworking executive (comprising Shane Madden (Chair), Richard Hickman (Secretary), Col Hassall (Treasurer), Clive Jones, Mike Owen and others) had a full and challenging year which began early in September with more wholesale changes to the district club structure and rules and regulations. In summary:

- . 5th Grade was re-introduced into the ACTCA for the first time since 1975.
- . Tuggeranong entered as a District Club and South Woden and Woden combined to form Woden Valley

- . The Club Championship became a combination of both 1-day and 2-day competitions.
- . The hours of play in 1st Grade varied to accommodate a 11.00 a.m. start in 2-day matches.
- . 1st Grade semifinals and finals became of 3-days duration.
- . A minimum number of overs bowled in each day of a 2-day match was set at, 1st Grade - 100 overs, all other grades - 80 overs.
- . The second overseas player (Mike Watkinson) was placed with the Woden Valley Club.
- . An ACTCA Development Officer (Greg Lord) was appointed. His tasks included the running of the Indoor Cricket Centre (showground) and the planning and promotion of the Sheild and P.M.'s matches.
- . The Prime Minister's XI v West Indies was a well organised, well run, thoroughly enjoyable success.
- . The Sheffield Shield Match between W.A. and N.S.W. at Manuka was disappointingly rain affected and became a huge financial loss.
- . The A.C.T. senior side successfully retained the Roadfast (one-day) Cup.
- and . The A.C.T. junior sides Under 16 (Canberra) and Under 19 (Hobart) both performed credibly with many players including Mark Garrity and Don Pyke looking to have very rosy futures.

The Management Committee, although at times disgruntled with decisions, is well aware of the enormity of the tasks of the ACTCA executive and congratulate them on a job well done in season 1984/85.

Major Sponsorship

Without the continued generous support of our many sponsors, cricket with Wests might not be as enjoyable and certainly would be at considerably greater expense to the individual. On behalf of the Management Committee I thank each and every one of our sponsors and express the hope that we may again share in their generosity. To encourage our sponsors to return in future years it is imperative that, wherever possible, club members not only give their custom (and let them know) but also pass on the word to family and friends.

Special mention as major sponsors of the club must go to

- Western District Rugby Union Club (Inc) - with whom the club continues to maintain a strong liaison. Although we lost direct contact with the Board through Wayne Boardman's resignation as a Director in October a number of other members and Vice-Presidents maintain strong links with the Club Inc. The Board of Directors generously granted the club in season 1984/85 an amount totalling \$1,000 which went a long way towards paying the club's ACTCA Affiliation fees. The cricket club is once again grateful to the Rugby Club for its financial aid and also the help of Phil Harris and his staff for the provision of club facilities and their neverending assistance throughout the season.
- Beazley and Bruce - through whose generous sponsorship the club continues to prosper. The benefits of the previous season's donation of \$600 towards the construction of scoreboards at O'Connor and Aranda ovals were there for all club members in season 1984/85, thanks also to the efforts of Craig Henderson, Ashley Weston, Keith Ross and Andrew Wilson who donated their valuable time and effort in a superb job of erecting those monolithic structures.

For season 1985/86 Beazley and Bruce, through the WDRUC sponsorship committee have approved our proposal; a grant (\$1,000 this year and a further \$1,000 next year subject to the sponsorship arrangements continuing) for the purchase of a bowling machine. The Management Committee in making its decision to request assistance in the purchase of a bowling machine is convinced that it has found the area of sponsorship that would be of most value to the club and club members and also return to the sponsor the greatest degree of advertising through public awareness. It would have been easy enough, the committee felt to simply throw in a request for umbrellas and chairs, which although useful are not of monumental importance. Not all club members would benefit and the sponsorship potential would be minimal.

It is proposed that the machine will be used extensively at senior training, junior training, at coaching clinics and will also be made available for use by schools in promotional/recruitment activities.

The Season

Perhaps too great an expectation early on put a dampener on what really was a quite successful season for the club.

Fourth position in the Club Championship; Firsts, Thirds and Fifths in the semi-finals and one flag were the highlights.

1ST GRADE - always will be the light through which the club's success is gauged. Although they oozed with talent and were winning consistently, they never really seemed to put it all together. I'm sure most were disappointed with the season even though they did make the semi-finals.

2ND GRADE - looked good things close to home but faltered in the final few matches and somehow missed a semi's spot. Also, disappointing but with a few more left handed Victorians they'll do better next year.

3RD GRADE - Congratulations (Rumour has it that Shane Bellchambers has retired on a winning note).

4TH GRADE - had a real topsy-turvy season; from performing brilliantly on occasions to looking very ordinary conveyances. Cookie as a captain, seems to have mellowed and there is too much talent there for them to miss a spot next year.

5TH GRADE - had a thoroughly enjoyable year with semis-spots in both the one and two dayers. Some real "finds" amongst the younger players proves the value of having a 5th Grade in the competition.

Pre-Season Training/Club Practice

Pre-season training and the more professional approach to the Club practice sessions were, I believe, the reason for the club's high standing in all grades prior to the Christmas break. The response to the well-organised and controlled practices designed by Rob Bradley and Mick Brady, especially the interestingly varied fielding exercises were welcomed and laid the platform for the improved performances of many players in the opening games of the season.

With the advent of the New Year, however, the wheels certainly fell off. Tuesday became a training session only for the dedicated. The stretching exercises disappeared and the warm-up laps by February were non-existent.

Consider in hindsight the reasons for the missed semis spot or the unlucky finals loss. Was it perhaps because of those who allowed themselves to drift away at the wrong end of the season?

Juniors

The committee has been made acutely aware this season, through problems confronting other ACTCA clubs, of the necessity to involve itself directly in the development of Junior cricket.

Prior to the season's commencement the committee resolved to establish a coaching panel within the club. The aims, we saw, were to assist promising young players in the senior club as well as providing assistance to the coaches and managers of the junior teams through special clinics and coaching sessions throughout the season.

Messrs Dene Moore and Frank Pyke were instrumental by donating their valuable time and experience on a regular basis prior to Christmas. Although, for various reasons things fell away after the break the benefits that this form of training provides have now become plainly obvious. Marcus Cosgrave no longer "aping" a chook and Jamie Clout's dramatic improvement are two fine examples. With the assistance of the proposed bowling machine and the juniors themselves we can, and must, go on with the groundwork that has been prepared in the season past.

Representative Honours

Congratulations to Mick Brady, Donald Pyke, Mark Garrity, Graham Bush and Ken Norris on their gaining Representative honours in 1984/85. Don's selection as captain of the Under 16 ACT squad and Mick's inclusion in the NSW and "Australian" country sides were both tremendous efforts; Mark became the backbone of the ACT Under 19 side with some fine knocks, while Graham and Ken put in solid performances for the ACT. Bushie had a hand in every West Indian wicket to fall while Ken's 49 n.o. was an absolute gem.

Social Committee

The social side, thanks to Ken Norris and his hard working committee was the most pleasing area of the club's management this season.

From selection night through to presentation night we enjoyed a full and varied social scene.

The after home game barbeques were a great success with many complaining that more weren't held. Race day, Golf day, Moby Dick's games night and the Roaring Twenties night were all thoroughly enjoyed by those who attended.

The Norris flair, and a lot of hard work went into the VIP cards and Monster draw. Now that this concept has been tried and proven successful I hope the incoming committee makes all attempts to promote the card from as early a date as possible. The goodwill as well as monetary benefits are enormous.

Well done Social Committee.

Pitches

The Management Committee expresses its appreciation to Peter Cook, Mick Brady, Russell Rogers and others from time-to-time helpers in their untiring efforts in preparing the club's wickets this season. Remember without their dedication none of the first four grades would get a game.

The following is an ACTCA summary of grounds -

O'CONNOR - The O'Connor pitch and ground have received favourable comment throughout the season. Captains have commented that the pitch has played slow but true on most occasions with some mention of balls keeping low later in the day. Apart from the initial round, when it was affected by top-dressing, the outfield has been excellent.

ARANDA - has also received favourable comment in most reports. Captains have indicated that the pitch has been playing evenly and that the outfield has been a little slow, but satisfactory."

When you consider that some grounds were tagged with "critical of uneven bounce", "lack of preparation", "pitch had not been prepared" and "condition deteriorating" those hard-workers have done a tremendous job. Cookie, Axe and Russ, pat yourselves on the back.

Acknowledgements

Due to interstate work commitments I unfortunately will be unable to continue in an executive position next season. I say unfortunately as although the past year was at times demanding in terms of hours and had some adverse effect in the employment sphere, I found it in the long run most rewarding. Dave Matthews didn't help either. He was so respected in the ACTCA and so efficient in the execution of his secretarial duties that it would have taken 10 men to successfully fill his shoes.

Thank you to Geoff Gelding, Gerry Garrity, Keith Ross, Ken Norris (I'd hate to be paying the phone bill) and all the others who offered their assistance throughout the season.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

The accompanying statements reflect an improvement in the overall finances of the club over the past year. It is important when analysing the statements to be conscious that the figures portray the overall club activity - the assets relate to both Juniors and Seniors sections, and thus the 400 paying members of this club.

Over the years there has never been any attempt to dissect the Income and Expenditure Account to reflect the surplus or deficit made by each of the Seniors/Juniors. However, budgetary arrangements upon which subscriptions are based endeavour to ensure that each section makes a comparatively small surplus in each year. The build up of these profits creates surplus funds and these amounts are in turn invested and provide revenue to the club; thus they materially assist in keeping the subscription rates to the reasonably low level they have been in recent years. Any decision by the Management Committee to otherwise utilise these funds will result in a decline in interest revenue and lead to higher Junior/Senior subscriptions.

Overall the financial position appears sound. The year under review provides no specific highlights other than the continued increased support by the Western District Rugby Union Club (Inc). Senior members will be well aware of the two new scoreboards erected at Aranda and O'Connor Ovals, the cost of which was borne by the Rugby Club, which also made two further grants. One of these was an amount of \$1000 towards running costs of the club. This has tended to become an annual grant with members having a degree of expectancy about receiving it. Be that as it may, the Management Committee is indeed appreciative of this form of support. Such recurrent grants given by the Rugby Club have enabled donations to be made to Under 16 and 19 representatives and have materially assisted in keeping subscription rates for non-wage earners to a fairly low level. Earlier in this Annual Report the Honorary Secretary commented on a grant towards the procurement of a bowling machine. It is yet another form of support given by the Rugby Club.

Senior subscription rates rose in 1984/85 to \$85 (\$75 + \$10 social levy) provided payment was received before the member played his first match. Members have to consider each year whether to increase subscription rates to cover rising costs or seek additional monies from fund raising. This issue will again come forward at the club's Annual General Meeting in July. On the one hand members generally prefer that membership fees be not increased and therefore specific fund raising should be undertaken to cover

the necessary additional costs. On the other hand some members maintain that the effort involved in trying to raise the extra amount of money (\$700) is not justified and it is easier for all concerned for rates to rise by say \$10 per head. Of course, should a fund raising campaign in excess of the \$700 be undertaken then there could well be a reduction in subscription rates. Whilst this result may sound appealing, some would suggest that the work involved in raising that amount of money is shared disproportionately by only a few members.

Of course some fund raising does occur. As indicated in the statements, weekly raffles return more than \$1200 per season. We record here our appreciation to Keith Ross who organises the rosters.

Now for a touch of nostalgia! After eight years as your Honorary Treasurer I have decided not to seek reelection in 1985/86.

In the year prior to my first being appointed, a levy of \$15 was imposed bringing to \$65 the effective subscriptions for 1976/77. With senior fees now being \$75 plus a social levy of \$10, subscriptions have not altered much over the years. During that time the club's financial position has improved remarkably - so it just might be a good time for me to stand down! In those eight years the various Management Committees have applied themselves responsibly in members' interest and I am pleased to have been part of those committees and contributed in some small way to protecting the interests of members.

There are many people who have helped me over the eight years. As any attempt to identify those people will inevitably lead to my unintentionally omitting a name, I will leave it by saying "thanks to everyone".

Similarly an estimate of junior equipment has been included in the Balance Sheet as the stocktake figures were too late for inclusion in the statements.



THIRD GRADE REPORT

The season opened ominously. Day 1 was washed out and when the match commenced the following weekend as a 50 over fixture, the side's total of 67, which incidentally included a partnership of 41 runs for the 7th wicket, suggested that 1984/85 might prove to be one of those seasons we would like to forget - but that wasn't to be! That first match was the team's only loss in the two-day competition and the side's performances during the season were exceptional as can be gauged by its match results:-

Those statistics speak for themselves. In each two-day fixture the side scored more than 200 runs while none of our opponents could manage 200. The team's batting average (28.98) more than doubled its bowling average (14.19) - a fair commentary on the decisive nature of the team's successes. The pattern emerged where in almost every match we batted first, scored heavily and curtailed our opponent's score on the second day. The bad start to the season - a loss with no batting bonus points and only one bowling point placed the side behind all others - even other first round losers. It wasn't until towards the end of the rounds that the side moved near the top of the ladder, eventually finishing second, two points behind the undefeated Weston Creek. The possibility of the final between two sides with only one defeat between them seemed likely, but this was not to be. Eastern Suburbs, which finished 4th after the rounds, defeated Weston Creek in the semi final. However, Wests which defeated Easts in rounds of both

the one and two day competition seemed certain to make it three wins when bad light prematurely ended play in the final. Having finished higher than Easts after the rounds, Wests were declared premiers.

The side's batting throughout the season was quite strong. In the latter matches we had an established pair of openers in Warren Blackshaw and Glenn O'Sullivan and their four partnerships produced 165 (club record), 63, 24 and 76. Glenn unfortunately had missed the early part of the season but on his return he added that reliability at the top of an innings that is so essential for the building of big scores. After a lapse of form in seconds, Warren performed to his ability in the latter rounds and he and Glenn should be looking for second grade selection at the start of next season.

Newcomer Andrew Wilson had one splendid innings of 80 against Woden Valley but generally lacked concentration and confidence. His second season in Canberra cricket will produce scores more in keeping with his ability. The club welcomed back an "old stager", Greg Beacroft and in his few innings he showed us why he has amassed nearly 2000 runs for the club. In his first season as a regular third grader, Shane Bellchambers performed splendidly as attested by his figures. Pace did not seem to worry Shane and more experience against the spinners will see him a higher grade cricketer. Another quiet but effective contributor was Simon Brady whose score of 30 in the final was a fine team effort. Jeff Clark and Rohan Pyne played in most games having varying degrees of success. In normal years Jeff's figures would have seen him a permanent member of the third grade team, and his omission was not so much a reflection on his form but rather on the strength of the side's batting. Rohan made only two scores of any magnitude but his contribution in the final, at a critical time, was significant as also was Glen Croker's in both his matches against Easts. After promising to do so for one or two seasons, Greg Gill put it all together in 1984/85 scoring one century, 88 in another match and justified his elevation to seconds.

The bowling attack which on paper seemed questionable did its part. An untimely injury to Rod Blackshaw and the deserved promotion of Geoff McKinnon denied the attack of much thrust. John Graham and Glen Croker who could not be classed as speedsters performed admirably and were a formidable pair in the last three vital matches. Particular mention should be made

of John's efforts for he was basically a replacement bowler for most of the season. Be that as it may, in the last 4 matches where we played Woden Valley and Easts each twice, his haul of wickets was 18 - an excellent achievement by any standards. Throw in John's safe pair of hands, a splendid innings in the final and you have someone who was a great contributor to a premiership side. Of course when one speaks of all round ability Glen's name must also be to the fore - batting, bowling and fielding. It is fair to assert, however that the spinners dominated the bowling. Between them Gerald Garrity, Geoff Gelding and Donald Pyke took 86 wickets of those that fell to bowlers, Geoff moving into the club's "200" league.

The keeping duties were shared. Andrew Hurst had an excellent year. Apart from his sound keeping, his enthusiasm helped lift the side and his subsequent promotion to second grade was warranted. Jeff Clark, David Cook (who should be encouraged), and Warren Blackshaw each performed capably. The outfielding was not consistent but rose to the occasion in the semi final and final.

The side also contested the one-day competition winning 3 of its 5 matches and being beaten on run rate for a place in the semi final. It was a loss on the second last ball of one match which cost the team a semi final place and perhaps the double!!

In summary it was an enjoyable year. Some of the enjoyment obviously stemmed from the team's success. The side's demeanour on the field reflected great credit on the Club and particularly in those last few critical matches there was that sign of support for each other and the concerted effort which ultimately played a major part in the team's success. Some disappointing aspects of the season should be noted and these included the unavailability of players (we used 32 players this year) and, perhaps associated with that unavailability and certainly evidenced in the first half of the season, the lack of workers to do all those numerous things necessary on Saturday for a game of cricket. However, overall the players can justifiably be proud of their achievements.

It was disappointing that the premiership trophy was not presented to the winning captain at the ground. This procedure - the norm for most sporting events and which had been followed in the past by the A.C.T.C.A.

had reverted in the last few seasons to being conducted some days/weeks after the final at a function. Any delayed presentation is an anti-climax and it is strongly recommended that the trophy be presented at the conclusion of the final.

It would be remiss of me if I overlooked the contribution of Peter and David Cook in the preparation of wickets. The Aranda Oval pitch has never been so well grassed and this did not happen without considerable effort by our honorary curators. It made for good cricket. It is interesting to note that five partnership records were established during the season each on our home pitches. Two of these records did not reach the record book as they were subsequently broken later in the season.

My thanks to all players - it was a grand effort not merely by those who played in the final but by others who played frequently throughout the year. Let's hope the Club doesn't have to wait another eleven years before winning its next third grade competition!

FOURTH GRADE REPORT

The 1984-85 season is perhaps best described as inconsistent. In the first match of the season we defeated last season's premier Weston Creek, only to lose four of our next five games. Over the Christmas period, when unavailabilities meant that a weaker team was fielded, we won five straight matches only to lose the last three rounds and drop from third position to sixth - all in all a fifty percent record.

A Wests fourth eleven has never won a premiership in sixteen years of competition. This time it was certainly not for lack of ability. I am sure that everyone who played in the team knows why we didn't have more success.

It is not because a total of 34 players (over three full teams) represented fourth grade during the season. (Only the skipper played in every game).

It is not because no two sides fielded by fourth grade were ever the same.

It is not even because we gave away over 150 runs in wides and no-balls. (And they are only the ones that weren't scored from.)

Without doubt, the main reason for fourth grades mediocre season was the catching. In one match five easy catches were put down before one was taken, and because of our poor catching we effectively had to bowl sides out twice.

My sympathies rest with the bowlers who toiled hard all season with little assistance from the field. Greg Lalor always gave a hundred percent and deserved every one of his 29 wickets. Jamie Clout improved every match to capture the bowling average narrowly from Greg. Stephen Broadbent made a late entrance into the team but picked up twelve wickets in his four matches, bowling us to an outright victory against Tuggeranong with 5 for 12 in the second innings.

Lack of reliable opening batsmen was another reason for so many of our failures as we were always losing early wickets. No less than

fourteen batsmen were tried in the position with no real success. Frank Jones held down the number three spot for most of the season and did a very good job for the side. He was the only batsman to show any consistency and his 79 out of a total of 126 saved us from a humiliation. Andrew Heath headed the averages with 330 runs at 36.67 including 102 n.o. in the second innings against ANU in a club record second wicket partnership of 209. Andrew and Frank formed the backbone of the side's batting, and apart from these two, only John Graham, Glenn O'Sullivan and Greg Gill performed well before being promoted to higher grades. After a disastrous start to the season Peter Cook came good after Christmas and together with Ajay Mehta added some strength to the lower and middle order.

John Graham (93 runs at 93.00; 4 wkts at 16.00) and Ajay Mehta (200 runs at 18.18; 15 wkts at 24.20) fall into the all-rounder class. Ajay is the sort of player who can turn a game (either way) in the space of a few minutes and whether he is batting or bowling things are never dull. Even in the field he is never quiet and the "black panther" brought about numerous runouts.

In closing I would like to thank everyone who played in the team for their support in my first year as captain. While I still have a lot to learn, I benefitted greatly from this season and there was never a shortage of advice. I look forward to seeing everyone back in September for another enjoyable and hopefully more successful season in 1985-86.

The highlights -

- . Bowling out ANU for 91 after being routed for a miserable 92 and
- . The outstanding talent that was unearthed throughout the season

The most difficult thing about captaining the side was that we were, it seemed, a team of all-rounders. All except the skipper could bowl, no-one could keep wicket and everyone was a number 6 bat. Consequently, players who got a bowl one week missed out the next, and batted 5 one week and 10 the next. I know some were disappointed because of this but I hope they now don't see it as a reflection on themselves but as the only way to make it fair to all.

Top all round performances were handed in by Shane Baird, Amer, Peter Martin and John Taylor all of whom must have been disappointed not to have had a chance in the higher grades. They have now, however, made a name for themselves and should quickly move up the ladder if they so desire. I hope they all decide to stick with cricket and the Wests Club as they are certainly most valuable club members.

Never before have so many 5th Graders attended club practices. Although admittedly we need more training than others, the keenness shown by many, especially John Short and Shane Baird, to improve their game put many club notables to shame. Shorty's improvement in just one year was tremendous and Shane went from dropping sitters early in the season to taking the most catches (11) for the grade.

A fine example of the great team spirit shown this year was vs Norths in a one-day match, when for some reason or another we found ourselves without any opening bats. After the question, "Who wants to open?" was greeted with the usual shuffling of feet, John Taylor (noted for his agricultural cricket) jumped up and offered his services. I was firstly hesitant, but then I couldn't refuse when he also promised that he'd score at least 20. He was out first over for a duck but that's beside the point.

Rob Scott who these days has got mixing family with cricket down to a fine art had another great season - 263 runs, 5 catches, 159 overs, 53 maidens for 21 wickets are magnificent figures on a concrete wicket. If he wished, Rob could be playing seconds but fortunately for us he seems happier to enjoy his cricket and loan his experience to the younger cricketers. Thank you Rob for your assistance and valued advice throughout the season.

In trouble vs Weston Creek (1-101 at tea) I asked (pleaded) if anyone else could roll their arm over. Silence. The individual assault method brought a tiny "well sometimes" from Steve Broadbent who in his 12 overs after tea took 4-14 and sent the Creek crashing to 6-125. We lost but from then on it seemed that everytime he managed to land the ball on the pitch he took a wicket. Learn to disguise that arm-ball a bit better, Steve; persevere as an opener and you'll make a fine all rounder.

Someone should tell Gerard Conway that his polyarmoured bat (the one he's had since Under 8's) hasn't grown in the same proportion that he has. Consequently, enemy bowlers now have a three foot gap between bat and concrete to aim at.

Special mention must go to the club's Under 16 players Mike Treacy and Bill Simotas who played mornings with the juniors and afternoons with us. Without their dedication we would not have made up the numbers on many occasions. In my opinion Bill is easily the most promising bat in the club. Practise more against spin and keep your concentration Bill and you'll find yourself in two's or even one's very shortly. Mike, be prepared to listen to the more experienced club bowlers, try to get rid of that awful slinging action and you'll find your cricket much more enjoyable.

After being again dismissed on a dubious LBW decision I can remember Dave Scott storming off the ground muttering "That's it!" "Never again". After a couple of games break Dave was back again throwing himself around the oval, scoring runs through 1st and 2nd slip and I think enjoying himself once again. Although Dave bats around 10 and rarely bowls he was always the first player selected. His magnificent fielding and ever so safe hands were worth at least 50 runs a game! For your determination, advice and teamsmanship, thanks Dave.

One trait that has occurred in recent years is the practice of attempting railroad tactics by refusing to play if relegated to 5th Grade. Although it's disappointing to see, it's fine by me. I'd rather have a player with no talent who's keen than vice versa. One who belied the trend was Dave Metcalfe. Dave fitted himself into the side without spite and proceeded to bowl his heart out for the club, 66 inspired overs in three innings. I wish the club had more members like him.

The most disturbing thing about the season was the "poor relation" attitude given the 5th Grade by the ACTCA, for example.

- . In a ridiculous decision we played cricket all year on concrete pitches and were forced to play the finals on turf. A situation not dissimilar to playing Rugby Union all year and Rugby League come September. Ironically the 5th Grade final was the only one to be washed out!
- . We were not provided with at least one umpire for the finals, where all second and third grade matches had two umpires
- . We continually had to contend with no change rooms and disgraceful outfields.

I hope the Management Committee in 1985/86 does all it can to ensure that the ACTCA 5th Grade is not treated as the 2nd class citizen it was this year.

Finally, I wish to thank all the 5th Grade players for their support during the season. Everyone of the 37 players who took the field contributed to the team's success during the season. Their enthusiasm and determined approach coupled with their fine sportsmanship enabled the season to be both rewarding and enjoyable.

Thank you to Rob Bradley and Mick Brady for your valuable training programs, and most sincere thanks to all the players in the higher grades who assisted with a few words of advice or a helping hand to the 5th grade players at any time throughout the year and also for putting up with those of us with limited talents.
