

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure that I present this Presidential report as a preface to our Eighteenth Annual Report for the 1986/87 season. Although thrust into the position early in the season, due to the departure of our elected President Wayne Boardman, I must admit I enjoyed the experience and I believe we should all be proud of the Club's achievements during the year.

Season 1986/87 was our first under the revamped management structure and I think all will agree that it worked quite successfully. Although we were unsettled early in the year due to the departure of Wayne and the resignation of Rob Scott, the Management Committee worked tirelessly in its efforts to achieve the goals it set itself at the start of the season.

Each of the directors will report on the various areas later in the report. However, I think the highlights of the year were:-

- . the relationships developed with the Junior Committee and the successful conduct of three "Super" clinics for the various age groups;
- . the relationship developed with Wests Women's Cricket Club;
- . the Third Grade One Day Premiership;
- . the Fourth Grade finishing minor premiers;
- . the First Grade finishing minor premiers and their courageous performance in the final series;
- . the development of a number of younger players in all grades; and
- . the social spirit developed in the club, culminating in a fantastic presentation night.

Although there were many positive things there was a number of aspects which were disappointing and need to be redressed next year.

The operating loss of \$559 was very disappointing. It can be argued that the majority of these funds were invested in Junior Development and equipment. However, the failure of the major raffle to reach expectations and the deficit in projected senior subscriptions were significant factors in the loss.

I would urge all players to look closely at the financial statements in this report to gain an appreciation of what it costs to put 5 open age teams and 24

junior teams in the field during the season. Hopefully in 1987/88 we will not be as tardy with our "subs" and every player will fully support our major fund raising initiatives.

The enthusiasm and organisation of senior practices lost momentum as the season progressed. David Matthews in his dual role as Director - Cricket Management and Chairman of Selectors did a magnificent job throughout the year with little help. Nevertheless, this area needs to be closely examined prior to next season and serious thought should be given to the appointment of a Club Coach. Wicket preparation at both O'Connor and Aranda is another area which needs to be organised on a more formal basis.

I believe the positives outweighed the negatives throughout the year, but we can't rest on our laurels and should be looking to build on the positive aspects and ensure the negatives are eradicated.

At this point I would like to take the opportunity of congratulating the Wests Women's cricket team on their magnificent premiership year in 1986/87. Well done Hall's & Co. I would also like to convey the club's appreciation to the Board and the staff of the Rugby Union Club for their co-operation and assistance during the year.

I sincerely thank all members of the Management Committee for their support, co-operation and efforts during the year. I would particularly like to thank Secretary, David Hunt, for his support and work for the club over the last 12 months. Many of you would not be aware of the work David put into the drafting of the new constitution and placing the club in a position where it is now poised to proceed to incorporation in 1987/88. David is probably the best "recruit" Wests has acquired for some time.

Finally, I would like to place on record my appreciation of the support from my wife, Julie and children, Kate and Lisa, throughout what has been a long but enjoyable season.

Best wishes to everyone for next season.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The year has been one of challenge having to not only adjust to a new constitution, but to also accommodate changes to the Management Committee very early in the season due to the departure of Wayne Boardman and Robert Scott from the team. This meant that a few reshuffles had to be made resulting in a degree of unsettlement in some portfolios. We were indeed fortunate that Ken Norris took the leading role as a result. Meetings were held regularly each month throughout the season, including a number of special meetings. The Management Committee meetings have been well supported with members providing a very valuable and positive contribution to the administration of your club.

There were a couple of disappointments, namely our inability to provide a 6th grade team in the sub-district competition and the major fund raising venture. We can all learn from the lack of success with the raffle. In hindsight our sights were set too high by having an objective which was far beyond our reach. To sell 5000 tickets in the first half of a cricket season, without good attendance at pre-season training proved to be well beyond our means. To those who supported the club in its endeavours, you can be assured that your assistance was most appreciated.

I was particularly pleased to see the level of commitment to Junior cricket and Women's cricket this season. Special thanks to Brian Hall who attended every committee meeting representing the women's team and the affiliated clubs. Many of our junior players gave valuable assistance in times of need and acquitted themselves very well.

The results in the Grade competition were remarkable to say the least. There are very positive signs for the future, particularly with so many players under the age of 21. The ability of the senior side to recover from difficult positions leading up to the finals demonstrated the ability of many players to adapt to the task at hand, and given the experience of this season, will do very well next year. I do believe, however, that there is a need for an experienced team manager for the lower teams in finals. The loss of the fourths in the semi-final could have been avoided by some guidance and direction in the closing stages, and provided a good example of this need. It was very pleasing to see the success of Peter Shea in the senior representative side and also Glen Eveston in the junior teams representative side. Given the calibre of talent in the club there is no reason why other players could also not be successful in the future.

Quite clearly, the costs of running the club this year were quite substantial, notwithstanding the commitment to providing equipment for the juniors. Some form of alternative fund raising must be considered to ensure that the costs to each member are kept to a minimum.

The Western District Rugby Club again offered considerable support to the club and we must thank the Management of the club for its valuable assistance. Neil Davidson was appointed a Director of the Rugby Club this year and our raffles on a Friday night were a big success. Those who gave freely of their time to run the raffles are to be congratulated for their efforts. It seems that once again too few were involved and the assistance of others must be acquired if we are to continue with this successful fund raising venture in the future.

Next season will present a more difficult programme of matches and commitments. It will be a year when the A.C.T.C.A. will be looking for additional assistance to accommodate 1988 championships. Umpires, ground managers and ground preparation will be the main considerations and we must therefore look to our membership for help in this difficult period.

Overall the year has been a very good one. Some changes to the administration will be required in the light of the experience gained this year and to this end we must look to specialist assistance from non-players if we are to continue with the valuable gains which have been made.

Many thanks to Mr G. Garrity for producing our Annual Report, and I must personally extend my sincere gratitude to every member of the club for making my task a lot easier and especially for the way in which I have been accepted into your club. The task of Secretary has been an enjoyable and rewarding one. As a newcomer to the A.C.T. cricket scene, I must also thank Mr R. Hickman, Secretary of the A.C.T.C.A. and other members of the A.C.T.C.A. executive for their assistance and support.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present the 1986/87 financial statements for the Western District Cricket Club.

A perusal of the accompanying financial statements will reveal a deficit of \$559 compared to a surplus of \$943 for the preceding year. Whilst any sort of a "loss" is cause for concern it is believed that with strict control over the club's financial affairs in the coming year the club will continue to be most viable and be in a position to fulfil its basic commitment of providing the opportunity of players to participate in competitive cricket in the ACT.

The club's income for the year was adversely affected by the inability to field a 6th senior side; a reduced sponsorship from the Licensed Club and most importantly the very poor result of the major raffle. The club outlaid some \$3000 in prizes and associated costs to receive a net gain of only \$197. For future fund raising activities the club will have to give serious thought to the apparent inability of members to provide the support needed to make such endeavours successful.

On the expenditure side the increases on last year are seen in a 45% increase in umpires' fees and nearly \$800 costs on junior development, both items being essential to the well being and future of the club. The club also expended significant amounts on cricket equipment for both seniors and juniors. Such expenses are of course a pre-requisite to providing club members with the means of performing to their potential. This is something that club members should bear in mind when they are asked to pay their subs in a timely manner. Of course there are always some delinquents in every club but it would be nice to think that for the following year those members to whom these comments apply might amend their attitudes.

The other significant regular fund raising item was the weekly commission of \$50 from the Licensed Club for the selling and conducting of their Friday night raffle. This amounted to over \$1000 and together with the other various generous commissions received played an important role in enabling our club to meet its financial obligations. I would like to, on behalf of the club, take this

opportunity to express our gratitude to the management of The Western Districts Rugby Club for their continuing financial support.

Obviously with a deficit being the result of the year's activities the club will have to give serious consideration to budgeting at least to break even for the 1987/88 season. This will naturally involve a review of players' subscriptions, more productive fund raising activities and rigorous control of all items of expenditure.

The only other aspect of the accounts that requires special reference is that the club has had to liquidate some \$2000 of its investments to assist in financing its 86/87 activities. Whilst some of this amount may be reflected in increases in stocks of equipment it is important that the club retains some funds in investments, both because it enables the club to be a more viable organisation and because it provides a source of revenue which ultimately reduces the expenses of all the club's members.

In conclusion, I would like to thank Alan Middleton, whom I took over from as Treasurer part way through the year, for helping me 'slot' into the position. I would also like to thank Rob Scott for his advice and assistance in the preparation and presentation of these accounts.

JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT

By any criteria the 1986/87 season was a great success for Wests Juniors. In overall numbers there was a slight increase over the previous season which is significant when it is remembered that many other clubs had reduced numbers. While only one team took out a premiership (the Under 12 Division 1), (Coach John Armstrong) others made semi-finals and two went on to make the finals. These were the 15(1) and 16(4) teams, coached by John Bice and Barry Allan respectively. But cricket is not about winning finals although that obviously has a place. It's about playing and enjoying the game and against that criteria, Wests Juniors had a memorable season.

It was apparent to the Junior Committee that all teams thoroughly enjoyed themselves and played the game in the right spirit. It's significant that not one Wests team was involved in any official dispute or complaint. This reflects admirably on the coaches, managers, players and supporting parents.

Wests fielded eighteen teams during the season and each had a dedicated coach. Coaching junior teams involves a significant commitment particularly in time and I would like to thank all coaches and managers for their unselfish contribution throughout the season.

One of the highlights of the season was the introduction of Kanga cricket, played every Saturday morning at the Canberra High School Oval. Eighty children under the age of 10 years were introduced to cricket via a modified version of Kanga which was tremendously successful. Co-ordinator, Ian White and his team managers should ensure its continuous success. Wests also supported the inaugural Under 17 competition by entering a Division 1 team playing Sunday matches on turf wickets. This provided the opportunity for players in this age group to gain valuable turf experience. The ties with the senior club were very close during the season. A major contributing factor was the dedication of Fred Gill, Senior Vice President, whose role covered development of junior cricket. He has helped forge very close links between the junior and senior bodies to the mutual benefit of all. Three very successful coaching clinics were organised by the senior club for all ages from 10 upwards. At each clinic many Senior committeemen and players gave freely of their time in providing expert tuition. The Junior Committee was very appreciative of this involvement and commitment to the development of the Wests Juniors.

An end of season barbecue and presentation organised by the Junior Committee was enjoyed by all who attended and we were honoured to have 1st Grade Captain Bruce Willett make the presentation of special trophies to the five Wests juniors, who achieved ACT representative honours during 1986/87. COACHING AND JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR'S REPORT - 1986/87

Prior to the commencement of last season the Club committed itself to closing the gap between its junior and senior elements, a matter which has been somewhat neglected in recent years. I believe significant progress has been made, with a much closer liaison now existing. This has been largely achieved through the determination and co-operation displayed by both junior and senior committees, but particularly Ken Norris, Neil Davidson, Dave Hunt, Fred Gill and Eddie Wheeler.

One of the major initiatives was the introduction of coaching clinics, three of which were conducted during the season, covering all age groups. The first two of these were run in November and catered for the Under 12 through to Under 17 teams. The coaching staff comprised visiting English professionals Mike Watkinson and Kevin Hayes, supplemented by Wests players, past and present. The third clinic for Wests Under 10's and 11's was conducted in February entirely by Wests senior players, together with officials of both the senior and junior committees.

At each clinic players were taken through a wide range of skills by the panel and also given an opportunity to put these into practice in the nets, including a session against the club's bowling machine. Following each clinic refreshments were provided by the Club.

The clinics were well received by players and coaches alike. The Club, for its part, is convinced of the benefits to be gained by continuing with such ventures in future years. My thanks go to all who contributed to the sessions. However, special mention must go to Ken Norris, Neil Davidson, Dene Moore, Steve Haynes, Ashley Weston, Warren Blackshaw, Bruce Willett, Dave Matthews, Craig Henderson and Mick Brady.

Other innovations during the season included the attendance of senior players at junior teams' practice sessions and, towards the end of the year, the phasing in of Under 16 players to senior practices. It is important that the gains that have been made this year be consolidated, and built upon in future seasons, to ensure the continued strength of the Club.

CRICKET MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR'S REPORT

As you are all aware the 1986/87 season heralded in a new Club Constitution. One of the major changes incorporated in the Constitution was the revised structure of the Management Committee, with various dedicated portfolios forming that Committee along with the President, Secretary, Vice President and Treasurer.

I had the honour of being elected the first Director Cricket Management and as such present the first report of that position. An examination of the Constitution reveals the Director Cricket Management is responsible for the following:

Selection of Teams; Club Practice; Recruitment; Kit Management; Player Discipline; Team Performances; Match Reports; Liaison with ACTCA Cricket Committee; other duties as determined.

In this report I will endeavour to cover all but the last.

Selection of Teams

A change included in the new Constitution saw the responsibility for appointing selectors passed to the Management Committee. Two provisional selection panels were appointed, both headed by the Chairman of Selectors, to select teams for the first two matches. Thence the normal system involving the Chairman and team captains took over for the remainder.

Finding a body to fill the Chairman of Selectors' role was difficult to the extent that I "volunteered" for the position. So I can report on that aspect first hand. The new provisional selection system worked well, enabling personnel more aware of the standards of respective grades to select teams in the early unsettled part of the season.

Generally speaking selection of teams was not difficult, but knowing who was available, or unavailable, was quite a problem. The Club used 103 players during the season, for 5 teams. Some other interesting (and in some cases worrying) statistics are:

- 18 played only 1 match;
- . 46 played 7 matches or less remember there were 14 rounds of cricket;
- only 9 played all games;
- . 21 players were used in 1st Grade, 27 in 2nd, 30 in 3rd, 32 in 4th and 45 in 5th;

. Neil Davidson was the only player fortunate enough to play in every match - 14 rounds plus semi finals and finals in both 1 day and 2 day competitions.

These statistics provide clear evidence that stability in team composition was missing. The main reason for this was the constant unavailability of players, not the fact that form warranted either promotion or relegation. Naturally 5th Grade suffered the most as did their performances. It became impossible for the team to settle and in particular formulate the basis of a batting order. In the circumstances the 5th Grade results were good and there were some outstanding individual performances. Several junior players were able to be blooded in senior cricket – indeed it was from these players that some of the good performances came. This is healthy for the Club's future. However, there is a real need for more players to be committed to the game if the Club is to improve its standing.

Club Practice

From my point of view this is $\underline{\text{the}}$ problem spot in the Club. Before commenting further, a few more statistics to think about:

- . the highest attendance at a practice session was 52 (on 6 Nov 86) the lowest 12 (on 27 Jan 87);
- . the average attendance for the season was 32;
- of the 38 days practice (Tuesdays and Thursdays only and excluding the last weeks) the best attendees were Ken Norris and Greg Gill with 32 (the worst attendance was 2, but I shall refrain from naming him!)

Overall attendance at practice was good, the problem is that many are not getting out of practice what they really should. In most cases it is not the fault of the individual. All seemed well at the beginning of the season with a trainer appointed - unfortunately the impetus could not be maintained. The setting up of an elite squad to practise alone was successful and the introduction of the bowling machine late in the season even more so. Such systems must be maintained. It is the practise of the lower grades that is cause for concern. It is not my intention to endeavour to provide solutions to the problem in this report, let me say that the Management Committee is well aware of the situation and is examining it now in preparation for next season. Finally, the opportunity is there for you, the players, to put forward suggestions in this regard. The Management Committee is always ready to accept

and consider proposals from any member.

Recruitment

Whilst recruitment is listed as a responsibility of the Director Cricket Management, it is encumbent upon us all to invite new players to the Club. There is a solid junior base and the future is rosy in that regard. We must do all possible to ensure that base is strengthened. This past season has seen several junior players make a mark in senior cricket; hopefully these players, and others, will become the seniors of the future.

Notwithstanding, we should all be on the alert for new players, ability alone not being the sole criteria. We must endeavour to attract committed cricketers.

Kit Management

Maintenance of kits is becoming more and more expensive. The burden this season was eased somewhat because the Club fielded six teams in 1985/86 but only five in 1986/87. A quick glance at the Treasurer's report will nonetheless confirm the high cost of equipment. There is no evidence to suggest misuse of equipment but it is still worthy to mention that it will last longer if treated with care.

It is planned to provide the Treasurer with an estimate of equipment for next season, enabling him to include an element in the proposed 87/88 budget. The cost of equipment of course is a major consideration in determining fees for the season.

Player Discipline

Fortunately no disciplinary action was necessary within the Club during the season. I cannot recall any such action in my time at Wests and this speaks volumes for the character of members. I'm certain the standard will continue.

I was unable to attend many matches during the season but one matter which concerned me was players incorrectly attired. Football socks and caps other than the Wests sky blue are not permissable at Wests. A small matter you may think, but important in a Club.

Team Performances and Match Reports

Despite quite an explicit document being provided to each team by the ACTCA Cricket Committee, spelling out requirements in this regard, I suspect 1986/87 was the worst in my time for neglect. Perusal again of the Treasurer's report will show that several fines had to be paid - there should be none. I must accept responsibility for this neglect, but perhaps it reflects the lack of assistance many players provide to their team captain.

Hopefully the problem can be cured next season - remember any such expenditure must affect Club fees.

Liaison with ACTCA Cricket Committee

The Club had good relationships with the Cricket Committee. There were two instances in particular where the Club disputed alleged misdemeanours, in both cases the Cricket Committee was receptive to our reasoning. This Committee has a daunting task - the running of the competitions - and it is in our interests to assist as much as possible whilst keeping the responsibility to our own members in mind.

Having commented on all my areas of responsibility I would like to conclude by making a few observations on the season. From a cricket viewpoint it was a satisfying season. One could say it is not satisfying unless we win all competitions and the Club Championship - I do not subscribe to that. However, I am certain the Club is not realising its full potential. The Management Committee must examine some areas to ensure the potential is exploited. You, the members, must also examine your commitment to the game.

In conclusion I must say how much I enjoyed the season - I may at times have been a little short with some people, for that I apologise, the circumstances at the time prevailed. Many thanks to many people for assistance, in particular, team captains during the painful selection processes. A special mention to Jeff Clark for his assistance with statistics and to Ron Wilson for accepting the 5th Grade captaincy late in the season. Ron went out of his way to help me and his team-mates and is the epitome of a good clubman.

It was a pleasure to be part of the Management Committee at Wests in 1986/87, I hope all are available to contest the positions for 1987/88. I have no doubt the Club is on the brink of greater things.

This was never more evident than with O'Connor Oval, which was the subject of some controversy through the year. On the whole, however, the pitch at our No. 1 ground, played very well and reached its peak with the Semi-Final match between Easts and Wests in Fourth Grade. Much of the credit for this goes to Scott Wallace and Ken Norris who gave up their time to help prepare the wicket. Both of these guys deserve special praise.

Aranda Oval was once again looked after admirably by the Cook family. The effort both Peter (before his departure to Adelaide) and David (before his departure to Sydney) put into the maintenance and improvement of the pitch at Aranda, brought great credit to themselves. I'm sure both guys would have a future in Greenkeeping should they ever decide to take it up on a permanent basis.

It was significant that ground hires of Aranda and O'Connor increased considerably from last year. This generated much needed additional income to the club.

So to next season and I think the Club will have to look seriously at paying someone to look after the grounds under our control. Having pitches of Grade standard is vital for a successful Club to go forward and win Premierships and develop players coming into Grade for the first time.

In conclusion, I would like to thank everyone who assisted in any way in the preparation of wickets last season and encourage anyone who is interested in helping out next season to contact me as soon as possible.

WOMEN'S CRICKET

WESTS WOMEN ARE PREMIERS

Things seemed to go right for Western District Women's Cricket team all through the season. They were amongst the most enthusiastic when the ACTWCA squad began its preparations, and 6 of Westies players were selected in the ACT representative team which participated in the Australian Championships in Perth in January. They were Glenda Hall (who was appointed Captain of the team), previous representative players Krystin Brown, Kate Driscoll and Leanne Pepper, and newcomers to the representative scene Kathy Bryant (wicket keeper) and Sarah-Jane Moore. All contributed well to the ACT's best ever performance at the Nationals by beating South Australia and Queensland to finish in fourth position. Glenda's spin bowling tally of 15 wickets made her the third highest wicket taker at the Championships and earned her a place in an Australian squad from which a team for India was to be chosen; unfortunately India subsequently withdrew the invitation.

Even though the absences of these representative players while at practice matches and in Perth depleted the strength of the team, we had recruited well and always managed to field a full team. One of the most pleasing aspects of the season was the improvement in the younger members who shouldered the responsibilities well and ensured that we were on top of the ladder when the representative players returned. Wests finished the season as Minor Premiers and went on to win the Premiership with a substantial 295 to 96 win over XI in the final.

Wests were well represented in the Association Awards at end of season. Leanne Pepper finished second in the batting averages (aggregate 262 at average of 65.50) and opener/keeper Kathy Bryant finished third (aggregate 214 at average of 42.80). Westies Heather Drew took out the bowling award with 34 wickets for 202 at an average of 5.94. With these figures as well as a batting average of 29.00 Heather was also awarded the Sarah Hodgson Trophy as the best first year talent in women's cricket.

VALE - MR BARRY ANDREWS

Barry Andrews passed away 15 May 1987 aged 44 years.

Barry played 63 games for Wests between 1975/76 and 1980/81. He scored 1231 runs at an average of 19.23, took no wickets for 20 runs off the only 7 overs he bowled for the club and made 14 catches.

Statistics could never describe the man that Bazza was, although he probably could have provided the above figures to you, correct to the third decimal place. Barry had an amazing memory for cricket statistics and could quote, with unerring accuracy, performances of Test and club cricketers and games from the past.

He was an enigma in some ways though. Despite the sharpest of wits, an incomparable memory for sporting history and a high intelligence, he had trouble remembering to bring a towel for his shower after the game and could rarely find all his gear at the end of the day.

Barry, although not the greatest stroke player, used his skills with a relish and enjoyment out of his sheer love of the game. Few players prized their wicket more than he did and many an opposing bowler has cursed that dour red-headed batsman that had to be dug out. His moment of glory was an outstanding 99 against Queanbeyan at O'Connor in 1975/76, an innings full of cuts and drives of the highest calibre.

In days when 150 was a winning score, Barry averaged around 20 as an opener and saw Wests away to the solid starts that helped the team become a dominant force in A.C.T. cricket during his years with the Club.

Barry was a true team man and loved all aspects of the game, from the on-field combat to the special camaraderie of post-match discussions and reminiscing over a late night port.

Outside the cricket world Barry was a distinguished personality in the field of Australian literature as a true authority, lecturer and author. Barry had an intense interest in all things uniquely Australian and belief in an Australian identity.

Barry is survived by his wife Robyn and four children Naomi, Luke, Rebecca and Sarah. He also leaves behind a large number of cricketing mates who will fondly remember playing with and against him and having the privilege of calling him friend.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

The season recently completed has been described as "the season that almost was!" On face value this statement may well be true considering we were beaten in the grand final. However, we did win the minor-premiership and I don't believe being beaten in a grand final generally means a lack of success, providing you have done your best of course. I believe we did our best and the mere fact that we reached that far was a credit to our side, especially considering we were virtually a 'spent force' until the final round. As a captain, that very point was the most pleasing aspect of the season. The ability to pick ourselves up off the floor so late in the season and finish so powerfully is a sporting trait displaying not only character and ability but a great deal of the old 'guts and determination'.

Our performances in the last round against Queanbeyan and in the semi-final against Weston Creek were nothing short of brilliant; proving the sheer ability of the side. The side's batting talents finally showed its true potential and this was a major factor in our success during these games. This, of course, is not to suggest that our bowling attack had not performed well. It did so, as it had done all season, in unresponsive conditions. However, it was our batting that let us down for the majority of the season. There were, and perhaps still are, many theories why! A lack of stability and/or inappropriate positioning in the batting order, wicket conditions, umpiring decisions, luck or a combination of all these to varying degrees may have had an impact, but I believe we lacked consistent application. The fact that, until the final round, we were unable to bat for a total day is proof of this point. The application shown by Don Pyke is an ideal example, and one that most of us did not really notice until the final round.

The side's bowling attack was consistently an ideal blend of spin and pace, and proved itself to be the best in my opinion. Even though we lost Mick Brady towards the end of the season, and Greg Besomo for a part, it was our attack with its accurate performances that always kept us within strking distance of the minor premiership.

In the grand final, a small forty-five minute batting session was the cause of our defeat. It is very difficult to recover from 4-32 and chase a total of 300, especially in a grand final. To the credit of the middle to latter order, especially Neil and Darryle, we kept going against the odds to finish with 240 odd. The session not only lost us the game, but perhaps the most disappointing

aspect for me was the slipping back into our old batting ways which had tended to plague us for most of the year. I really thought we had progressed passed such collapses. We had toiled so very hard in the field in that game and it was a great shame to finish that way.

The quality of a side's fielding performances are, to a large part, dependent upon the quality of the 'keeper'. A consistently very good 'keeper' will produce consistently very good general fielding performances. I am pleased to report that such a situation occurred in our first grade side this year. Perhaps at times we were less 'mobile' than we should have been, but on more occasions we displayed flashes of brilliance.

If I have tended to separately analyse our batting, bowling and fielding, it is not meant to imply that we did not function as a single unit. Indeed I believe the main reason for our success was our ability to operate as a 'champion team' as opposed to a 'team of champions'. This is also the reason I have chosen not to single out the performances of particular individuals; for the most part anyway. Providing we maintain the same players and play every game as we did the final round and semi-final, then we will truly be the champion team of the ACT next season.

In closing, I would like to sincerely thank the players in the first team for their support in making the 1986-87 seaons the most enjoyable I have had in the ACT. I would also like to thank the constant support of the club's competent administration and other club members. Further, I would congratulate our supporters who showed the other clubs just how to behave properly at cricket matches, especially during the finals.

I look forward very much to next season.

THIRD GRADE REPORT

Season 1986/87 was a mixed one for the thirds. Whilst the highlight was winning the one day competition there was a feeling of 'if only' about the two day competition in which we finished sixth, but only six points behind fourth placed Easts, the eventual premiers.

The side was captained in the first three rounds by Glenn O'Sullivan and thanks go to him on behalf of the team for his efforts. Unfortunately, rain in the first round prevented a result against Woden. The next match against City, an eventual semi-finalist was another lost opportunity to secure valuable points. Steve Broadbent took 5/26 in their innings of 123. The best of the West's bats in reply were Heath 36, O'Sullivan 28 and David Cook also 28 in an apparently big hitting effort which failed by the smallest possible margin to grab victory. In round 3, batting first we managed a meagre 136 with a solid 30 from Glenn O'Sullivan the only respectable score. but a determined effort in the field to back-up the bowling of Tony Williams 5/51 and Andy Harbick 4/35 managed to restrict Weston Creek to 118 sending Glenn off to Sydney on a winning note.

Round 4 saw another poor batting performance, with a total of only 123 in which David Cook swung lustily for 42 after coming in at 7/73. In reply Ginninderra made 141 but only after they too had staged a late-order recovery. At one point they were 6/73 but dropped catches and plain bad luck, including the breaking of Peter Wyche's nose, let them off the hook. Tony Williams 5/56 off 22 overs was again the best of the bowlers in a game we should have won.

Thus at the break in the 2-day competition after 4 rounds we had notched just the one win, a draw in a washed-out game where it was reasonable to expect a Wests win, and two narrow losses. Had any one of those missed opportunities been converted to a Wests victory, a semi-final place at season's end could have been assured.

The one day competition opened with an easy victory. Woden could manage only 89 with Andy Harbick 4/19, David Metcalfe 2/16 and Beauchamp 2/20, all off 10 overs, and James Clout 2/7 off 5 doing the damage. In reply we achieved the win in 26 oversfor the loss of 3 wickets. Steve Taylor dominated with an attractive 58. In the next round ANU compiled 149 with Metcalfe 2/22 off 10 being the pick

of the bowlers, but again we lost only 3 wickets in passing the total set. Rohan Pyne did well for 29 and then Andy Harbick 51 n.o. and Geoff McKinnon 18 n.o. guided us home with steady, well paced batting. In the third game Tuggeranong scored only 90, Tony Williams 4/23 off 10 wrecking the top order and Rohan Pyne cleaning up the tail with 3/6 off 7 overs. The required runs were achieved in 28 overs, again for the loss of only 3 wickets. The early batsmen chased victory steadily but Dave Cook came in at the fall of the third wicket and put an early end to the match with a typically big hitting knock of 27 n.o.

The first match after Christmas, a one-dayer against Weston Creek on 3 January was a total washout, an appropriate result for a game I believe should never have been scheduled given its timing in relation to the Xmas/New Year break, the inability to organise training sessions over that period and the huge number of unavailabilities. I did not envy David Matthews' task of organising teams at that time.

To the fifth one-day game, against Queanbeyan, and we were already assured a semi-final berth. It was thus decided to reverse the tactic to date, i.e. sending the opposition in after winning the toss. Things were going well at 2/82 (Dave Burge 23 and Geoff McKinnon 25) before the regular collapse which saw us all out for 107. Nevertheless, the bowlers worked hard to have Queanbeyan 6/61 before they recovered to a fairly easy win, losing only one more wicket in the process. Dave Metcalfe 3/16 and Rod Blackshaw 2/22, both from 10 overs, made the early breakthrough.

Having obtained a one-day semi-final berth against Easts we first had to meet that Club in a two-dayer. Easts managed the good total of 236 with Dave Metcalfe 4/58 (24 overs), Rod Blackshaw 4/44 (20 overs) and Jamie Clout 2/42 doing the bulk of the work. Obtaining a target of that size was not out of the question but it required big scores from at least a couple of players. Once again our middle order weakness was exposed and although several batsmen made starts (Frank Jones 21, Beauchamp 20 and Steve Broadbent 26 n.o. from number 6) none went on to the necessary high totals, although Jamie Clout 45 and Dave Metcalfe 21 hit out boldly to push the total to a reasonable 171 but we were never really in the hunt, and in fact from 7/76 it was a good effort by Steve, James and Dave to avoid the follow-on.

With only the one win from 5 games we were in the position of having to virtually win the last four games, three at least, to reach the finals. Although Norths made 211 we were confident that weather permitting we could achieve that target. Steve Broadbent was at last able to be given the opportunity to bowl in circumstances suited to him and he did well with 6/80 off 25 overs. Tony Williams 3/40 also plugged away successfully on a dead track. Bill Simotas, up from 4ths, and Steve Matthews, also a regular 4th grader, were virtually thrown in at the deep end but they did a tremendous job with an opening partnership of 59 before Steve was unfortunately run out. Bill and Geoff McKinnon, who each scored 62, built on that partnership and with useful contributions from Dave Metcalfe 23, Dave Matthews (temporarily out of retirement) 18 and Steve Broadbent 18 n.o. we got home with the loss of just 5 wickets.

The Australia Day holiday brought the one-day semi-final. Again the toss was won and Easts sent in without hesitation. Although 1/0 after 2 balls they recovered well to 2/58, but persistence by the bowlers, well backed by hard work in the field, allowed us to wrest the initiative. Easts lost wickets steadily from then on to be 9/132 at the end of their time. Clout 4/32 and Metcalfe 2/28 did the damage in terms of wickets but all bowlers bowled tightly to restrict the opposition to such a moderate total. In reply, Marcus Cosgrave showed his true ability. He had been down on form but his display in taking to an experienced and quite formidable third grade attack was brilliant. He was out for 45 of an opening partnership of 70 with Dave Burge. Dave also came good at the right time and he took up the cause with Geoff McKinnon to clinch an easy victory. Dave was eventually out for 57 and Geoff was 23 n.o. in the total of 2/134 off 35 overs.

Round 7 of the two-day competition saw us off to a good start, being 4/224 before the inevitable collapse caused us to be all out 250, albeit striving to build a big score as quickly as possible with the aim of an outright victory in mind. Bill Simotas carried on his good form with 104, the sole third grade century for the Club this season, and he was supported by Frank Jones 41 and David Cook 32. Tuggeranong were all out for 157, Steve Broadbent again doing well with 4/59 supported by Beauchamp 3/10. We then attempted to quickly score runs hoping to get an opportunity to again dismiss Tuggeranong. However, we went silly and lost 6 wickets in adding 48 runs before declaring, setting a target of 142 runs off 24 overs. To their credit Tuggeranong took up the challenge and

achieved victory in the last over for the loss of only 5 wickets. It was disappointing to suffer an outright loss but nothing ventured, nothing gained.

It was then into the one day grand final against Weston Creek. Again we won the toss and asked them to bat hoping that the so far successful formula would be successful again. Everyone worked hard in the field, Marcus Cosgrave and Greg Gill leading the way, and Andy Harbick 3/44 and Clouty 2/32 leading the bowling. Creek reached a total of 180, which whilst achievable, gave them something to defend and was never going to be easy. The stage was set for a good match but with Marcus Cosgrave continuing his beligerent form things were looking good. But after his dismissal for 77 (3 \times 6s, 7 \times 4s) with the score 4/107, things went downhill fast. The obligatory middle order collapse occurred, aided by poor running between the wickets (the writer pleads guilty) and some dubious umpiring decisions. At 8/144, with overs running out, our heads were hung low as all looked lost. But Dave Metcalfe had other ideas. He chanced his arm and was rewarded with 29 invaluable runs, backed up well by Tony Williams in a 9th wicket partnership of 36, before his dismissal - 9/180. Rod Blackshaw came in and only needed a single score in the last 3 balls, and although he finished 0 n.o., scampering through for a bye off the last ball, it will no doubt remain as one of Rod's most valuable and memorable innings.

It was truly an exhilarating and unforgettable moment when victory was achieved. The celebrations afterwards weren't bad either! For the record the premiership team was - Marcus Cosgrave, Steve Broadbent, Geoff McKinnon, Greg Gill, Andy Harbick, David Cook, Garry Beauchamp, James Clout, Tony Williams, Dave Metcalfe and Rod Blackshaw. Dave Burge was unavailable.

On a high from that win we then needed wins over the top two sides, ANU and Queanbeyan to clinch a semi-final berth. A washout on the first day of the ANU game turned that into a one-dayer. ANU batted strongly to notch 8/218 and when rain again interrupted, to force a draw, we were struggling at 5/125 with not a lot of overs left. Andrew Hurst topscored with a bright 36. Against Queanbeyan, they notched 203 which we were confident of passing. However, the middle order rot had permeated the top order and we were quickly 7/46 with only Andy Harbick standing firm. With support from Clout and Metcalfe the situation improved markedly but was still hopeless at 9/115. Peter Martin, in his only 3rd grade game of the year, joined Andy and combining solid defence with discreet hitting

made 31 before the last wicket fell at 189, just 14 runs short of victory. Once again Andy was left not out, this time on an excellent 73. It was decided to continue the match as achieving an outright win was then our only hope of making the finals. Queanbeyan came to the party, declaring at 1/76 after 11 overs and setting us 91 to win in 9 overs. That was achieved in a flurry of hitting aided by some generous bowling, but for the loss of 8 wickets.

We left that game with a faint hope of having secured a berth but a narrow win by Easts and an outright by Norths ended our chances. It was of course disappointing to miss out as we felt that had we got there we would have given the premiership a big nudge. After all the two-day premiership is the real prize - it's what we play for over the majority of the season.

Lack of depth in the middle order batting was undoubtedly our big weakness but mention should be made of Andy Harbick and Geoff McKinnon who both possess sound technique and temperament and often carried the batting. Perhaps both will be given more opportunity next season to demonstrate their ability. To a lesser extent the lack of a strike pace bowler was another weakness. The attack was steady and persistent as shown by the statistics, with Dave Metcalfe, Tony Williams, James Clout and Steve Broadbent carrying the load but the availability of a strike bowler would have assisted and eased the burden on those bowlers, particularly Dave Metcalfe who had to fill that role. Perhaps Michael Barnes after a big first senior season in 4ths can step up to fill the breach.

Several of the younger players performed exceptionally well which is of course a good sign for the future. They include Steve Broadbent who when able to settle down to long spells showed obvious talent and as he gains confidence in his ability he should progress in the difficult art of leg-spinning - the opportunities are certainly there for him to grab; Dave Metcalfe a strong left arm pace bowler headed the attack and cleaned up the 3rd grade and Club bowling awards, yet still has plenty of room for improvement so his potential is enormous. Marcus Cosgrave who if he applied himself consistently could properly utilise his obvious ability; Bill Simotas who demonstrated a good technique and the ability to achieve big scores; and David Cook who before his departure to university in Sydney showed considerable ability with excellent work behind the stumps and with his big hitting - he was a much underrated cricketer. With encouragement and proper guidance I am confident those players could progress

within the Club.

Overall it was a most enjoyable season, at least for my part. I was reluctant to take over the captaincy when Gleno left thinking it might be difficult amongst such a young group. As it turned out it was one the most enjoyable seasons I have had and I thank all Thirds players for their efforts, on the field and off in ensuring a great team spirit. I would also like to thank those who assisted in pitch preparation at Aranda, particularly Dave Cook and Steve Broadbent, and David Matthews for his efforts in organising teams each match.

It is hoped that, having tasted premiership success, the players' appetites will have been whetted and that greater success will follow, in 3rd Grade and for the Club generally.

FOURTH GRADE REPORT

The 1986-87 cricket season proved to be a highly successful year for 4th Grade. The side won the minor premiership in the two-day competition and just missed the semis in the one-day. The disappointment of an 8 run loss to Easts in the semis, could not overshadow a great year.

The season began well, firstly a washout versus Woden where David Cook blasted 87 in just under an hour in an innings that included 7 sixes. The following match set the trend for the rest of the season with City being bowled out for 17 in their first innings so that we went on to win outright.

The side just went from strength to strength from this point. There was the last over win against Ginninderra and although still beaten, the fightbacks against Queanbeyan were unbelievable. At various stages in the match the side was 8 for 58 and 9 for 87 and in reply Queanbeyan were 2 for 110. They ended up winning the match by one wicket.

This showed a great deal of character for what was a very young side. In one match the oldest player in the side was 22 and never throughout the season were there more than 2 or 3 players over this age.
