

W.D.C.C. member. I am confident I have this support and that it will be sustained. Without this support, my efforts on your behalf lose much impact and credibility.

I thank the members of the Management Committee for their contributions to the running of the Club during the year. I am particularly grateful to Peter Murray and Gerry Garrity. Russ Rogers, Dene Moore and Alan Grigg should also be "mentioned in despatches"! The need for an active and enthusiastic administrative structure is no less evident than in the past. It would be remiss of me if I did not extend my sincere thanks to Secretary/Manager and Vice-President Bernie Ashmore of the Club Inc. for his active support during the season. Special thanks are also extended to the Board of Directors of Club Inc. for their generous support during the season. I would particularly thank the Board for its support for our proposed synthetic practice pitches at Aranda. We hope to have these in before the start of next season. I am hopeful our proposal will have the support of the Department of the Capital Territory and all Club members.

Finally, I would again refer to the obvious and perhaps most disturbing aspect of cricket in Canberra - the costs! We must make a conscious effort to improve our "productivity" by becoming more efficient through cost reductions and revenue generation. I commend this aspect for your consideration. Let us reduce the cost to the Club of every dollar we raise - the benefits are obvious!

In the absence of a coup d'etat, I look forward to another successful year in 1979/80 (must oil the shotgun!). If next year is as rewarding as the last four seasons, we all have much to look forward to. At the risk of incurring the wrath of my Board colleagues at the Club Inc., I look forward to seeing you in the "Cricketers Lounge", underneath "photo" alley at the Club Inc.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The season was highlighted by the winning of the First Grade

Premiership for the third time in four seasons; the Club Championship;

the Second Grade Minor Premiership, as well as making the semi-finals in all

four grades - a fine performance on the field in the Club's tenth

anniversary season.

The season saw the abolition of district cricket as such and a consequent movement of players among clubs. Presumably this allowed players to move to the club where they would best fulfil their own ambitions. The Management Committee endeavoured to maintain even greater emphasis on "district cricket" in its relations with the Junior Club. Undoubtedly junior cricket will still provide the bulk of players for most grade clubs in the future and the Club should maintain such a policy.

Two new clubs, Ginninderra and Weston Creek entered the ten team third and fourth grade competitions. This caused anomalies in the draw in which only 13 matches were played in all four grades, and two complete rounds were not possible. The deliberate increase in the number of two-day matches was partly responsible for the anomalies and it may be more desirable in future for each team to meet in a one-day and two-day match wherever possible.

The Canberra City and Suburban Cricket Association was formed to independently manage and control sub-district cricket. Although the Club lacked the numbers for a sub-district team, it may well be desirable to have a one-day team in the future. However there must always be a guaranteed number of players to ensure a regular team.

Social functions on an organised basis were limited. It seems that most members are not in favour of such activities, and only the

pre-season gathering at the Wests Rugby Club was reasonably well attended. Other events included a juniors/seniors/coaches cricket day and a film night. Both proved very successful for those who attended, but the numbers were very disappointing from all groups. Unless there is a strong desire for additional social activities the Committee recommends they be kept to a minimum.

The preparation of both practice and match wickets again proved to be a major task for the Club. As has been the case in recent seasons the work load again fell on too few people. In many cases it was the same people who also participated in other duties for the Club. It can be said yet again that too many members merely play and practise and do not contribute in any way to the maintenance of the Club. The standard of practice at both grounds declined markedly and the facilities available barely survived the season. The Management Committee has been investigating the possibility of synthetic practice wickets and further information should be available at the Annual General Meeting. The possible introduction of such facilities will not lessen the contribution all members must make.

A system of rostering members of the Committee to supervise practice sessions was introduced but failed to function effectively. The Committee must in the future accept responsibility for the introduction of an effective and useful system of practice. There is little value in undirected and unsupervised practice where members do not get the chance to use their available time and gain some value from practice.

Overdue subscriptions and other monies were a constant problem to the Committee throughout the season. The Treasurer will report on this matter in more detail. However the Committee was concerned that certain members in all grades did not choose to meet the often-publicised deadlines for payments. As a result those members who met their obligations subsidised the unfinancial members for most of the season. The Committee considers that greater penalties and effort in meeting our commitments are needed for the future.

JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT

Once again, Wests Juniors with nineteen teams, fielded the largest representation of any club in the A.C.T. junior competition. The club's policy of putting teams into the highest practicable divisions resulted in our being represented in the first division of every age-group (the only club in Canberra with this distinction).

I believe that this season saw greater co-operation between the juniors and their officials and the parent club, but we still have some way to go along this road. The matches on the 10th Anniversary cricket day involving both the older junior boys and the coaches with the senior members of the club were particularly useful. The club film night on 28 February, on the other hand, was a disappointment. On that occasion, as when the junior committee organised mid-week functions, we quite failed to obtain significant parental support.

The results achieved by our junior teams during the season were satisfying without being, in the aggregate, spectacular. Of our nineteen teams, four - Under 16I, Under 12I, Under 12II, and Under 10I took out their premierships while Under 13II were defeated in the final. Doubtless there would have been more had we not followed our policy of representation in the higher divisions. We have no regrets. While we congratulate the Premiers, it is just possible that some of the less successful teams had more fun.

Although mention of names is invidious, I must express my gratitude to Terry Hudson for his most efficient conduct, for the third successive year, of the onerous task of Kit officer, and for his undertaking to continue next year. Congratulations are due to Tom Goynich for again coaching the Under 16 Division I premiers, and to David Garrity on receiving the annual award for the best all-round junior cricketer in the A.C.T. It would be remiss not to thank Gerry Walsh for accepting election as Senior Vice-President, Juniors for 1979-80, and for his unfailing support over the past two years.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

It is pleasing to report that as a result of the year's activities the Club is in a far stronger financial position than in 1978. This was achieved despite equipment being stolen from both Aranda and O'Connor ovals.

The Juniors increased subscription rates for the first time for several years. In so doing, they were able to procure better gear which though initially being far more costly will be of long-term economic advantage in that the equipment will last for much longer and more than justify the initial outlay.

The Senior subscription rates remained unaltered for the third successive year, though there was a variation in the method of payment as foreshadowed in last year's report. The new scheme involved a surcharge for late payment. The purpose of this innovation was not to produce revenue but rather to act as an inducement for members to meet their obligations as and when they fell due. This method generally brought the desired result and for the first time in many years the Club, in the main, was able to meet its commitments as they were incurred. Members are reminded that for far too long the Club has become dependent on its Junior players who pay their subscription rates in full some three weeks prior to the start of the season. This has meant that moneys raised from this source have been applied for the benefit of the Seniors. It is considered equitable that the Senior's subscription rates be payable at the commencement of a cricket season. To this end the management committee is currently looking at early collections again in 1979-80 with a more positive incentive method being explored.

Financial support of the Western District Rugby Union Club Inc.
was again appreciated and we in turn, increased contributions from
\$180 to \$325 to provide financial support to Schoolboy and Junior players
chosen to represent the A.C.T. in the Australian Carnivals. Weekly
raffles at the Rugby Club netted \$578 and helped to boost funds considerably
while the successes of the stalls at the representative fixtures (\$471)
were extremely satisfying. The attention of members is drawn to the
Income and Expenditure account where due to our preparing wickets at
Aranda and O'Connor, the Club was \$1,306 better off than if it had used
grounds prepared by the Department of the Capital Territory. To the many
players who assisted in the raffles, stalls and preparation of wickets,
the Club is sincerely indebted.

Because of the overall improvement in finances it may be possible to marginally reduce Senior subscriptions for 1979-80. This can only be achieved if fund raising continues, but in an era of inflation even a marginal reduction will be a significant achievement. suggest that all the Club's financial problems have been solved. has been a retrieval of the declining position of some years ago but caution must be exercised to prevent the position receding. was able to procure new equipment - principally balls - to the tune of This will materially assist finances \$1,300 at the end of this season. in the coming year though it must be borne in mind that as we have 23 teams the procurement is not as significant as may first be thought. Perhaps in time we shall be able to complete a season with a complete supply of equipment for the following year in hand and still have some funds in reserve. It is considered that we are getting nearer that goal.

FIRST GRADE

The first grade side won their third flag in four years when the Grand Final was cancelled without any play on the second day. At this stage Wests were 0-9 in reply to South Woden's 174. Despite this somewhat anti-climactic finish to the season our win was a just reward for a fine season's cricket. We finished twenty-one points clear of the field and lost only one game during the season.

Whereas the previous years' batting had been brittle this year we were consistently able to put together winning scores. This factor combined with a strong opening attack, solid support bowling and safe fielding were the reasons for our success.

We did have some difficulty with the opening batting positions and although Barry Andrews played most of the year in firsts he didn't really find form and finished in seconds. Alistair Meek started in firsts, an experience which will stand him in good stead for the future, but still has some work to do to maintain a regular place. Steve Marshall was a great improver as the season went on and finished with 195 runs at 19.5. Steve's patience and application were a model for everyone.

At number three Greg Beacroft put together nearly 300 runs at around 27 highlighted by a fine 79 against South Woden. Greg still needs to curb an early rashness but has the potential and the enthusiasm to make it. At four Tony Irvine had a great year with 429 runs at about 26. Displaying a great deal of responsibility Tony was prepared to wait for the loose ball and graft runs when required. Tony started the year with a fine century against A.N.U.

Terry Khan was the find of the year! In his first year at Wests he put together 353 runs at 50 each including a 91 not out and a 68 not out, took 12 catches and took 30 wickets at 12.8. Terry is as keen a player as I've ever seen - he trains hard, gives nothing away and keeps the side on its toes all the time. His efforts were rewarded with an A.C.T. cap. Terry has plenty of cricket left and I wouldn't be surprised to see him to do even better next year.

Col Rowe didn't make many really big scores but still managed
242 runs at 22, including a slashing 57 against Woden which clinched
an outright victory. Despite missing early games Russell Rogers showed
some good form after Christmas including a fighting 32 in the semi-final.

Glen Croker forced his way into first grade with consistent scores in the seconds and showed enough to stamp him as a player of the future. I hope Glen can keep his head down and realise this talent. Bruce Willett had limited opportunities but scored a fine 26 opening up in the semi-final.

It can be seen that the batting had plenty of depth.

In the bowling department our opening attack had a fine season with Dene Moore taking 58 wickets and Andy MacDonald 31 wickets.

Andy deserved more wickets but there were quite a few days when the opposition just couldn't put a bat on him. Considering the personal pressures on Andy during the year his effort was unbelievable and earned the admiration of all his team mates. His talent was further recognised in that he was consistently the first "quickie" picked for the A.C.T. side.

Howard Lipscombe started in firsts but was edged out by Mal Hall who finished with 18 wickets in firsts including a magnificent 5/61 in the grand final. Terry Khan's off-spinners made a big difference to the attack and his accuracy supporting the pace bowlers gave us the tightest attack in town. Terry realises the need to give the ball more air and the benefits of attacking more often and can only improve. Geoff Gelding played most of the season in firsts but suffered from a lack of opportunity with his "leggies" and the selectors decided to look to an extra batsman for the finals. Geoff accepted this and was a fine team player during the year.

While on the subject of bowlers, I would like to pay tribute to Greg Beacroft who took 2/28 in the semi-final in virtually his first bowl for the year. This was at a time when all our dedicated work was being threatened by two untimely injuries to Andy and Mal. In fact I thought that our semi-final win was a tribute to our fighting ability.

Both Bruce Willett and Col Rowe wicket-kept during the season.

Representative fixtures (including the Australian Under 19 side) made in-roads into Bruce's available time and Col took over at about the half-way mark to give his usual polished display. Bruce is considering playing in Sydney next season and we all wish him luck for the future.

We are also losing Mal Hall who has been transferred in his job. Mal has been with us for four years and has proved a most valuable medium pacer, hard hitting late order batsman and safe fieldsman. He will be sorely missed.

In summary, the team deserved its win with a strong competitive spirit and keen practice habits complementing an abundant level of skill. These attitudes served to make the season enjoyable for all concerned and augur well for the future. At present the team has a fair balance of experience and youth but there is a need for all to continue to recognise their respective responsibility to the team.

THIRD GRADE

At the commencement of the season the third grade team began with a large proportion of fourth graders from the previous season, but after a poor start the team slowly developed into a fairly capable combination.

In a strong ten team competition, with Weston Creek and Ginninderra entering grade ranks for the first time with their top sides playing in third grade, we gradually worked our way up the ladder, making the four after round 11 for the first time during the season, and then just hanging on to fourth place for the finals, despite strong challenges from Woden and Ginninderra. This was the seventh season in succession that Wests' thirds had made the finals.

The team had a good blending of youth and experience among the regular players, with Alan Grigg, Mick Hromow, Eric Delaney and Tony O'Connor - a newcomer to the Club - forming the nucleus of the side. They received good support from younger players such as batsmen Peter Bradley and Justin Reed, who both had previous senior experience, but this season matured enormously and proved to be valuable middle order batsmen who should continue to improve in the coming season; and David Ayre and Steve Bryant who both commenced in the seniors this season starting in fourth grade but showing good form in thirds in the second half of the season. They will benefit from their initial season in grade ranks and should also progress further next season.

The batting was led by Eric Delaney who was an instant success in his new role as an opener scoring 54 n.o. against City in an unbeaten opening stand of 92 with Alan Grigg which established a new first wicket partnership record for the club's third grade team. Eric had other good scores of 38 and 37 and four innings in the 20's to take out the side's batting trophy Alan Grigg was among the runs as with 271 runs at an average of 20.85. usual, totalling 225, with his best scores being 57, 34 n.o., 26 and 25. Peter Bradley had a successful season scoring 263 runs which included a 41 n.o. in the early match against Ginninderra and a 40 under pressure in the semi-final. Peter also had four scores in the 20's and I am sure that in the future he will build on these good starts and we will see some big Rob Bradley played in only five matches but still scores from him. managed 213 runs including a great 101 which was the basis of the team's total of 295 in the second match against Ginninderra. This proved to be a match-winning effort in a game vital to the team's finals prospects. It was unfortunate that Spud had to leave the club towards the end of the season when he was in such good form, but we wish him well in his studies

and hope that he might return to Wests in the future.

Other batsmen among the runs were Garry Beauchamp with 251 and Justin Reed with 183 which included a 49 n.o. and several other not out innings when Justin was looking set for some big scores. Tony O'Connor with 197 runs took half a season to settle into Canberra cricket but after Christmas he really fired with some powerful knocks, the highlight being his hard-hitting 65 against Queanbeyan in round 12 which, in a new third grade record seventh wicket partnership of 84 with Steve Bryant (32 n.o.) saved the team from defeat at the hands of the bottom side, which would have ended our final's hopes.

Eric Delaney proved himself a fine all-rounder carrying the brunt of the bowling with his medium pacers and finishing the season with 30 wickets. Eric's best performance was 7/44 against City, the same game in which he scored his 54 not out, completing a great double. Other good performances from Eric were 5/21, 5/47 and 4/26. Garry Beauchamp won the team's bowling average taking 27 wickets at an average of 9.33, with best performances of 7/38, 4/22 and 4/38. When available Phil Mitchell bowled with plenty of fire and formed a good opening attack with Eric, but unfortunately he played only five games in which he took 17 wickets, with his best efforts being 5/40 and 3/7 against Weston Creek, and 4/37 against ANU. Other leading wicket takers were medium pacers Mick Hromow with 16, including 5/26 off 20.3 overs against Queanbeyan, Tony O'Connor with 12 and Steve Bryant - who always bowled well without much luck - and Max Wilson with 10 wickets each.

Alan Grigg's form behind the stumps was excellent with 10 catches and 4 stumpings, and he was rewarded by promotion to second grade for several games. On those occasions Andrew Hurst took over the keeping role and showed great potential. The standard of fielding in general was perhaps not as good as it should have been, but those who stood out in the field include Justin Reed, David Ayre and Tony O'Connor. Frank Eade who helped out on occasions (including the semi-final) when numbers were down still managed some incredible catches and saves in the field. Thanks Frank.

Thanks also to another two "veterans", John Bice and Sid Smith who came out of retirement to help out during the vacation period. Sid's 49 against Easts was a typically solid innings which laid the foundation for our round-8 win over the eventual premiers.

I would like to thank all 28 players who took the field for the thirds at some stage during the season for their efforts. Thanks also to my Vice-Captain Alan Grigg and to Mick Hromow who filled that role during Alan's absence, and in fact captained the side for the last round game.

Thanks are also in order to those players such as Alan Grigg,
Peter Murray, Eric Delaney and Frank Eade who assisted in the
preparation of wickets for our matches, and to all those who assisted
in providing afternoon teas. The highlight of these teas were the
cakes made by Peter Bradley and Justin Reed who showed their talents
are not confined to batting.

Summing up, I think I can say that the team had an enjoyable season on and off the field. The big disappointment, of course, was our semi-final loss to Easts after we had done so well to lead on the first innings. Lack of experience, application and a "killer instinct" let us down on that occasion, although credit must go to Easts for the way they fought back so well. I am confident that next season we will improve in each of these facets of our game and not only be the 8th successive Wests third grade semi-final team, but carry on and take out the premiership.

FOURTH GRADE

The fourth grade team had a successful season and finished a very good third in the competition. It was the first time fourth grade as such has been played since 1974/75 and the more even standard of "fourth sides" was beneficial to all district clubs. The numbers wanting to play district cricket seem certain to ensure the continuance of this grade in the future.

The team's success was based on the efforts of all members to contribute at some stage during the season. Both the regular players and those who had only a few games could say they did something towards the performance of the team. The team managed three outright wins all by an innings prior to Christmas, which allowed it to stay in the top four all season. With the usual loss of players in all grades over Christmas the team struggled until it regained strength in February. In a great match the unbeaten Ginninderra were defeated by 86 runs, which sealed a semi-final place. The loss of several players throughout the Club weakened the four semi-final teams. The fact that the team was well beaten by a very strong Norths side in no way took away from the season's success.

There were a number of outstanding batting performances. David Lindenmayer's 150 against ANU was scored in very quick time (about 2½ hours) and was virtually chanceless. David shared a record 143 run partnership with David Ayre for the seventh wicket. Their batting was probably the best of the season. David Ayre's only two innings of 56 and 51 not out stamped him as a real gain for the senior club who will undoubtedly reach higher honours in the future. Robert Bradley in only two innings scored 66 and 52 and confirmed his ability for higher grades. Other fine performances were recorded by Paul Bonnett 66, and Greg Wilson 78 not out in a stand of 84, which set up the win against South Woden, and Phil Spence with 63 not out against Weston Creek.

The most invaluable batting performances were undoubtedly those of Allan Berling 66, and Bob Chibnall 39 (both run out) who added 84 runs against Ginninderra. After the team was 4/9 and then 5/40, their batting completely took the initiative and led to a score of 180.

Mark Treloar with 27 that day was invaluable in the team's best win of the season.

In the bowling, two of the team's youngest were outstanding all season. Chris Selman deservedly won the award and showed a huge improvement in bowling at the senior level. Chris learned how to move the ball both ways and that line and length rather than sheer pace will

get wickets in this grade of cricket. His 28 wickets at 14.18 earnt him promotion to thirds for the last three games, where he held his own.

The unlucky bowler of the season was Brian Karey. In his first experience of senior cricket, Brian proved to be one of the quickest bowlers in the Club and in fourth grade. He often bowled too well to get batsmen out. Brian must learn to think more about his bowling and to bowl at the stumps more often. His 22 wickets at 19.32 could easily have been 30 or more.

The bowling highlights were Peter King 7/30, and Steve Bryant 6/19, which led to the outright win over Queanbeyan. Chris Selman recorded 5/28 and 5/44, Peter Murray 4/18 and 4/66, and Tod Campbell 4/34 showed good potential for the future. Brian Karey's 4/72 off 25 overs in the semifinal was outstanding.

Andrew Hurst as the regular wicketkeeper did a fine job in his first season of seniors and was given some opportunities in third grade.

Andrew has a very good technique and made some very good dismissals, but needs to maintain his concentration for the longer hours of senior cricket.

My thanks to all who played in the team for their efforts, their co-operation and their assistance when they felt they could help. A personal thanks to Allan Berling and Peter King for their sound advice both on and off the field. Their advice certainly eased some of the pressure from me in what was often a very young side.

Thanks also to Angela our scorer in most matches, for a first class job which was appreciated by all players.

It was the best performance by the Club's fourth team for a few seasons, and to make the semi-finals was a just reward. It was an enjoyable season and played in the right spirit. The experience gained by the younger players will undoubtedly serve the Club well in the future.
