To Bob "Cotcha" Neal and the boys - well done chaps!

My thanks are also extended to each of our Grade captains for fine leadership displays during the year. This is not an easy task and it should be remembered that, while success of the Club on the field depends greatly on concerted team efforts, considerable responsibility must be shouldered by our "Skippers".

My congratulations also to Ian Canney and Brian Lloyd who represented Southern N.S.W. and the A.C.T. during the season against the visiting New Zealand tourists and other representative sides.

I think special mention should also be made of the efforts of our "official" First Grade scorer Barry Gardner, who did the Club a great service and attracted considerable credit from various quarters for his efforts during the season. Unfortunately, Barry and his family recently transferred to Perth, W.A., and he will be sorely missed next season. My best wishes are extended to Barry and his family for the future.

The 1973/74 recipients of the Doctor Peter Rudge Trophy and the C.B.C. Bank Trophy for the Club's "Best Sticker" and Most Improved Player, respectively, were the evergreen (though some times "browned-off") Sid Smith and the improving Brian Stonebridge.

I would also like to make mention of the fact that next season the Club will be without the services of our retiring Secretary Geoff Gelding and Treasurer Bill Pattinson. Our thanks are due to these two members for their efforts on the administrative scene over the last few seasons.

Our social calender was a fairly fruitful one during the year although I think there is room for further improvement in terms of wider member interest in this most important area of Club activity. We had several successful barbecues, golf days and, of course, our Annual Presentation Night. I look forward to the Social Committee again providing us with excuses to "get together" next season:

On the Junior side of the Club's activities, we enjoyed a most successful season. Special comments on this aspect are to be found elsewhere in the Report, but I should specifically thank Bruce Lindenmayer, Denis Driscoll and those Club members, parents of juniors, etc. who assisted in managing and coaching junior teams. The greater involvement in junior activities by senior members of the Club was most incouraging and the results obtained on the field reflected this greater involvement, which I hope is extended into the 1974/75 season.

In conclusion, I would like to thank those members who contributed to the running of the Club during the year and to wish all incoming office bearers the best of luck in their endeavours next season. The A.C.T.C.A. is also to be commended for its efforts in the development of cricket in the A.C.T. during the year. It is important, I feel, to bear in mind the fact that in Canberra our administrators are also fellow cricketers, and we, as cricketers, can all play some part in the administrative process through Club and/or A.C.T.C.A. involvement. If I have missed anyone, as I can do,(they don't call me "Byes" for nothing!), I apologise.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Gentlemen.

On behalf of the Management Committee, I submit this Fifth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the Western District Cricket Club for your information and adoption.

Following the Annual General Meeting of 8 August 1973, the Committee met formally on nine occasions during the season, compared with ten during last season. The Committee accepted the resignations of Loren White (7.2.74) and Ron Winter (15.3.74), but because of the late stage of the season, chose not to fill the two vacancies. Attendances at meetings were as follows:-

General

Following quite a successful season financially in 1972/73, the Club did not fare so well in 1973/74, and for this the Committee can be held partially responsible. The necessity to hold a "Silver Circle" just prior to the 1974/75 season to take the Club "out of the red" is indicative of the fact in future, cricket is going to prove more expensive to the individual player than it has in the past. This may take the form of higher Club fees, but the burden can be somewhat lightened if members are prepared to give greater support in future seasons to Club fund raising activities. Due to a general lack of Club support in the past, it was decided not to run the weekly raffles at the Canberra Rex and Jamison Inn Hotels.

Cricket is a team game, and with high financial overheads at the Club level, more Club members need to lend themselves to Club activities and fund raising if these overheads are to be reduced. Moreover, as A.C.T. cricket seems to be moving slowly, but

irrevocably towards professionalism, it is imperative that the Club has a sound financial base, to remove any disadvantage we may encounter in relation to the other District Clubs in exercising various initiatives.

The Club enjoyed a highly successful season on the field with three teams making the finals, and the First and Second Grade sides finishing fifth on the ladder. The Committee extends its congratulations to "Captain" Bob Neal, RAN, and his highly successful Third Grade crew which took out the coveted premiership. That makes it two in a row for teams with Bob at the "helm" (his Fifth grade side won in 1972/73) and we hope the Club will not be "all at sea" if Bob's rumoured Naval posting comes to fruition.

To those players who did not make the teams for the final series, but made valuable contributions during the season, and to those in the lower grades who were often called on at very short notice to "fill in", the Committee extends its sincere thanks. Without the efforts of those members, the Fifth Grade side, for example, may have found it difficult to reach the finals.

It was most pleasing to witness the progress of many players through the Grade ranks and the availability of promising younger members augers well for the future. On occasion, however, the Selection Committee expressed the view that not enough pressure was being exerted on the first grade players by players in the lower grades. It is to be hoped that, for the good of cricket in our district, this unsatisfactory situation is remedied next season.

Our practice facilities during 1973/74 were again well below standard and it was found necessary to make representations to the Department of the Capital Territory through the A.C.T.C.A. seeking improvements to this situation.

It is understood the practice wickets at the Aranda Oval have undergone some improvement and the Committee hopes that efforts to once again secure practice facilities of sufficient standard within the confines of our own district boundaries may soon prove successful. It was somewhat disturbing to observe the "have a hit and go home" attitude adopted by many members at practices during the season and it is to be hoped this approach will not be continued into 1974/75 and thus make practicing more beneficial for all concerned. It is mentioned at this point that the Committee took steps towards the purchase of a slips fielding "cradle" and it is recommended that the incoming committee follow up this proposal, which, if pursued, should contribute towards the improvement of this important facet of the game of cricket within the Club.

The Social Committee once again came up with its bag of surprises during the season, with golf days, barbecues, "Spag and Claret" night and "Sargeant" Lloyd, who tended to pop up when he was most required! However, the level of support from members for these functions could be much improved.

The Committee feels that the report on the junior activities of the Club which follows below, reflects a much improved season in this most important area of the Club's affairs;
- the Ginninderra Cricket Club for its efforts in catering for junior cricketers in the newer areas of Belconnen. No doubt this has formed the basis for a second district Club in this area and we wish it well for a successful future;

JUNIORS' REPORT

The 1973/74 season was a very successful one for the Club's juniors. Some 140 juniors represented the Club in 12 teams and the considerable involvement and effort shown by a number of the senior Club members enabled most teams to be coached by an experienced cricketer. The excellent results achieved in 1973/74 speak for themselves, with 11 out of the 12 teams making the finals, our Under 14 Div. 2 and Under 13 Div. 1 sides winning premierships, while the Under 16 Div. 2 side tied in the Grand Final. The Club won the second highest number of premierships behind the City Club, which won three, and we came second to Marist Brothers in the Club Championship.

It was also encouraging to see good performances by some of the boys in the senior competition, particularly David Thompsett, Adrian Lamont, David Lindenmayer and David Reed.

Our sincere thanks are extended to those parents and players who, as coaches and managers, made the season a more successful and rewarding one for our juniors. The problem of obtaining sufficient assistance with coaching, managing and providing transport was largely overcome due to the efforts of those mentioned above. Comments on each team entered in the competition are set out below:-

U16 Division 2

This team was coached and managed by Ron Winter, and improved tremendously over the course of the season to finish equal premiers with Queanbeyan. David Thompsett had a very good all round season in a team which was very even and with plenty of team spirit.

U14 Division 1

Coached by First Grade Skipper, Sid Smith, and managed by Bruce Lindenmayer, this team had a very successful season.

After finishing unbeaten in the home and away games to be Minor

Premiers, the side lost by 22 runs in the semi-finals, following its only batting collapse of the season.

Batting honours went to captain David Lindenmayer and Mark Barley, with good performances from David Mason, Tony Hills Alistair Meek, David Reed and Paul Coleman. Bowling honours were shared between David Reed and Paul Coleman, with David Lindenmayer and Alistair Meek turning in some fine efforts. David Reed took the fielding honours, while Bruce Lott and David Simington showed improved form in a team which developed a fine spirit overall.

U14 Division 2

This team displayed fighting characteristics to come from fourth place to win the premiership. The Grand Final against Grammar was a most absorbing tussle and the side did the Club proud in displaying an attitude of maturity and sportsmanship during the match. Led by skipper Robert "Spud" Bradley, who was instrumental in achieving victory, the side displayed excellent discipline when most required and the level of concentration maintained, particularly by the lower order batsmen, was pleasing to see.

Glen Croker, Rob Bradley, Steve Leppert and Doug Penney stood out in the batting, while the bowling honours went to Glen Croker, who showed promise of developing into a good alrounder with Rob Bradley and Greg Wilson. The team was fortunate to have Geoff Gelding as Coach and Pat Wilson and Peter Croker as co-managers.

013 Division 1

This team was unbeaten during the season and added a further premiership to that one the previous season. Congratulations are due to all members for a fine team performance and also to the Coaches Denis Driscoll and Jim McDonald and manager Albert

Lovett for their time, effort and patience.

The scorebook reveals that the results were achieved through a full team effort, with no fewer than 7 batsmen aggregating 60 runs or more and 5 bowlers taking in excess of 9 wickets each. While it is difficult to single out individual players, special mention should be made of Tim Driscoll for his captaincy, wicketkeeping and batting, Lance Morton for his spin bowling and Anthony Stewart for his batting application. Peter Lloyd made a welcome return to the team after Christmas and Simon Heggen's switch from a medium pacer to wrist spinner proved successful in the last two matches.

U13 Division 2

The team had a good season under the direction of Tim and David Hughes and Robert Pinkerton, with all the boys participating in a sportsman-like manner. There were several fine individual performances from Michael Deegan, Kiran Kirk Rodney McTaggart and Andrew Graham, but overall strength was in the team as a whole. The boys lost an exciting final by 18 runs and took the defeat in good spirit, which brought credit to themselves, their coaches and the Club.

U12 Division 1

This team had a mid-season purple patch of six wins in a row (including wins over the top sides) but the second half of the season saw several close defeats. Consistent losing of the toss saw the team batting first in long wet grass on most occasions. After sneaking into the finals, the side was narrowly beaten in the semi-final. The joint coach/managers Tom Goynich and Hugh Stewart, welded together a team which did not nave to rely on 'stars'. A number of boys both scored runs and took wickets, and the fielding was enthusiastic.

U12 Division 2

This side was coached by Bill Pattinson and managed by

Neville Hurst, and developed considerably as the season progressed. In winning nine matches and losing five, the side finished third in the competition.

Some good batting performances were turned in by Adam Garton, Andrew Hurst and Brett Mason, while Storm Brearly, David Leslie, Sam Klobasa and Brett Mason were the best of the bowlers.

The teamwork shown by the twelve regulars in the side was most satisfactory. Everybody took at least one catch and each learnt to adapt their batting to the various situations faced. The running between wickets improved remarkably, about doubling the value gained from strokes made.

U12 Division 3

This team entered the competition only after the third round, but despite this handicap and a chronic shortage of players, managed to scrape into the semi-final, where they were unlucky not win with 3/72 against a stong Grammar side(8/76). The brunt of the batting and bowling fell on David Ayre and Graham Delbridge, and they were well supported by an agile 'keeper in Peter Ranyard and team enthusiasm. Les Powell took over from Loren White as coach/manager during the season and did a very fine job under difficult conditions.

U11 Division 1

This side was coached by Nick LeRay-Meyer and managed by Geoff Pring. Lying in third phace, it was beaten soundly in the semi-final. Paul Kenny, Stewart Grocock, Stewart Peacock, Niko Lovric stood out during the season, and most matches hinged on an individual effort. It was unfortunate that parental support was not generally forthcoming, even for transport purposes.

U11 Division 2

This team had a most successful season. They won no cups or trophies, coming fifth in the table, but they played good, sporting

and enthusiastic cricket right until the end of the last social game. For less than 11 players to turn up for practice was the occasion for a major enquiry. Something complimentary could be said about every player, although Gary Reading and Andre Coley did best in the batting and the bowling honours went to Michael Driscoll and Gary Reading. AndrewGoynich kept wickets effectively. Alan Casey and Fred Peppinck(coaches) and Denis Coley (manager) were responsible for the high level of enthusiasm, teamwork and improvement shown during the season.

U11 Division 3

This side, coached by Brian Stonebridge, had a very successful season but suffered the same fate as many of our other teams by being beaten in the semi-finals. The two opening bowlers, Peter Reed and Tim Hutchison, claimed most of the wickets, although captain Tim Turner showed great promise as a spin bowler. Andrew Kirk and Chris Houston usually gave a good start to the batting, and the middle order batsmen, particularly Ian Stonebridge and Peter Reed, showed considerable improvement during the season.

U10 Division 2

Shane Evans, Ivan Hamilton and Ian Roxburgh broughtv these young lads from not knowing one end of the bat from the other at the start of the season to a position in the final four.

The team was very keen, and matured considerably during the year.

Outstanding alrounders were captain Ian Gelling and Russell Peacock.

In conclusion, the Management Committee would like to wish the incoming Committee the best of good fortune for the 1974/75 season in carrying out those tasks necessary to enable the Club to go from strength to strength on and off the field.

TEAM REPORTS 1973/74

First Grade

For the First Grade side, it was once again a season of fluctuating fortune. The first half of the season was one of misfortune, with the temperamental fluctuations of the local weather scene playing too influential a role, as well as indifferent form being displayed by both bat and ball.

It was apparant early in the season that the loss of Zoran Pirjevec would be sorely felt from the fast bowling department and without a solid front-line opening attack, the side had to withstand additional pressures on this score during the season. However, some stirling performances were turned in by "Lippy" Lipscombe, Bob Allen and our "offie" Ian Canney, who were called on for big efforts from time to time.

On the batting side, skipper Sid Smith led by example with an incredibly consistent display, scoring 522 runs to also top the A.C.T.C.A. aggregates. Solid support came from Ian Canney, Alan Taylor, Ron Winter and Brian Lloyd. With steadier application next season, the side should more than just present a formidable line-up'on paper'and, given a little of that useful commodity called "Lady Luck" (so necessary in Canberra), make its presence felt.

The fielding displays were generally good, although on occasion small lapses were evident. The acquisition of a slips cradle would be welcomed to assist in sharpening up this aspect. The side was generally keen and enthusiastic and proved it could beat the best sides in the competition. The team building over the last few seasons should bare fruit next season, which is awaited with eager expectation. Thanks are extended to Sid Smith, who did an admirable job in steeringthe ship along a steady course. The efforts of Barry Gardner, our official scorer, were also greatly appreciated.

Second Grade

The second grade side had rather a disappointing season, finishing equal fifth, although it was an improvement on last season.

The major problem with the side was the lack of dedication in the batting department. Even though the side ostensibly batted well "down the list", there were few scores of more than one hundred. Ian Roxburgh was by far the most successful batsman and at the end of the season he was in particularly fine touch. Ian should be pressing strongly for First Grade representation in the near future. "Byes" Blundell also contributed some useful scores at the latter part of the season.

The bowlers performed creditably throughout the season and kept the side in the semi-final race right up to (and including) the final round. "Pearl" Hamilton, "Skull" Howe, Loren White and Bruce Coe spearheaded the attack during the year. They generally took it in turns to help bundle out the opposition for relatively low scores. It was in fact a combination of the good bowling and poor batting performances of the side which allowed limited use to be made of the "slowie" talents of "Garth" Beauchamp. It is to be hoped that this situation might not be repeated in the season ahead.

The ground fielding overall was quite good but catching let the side down on a number of occasions. Promising juniors Paul Bonnett and Malcolm Manson showed that they have benefitted from experience in the senior grades and should account for themselves well next season.

Third Grade

Congratulations to the Thirds on winning the Club's second premiership in two years. Under the capable leadership of Bob Neal, the side gradually moulded itself into a well "oiled" unit after the usual settling in problems encountered at the early end of the season. There were some fine performances turned in both by the team as a whole and by individuals. With the bat, it was a new face in Phil"the shirt"Hagan who shone out during the season, compiling 205 runs at an average of 25.62 an innings. Phil was a model of consistency and should make his presence felt in the higher grades in the seasons to come. Keith Akesson, Andy Johnstone and Dave Kelaher also made useful contributions. The bowling honours went to Bob Neal, Ivan Hamilton and Jack Tekloot. Bob had the distinction of taking the most number of wickets for for the Club during the season in the form of 48 opposition "scalps" with his "medies". Special mention should be made of the fine wicketkeeping of Brian Stonebridge, who proved himself to/extremely competent behind the stumps - to such an extent that he was promoted to the First Grade ranks on one occasion during the season.

The spirit of comradeship generated within the side augers well for the season ahead and should ensure "The Thirds" account for themselves well again on the field of play.

Fourth Grade

The Fourth Grade side contained a blending of youth and experience and, capably directed by captain Ian McLennan, joined the Thirds and Fifths by turning in an excellent team effort in reaching the final of the competition, only to be beaten by East Canberra who proved to be the better side "on the day". It is interesting to observe that some 42 players represented the Fourths during the year, but a nucleus of regular players provided the experience, together with a blending of promising youth, to ensure a season of success for the side. Numerous players turned in good

performances during the year, the most consistent efforts with the bat coming from old stalwart Ian McLennan who led by example to reach 322 runs for the season, ably supported by Alan Thomas and Ed Willett. It was most encouraging to see the younger members of the side doing well. In Bruce Willett, David Thompsett and Brian Stonebridge, the Club has gained considerable talent which should benefit greatly by the experience gained over the season.

Skipper McLennan rounded off an excellent season by "talking" 40 of his opponents into surrendering their wickets to him (there was talk of bribery!). Bob Chibnall, John Quinn and Doug Foulstone also did well with the "leather" and Bruce Willett showed he has the potential to develop into an excellent 'keeper.

All in all, an excellent effort by the Fours and the experience gained during the season, particularly in the Finals, should be of considerable benefit for the forthcoming season.

Fifth Grade

The Fifths enjoyed a highly successful season in reaching the Final of the competition, but found Queanbeyam a "Force" (sorry Sarge!) to be reckoned with. Some 40 players made the side during the year and some fine performances were turned in by both batsmen and bowlers. "Digger" Quigg somehow managed to knock up 450 runs, despite an injury-prone season, which has thrown his cricketing future in some doubt. We wish him well for a speedy recovery. Ray Swanson, who hit a brilliant 133n.o. in the semi-final, David Service, whose astute leadership was of considerable value to the side, Peter Thomas and David Lindenmayer also gave able batting assistance. The bowling attack was led by Ron Wright, David Service, Peter Thomas and Graham Quigg. The fielding department was perhaps a little on the disappointing side but this problem should be overcome if rumours of the purchase by the Club of a slips fielding cradle prove correct.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SEASON 1973/74

In a season in which team performances were generally regarded as having improved on the previous season, there were also some meritorious individual performances. Some of the highlights of the season were as follows:-

- the winning of the Third Grade Premiership and the fine efforts of the Fourth and Fifth Grade sides in each reaching the Finals. Rumour has it that the First Grade side, which has promised so much "on paper" over the last couple of seasons, is really going to make its presence felt next season.
- In topping the batting aggregate in First Grade in the A.C.T. with his 522 runs, Sid Smith passed the 2000 run mark for the Club in his fifth season with us. Sid has also taken 6 wickets for the Club, his best figures being 1/7, but his application for recognition as an all-rounder was recently rejected by the Iadies' Auxilliary. Ian Canney, with 169, and Lyndon Howe, with 159, lead the bowling aggregate as the Club's highest wickettakers. Bob Neal, who took the most number of wickets for the Club in 1973/74 (48), is not far behind these two with 139 dismissals.
- well for the future of the Club. The experience gained in the senior ranks by many of the junior brigade should prove invaluable in the future. Juniors to do well last season included Bruce Willett, David Lindenmayer and David Thompsett.

- our Chief Statistician drew attention to a couple of notable all-round performances during the season "Lippy" Lipscombe and "B.A." Hamilton took 38 and 32 wickets, respectively. Those of you who are still not convinced of the inherent abilities of these two stalwarts should observe that "Lippy" and "B.A." amassed 25 and 29 runs, respectively, for the Club. It is believed Howie is particularly pleased with his new batting gloves his fielding has improved out of sight!
