## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure that I present this Presidential report as an introduction to our 19th Annual Report.

Statistically, season 1987/88 was a relatively successful year for Wests.

- . 2nd in the Club championship
- . 3 teams in the one day semi-finals
- . 4 teams in the two day semi-finals
- . 5th Grade Minor Premiers and winners of the Bell Air shield.

However, the women's premiership and 3rds One Day premiership were the only premierships from a season which promised much more. I have no doubt that there is tremendous depth and talent within the club and we should look forward to 1988/89 with expectation. To realise these expectations, however, all players will need to contribute much more at training and in their approach to preparation for games of a weekend.

In 1987/88 the club took a number of initiatives which were successful:

- . The appointment of Col Rowe and Mick Brady as joint coaches was a positive move. Unfortunately we only had Mick for part of the year, but I am sure everyone was appreciative of the time and effort Colin Rowe put into coaching players at all levels of the club, including the juniors and the women. I believe we need to provide added support for Colin next season to reap the benefit of the work he did this season.
- . The appointment and remuneration of curators at O'Connor and Aranda was perhaps an overdue initiative. I would particularly like to pay tribute to Will Penny for his work on O'Connor. It was arguably the best cricket wicket in Canberra by the end of the season. Steve Broadbent took on Aranda after his exams were completed and maintained the Aranda wicket as one of the better wickets around Canberra. Unfortunately, the Aranda outfield is currently sub-standard for grade cricket and we need to maintain pressure on the authorities to complete the necessary improvements.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

It is my pleasure, as Secretary, to bring before you the Management Committee report for season 1987-88, our Bicentennial year. I believe we are now seeing the fruits of the major structural changes which were made to the administration of the club last year.

There were some significant changes to the competition programme this year as a result of the ACT commitment to the Prudential National Championships in January coupled with the Womens National Championship. We saw a number of matches conducted on consecutive days which did make it difficult at times getting our best sides on the field, and to some extent this also affected our aim to continue with a sixth side.

This season also saw the welcome return of Mark Garrity and Sean Michelle and the introduction of Jimmy Shoulder. For the first time the club appointed official coaches with the objective of improving player skills and maintaining player enthusiasm throughout the season.

One of the very important changes to be introduced is the Incorporation of the Club by bringing into play a revised Constitution which effectively provides a total umbrella for our other partners in the Womens and Junior ranks. The constitutional changes will provide improved management control and stability for the administration and development of both Junior and Senior cricket within our region.

A new initiative this year was the introduction of the Lions Den 'coterie' of club supporters. A very successful promotion which would not have been achieved without the enthusiasm and dedication of Ken Norris.

The club has been actively involved in discussions with the Executive of the ACTCA about the long term future of the Northside clubs. One of the important outcomes of the discussions was a proposal outlining the distribution of Junior resource responsibilities for each Club. While no zoning or boundaries were set it was agreed that Clubs should concentrate their recruitment activities in specific areas, for example this Club should be looking at the suburbs of Aranda, Belconnen, Bruce, Cook, Florey, Hawker, Macquarie, Page, Scullin and Weetangera. In addition as a long term plan we are looking at a proposal to shift our playing facilities from O'Connor/Aranda to Aranda/Jamison. If we achieve this there will be significant long term benefits, for example: having our resources close to the Western District Rugby Union Club. This is but one of the issues to be addressed by your Management Committee in the future.



The future viability and development of the Club can only be achieved by the continued support of the membership and a willingness for members to contribute to the administration of the Club. Your Management Committee has been very active this year meeting at least once each month throughout the year and often attending other meetings of the ACTCA. Our achievements this year are largely due to the untiring efforts of Ken Norris, not only has Ken made a valuable contribution to the success of the Club on the field, he has also given a great deal more of his valuable time off the field, leading the drive for improved administration of the Club.

The level of commitment from all of the Management Committee members has been excellent. Everybody has worked very hard for the Club this year and given the continued support of these people I am in no doubt about the continuing development and future of the Club. There is still a lot of work to be done, especially in the area of ground development at Aranda and O'Connor, fund raising and the ongoing requirement to attract the best players. Recruitment of players within our region involving local Schools and Colleges must be one of our priorities in the coming year. In addition, we must not overlook the need to develop further the commitment of non-playing members to the Management Committee as well as the establishment of sub-committees to handle specialist tasks, for example: ground management, coaching, recruitment and fund raising.

I am very conscious that I have not been able to attend practice sessions and many of the games this year, this is primarily due to work and family commitments. Despite this however I have thoroughly enjoyed the involvement in the Management Committee and thank all of the players and Committee members for their support. The enthusiasm and sense of pride which flows from the membership of this Club is very encouraging indeed, and one of the main reasons for me finding that little bit of time which is needed to assist.

Many thanks to Mr G. Garrity and Judith Andrews for their contribution to the preparation of this report. Thank you also to Richard Hickman, and the Management of the ACT Cricket Association for their efforts and support to the Western District Club throughout this past season. Thank you also to the management of the Western District Rugby Union Club for their help during the year to foster the club and make their facilities available for Club functions. And last but not least thanks to each and every member of the Club for your continued support, because without you the Club would not exist.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present the 1987/88 financial statements for the Western District Cricket Club.

The club's financial affairs for the year are on the surface quite pleasing with a surplus of \$1,250, as compared with a loss of \$550 in the previous year. However, this good result needs to be tempered with a little conservatism. Firstly, 30% of this surplus is made up by the inclusion of the Women's Cricket Club under the umbrella of the WDCC.

This leaves an \$800 surplus which is readily identifiable through the generous contribution from our select 'coterie' of supporters known as the "Lion's Den". To those "Lions", as Treasurer of WDCC I would like to offer the club's gratitude for their contributions.

Similar to the previous year, there is little doubt that our expenses will again increase so consideration to the structure of subscriptions will be necessary. However unlike last year we have not had to dig into our investments, and hence any increases will be able to be kept to a minimum.

A significant contribution to our income came from the WDRUFC, with a contribution of some \$1,500. This generous support is most welcome and the club's appreciation is extended to WDRUFC's management.

We again conducted a major raffle which has provided us with over \$500 in income. This greatly improved result on last year can be attributable to Alan Rappeley who brought considerable expertise in fund raising activities to the club.

I would like to personally thank all those members who readily and quickly paid their subscriptions. To those members to whom this comment does not apply I hope they will "join the team" in the future.

In conclusion, I would like to express my appreciation to all the members of the management committee who helped make my job as Treasurer that much easier.


AUDITORS REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE

Subject to the foregoing, in my opinion the financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Western District Cricket Club at 30th April, 1988 and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
AS AT 30TH APRIL 1988

NOTE 1: EQUIPMENT

- A. Unused equipment is valued at cost. Conservative values are placed on used equipment. These values are determined to approximate the write-off of the cost of the equipment over its expected life.
- B. No inventory was prepared of Juniors equipment as at the end of the financial year. This equipment is included at the same value as the previous year.

NOTE 2: WOMENS CRICKET CLUB

During the year the womens cricket club affiliated with the Western District Rugby Union Club Inc. became part of the Western District Cricket Club. Full details of income and expenditure and assets of the womens cricket club have not been included in these statements. The only financial transaction which has been included is the transfer of bank balances which has been treated as an income item.

NOTE 3: GRANT

Towards the end of the financial year the Club applied for and had approved a grant of \$2,000 to assist in the construction of a new practice wicket. As at the end of the financial year no grant monies had been received and no expenditure had been incurred on this facility. It is expected that the total cost of this project will be in the vicinity of \$4,000.

### JUNIOR CRICKET REPORT

The 1987/88 season continued the impetus set in train during the 1986/87 season. Kanga cricket's numbers were up and its second season was more successful than its inaugural one. Ian White and Geoff Shoring organised the Saturday mornings games at Canberra High School with great efficiency and all teams had a full complement of managers and helpers - thanks to the efforts of Ian and Geoff.

The Kanga "minors" (6-7 year olds) not participating in actual games were organised into less structured games and thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

There is no doubting the success of the Wests venture into Kanga cricket and it will be a nursery of talent for the traditional junior cricket teams which will be fielded in the ACT Junior Cricket competition.

Wests had 15 teams competing in traditional cricket and the four Under 10 and 11 teams played in a northside competition designed to introduce young players to competition cricket but without the pressure of playing for a premiership. All teams had a very enjoyable season and are to be commended on their efforts throughout the season.

Of the eleven teams playing from Under 12's to Under 17's three teams won premierships viz

Equally deserving of praise are the remaining teams. Though they may not have featured in the finals they nonetheless played cricket in the right spirit and brought much credit on themselves and the club.

Special mention must be made to the dedication and contribution made by all coaches, managers and scorers who make it all happen. Without their sacrifice there would be no junior cricket and we wish to formally acknowledge their

effort.

Particular kudos was brought to the club in relation to representative cricket during the season. Graham Evans was appointed coach of the ACT Under 13 team and John Armstrong, (Junior Secretary and our Under 13 Division 1 coach) the team manager. In addition the following boys were selected in ACT representative cricket teams:

Pennants were presented to all players and Club President, Ken Norris, presented special trophies to the representative players together with Graham Evans and John Armstrong.

A special presentation night was held at Western District Rugby Union Club on 23 May 1988 for the three premiership winning teams. A spectacular video on sporting highlights was shown followed by a light supper and presentation of individual trophies by Ken Norris. This was our first attempt at a presentation night and in view of its success they will become an annual event.

The Club joined with the West Belconnen Cricket Club in hosting a visit to Canberra from the Penrith RSL Club. Our club supplied teams for Under 15/16; 14/15; 13 and 12 and a thoroughly enjoyable time was had. Billets were provided for several of the teams and parents responded magnificently in this regard. So successful was the weekend that we have been invited back to Penrith at the start of next season in conjunction with the West Belconnen Club.

The support from the Senior Club during the season was excellent. Col Rowe, Senior coach ran a number of practice sessions for different teams at the Aranda nets and these proved popular and beneficial to the players. On the occasions he was unavailable Ken Norris very capably filled in.

The Junior committee is very appreciative of the assistance given and interest shown from the Senior Club which is vital to the development and fostering of junior cricketers who will progress through to the senior ranks.

### COACHING REPORT

We obviously have some problems with practice facilities and the establishment of interesting and worthwhile practice routines is something we need to work on. However, as with all things associated with sport, you only get out of it what you are willing to put into it. And I think here lies our main problem - ATTITUDE!!!

Surely you play cricket because you enjoy it. The better you play, the more you enjoy it and the benefits flow to team and club. The only way to play better is to practice and have an attitude which gives you an open mind - always on the lookout for a way to improve. You should never be completely satisfied with your game. Everyone can improve.

The large number of players who are regularly playing at least one grade below their ability is disappointing. I put this down to two things. Firstly, as I have said above, attitude, and secondly - CONCENTRATION!!!

At practice, I see players mindlessly going through the motions. Your body learns what it practices. If you practice hitting the ball in the air or bowling wide, that's what your body will reproduce for you in a game, particularly under pressure. So the message is, concentrate at practice and concentrate when you play on Saturdays. You may surprise yourself with what you are capable of doing with the right attitude and good concentration.

Although I think we have a long way to go before we perform, as a Club, to anywhere near our potential, I see enough to be encouraged. There are players who work hard and they, I believe, were rewarded.

During the season I had the pleasure of coaching a number of our junior teams and their talent and above all their general attitude was most heartening. The future looks bright.

I feel my efforts bore some fruit and coaching certainly has its rewards when a player you have been working with puts it all together.

My overall conviction is that coaching is worthwhile both on an individual and club level. This year is only the start, with your help the future will see the successes the Club deserves.

As you read this report between seasons, I suggest you reflect on your past performances with bat and ball. Then set yourself some goals for next year and keep them in mind during practice and in games. Let us all lift our performances.

## DIRECTOR CRICKET MANAGEMENT REPORT

The 1987/88 season again was a hectic one for this portfolio. As in last year's report I will endeavour to provide a coverage of all areas of responsibility.

### Selection of Teams

The system of two selection panels for the first two matches again was successful. Glen O'Sullivan accepted the position of Chairman of Selectors and must be congratulated for his efforts. The usual problems of players declaring themselves unavailable at short notice reared its ugly head once again. One can only assume that this Club will always have the problem. Unfortunately this will continue to affect the Club's overall performance.

Notwithstanding the problem, 1987/88 saw an improvement in performances and it was particularly pleasing to finish second in the Club championship, our best result since winning that coveted prize in 1983/84.

### Club Practice

In last year's report I highlighted club practice as the major trouble spot. I am pleased to report that things did improve with the appointment of professional coaches undoubtedly proving highly successful. The Club must continue this approach if it is to remain competitive in the long term.

Attendance at training was excellent, the best certainly in my time. Season results reflect this, but this does not mean resting on any levels. There is still room for improvement, particularly the attitude of players to training. It is a complete waste of time and money with professional coaching available, to treat training as a social event.

### Kit Management

At the risk of being repetitious I again plead with members to respect equipment. At the start of the season the club endeavoured to field six teams and thus additional equipment was purchased. Unfortunately six teams could not be maintained and equipment no longer was a problem. As is the norm the cost of equipment for next season will influence annual fees, so treat it with care.

### Player Discipline

There was no disciplinary action required within the Club, the usual high standard being maintained. Unfortunately one of our players was reported and suspended for one match for on field behaviour. I am certain the player concerned regrets his actions and will have learnt from it, it cost him a place in a premiership team.

### Team Performances and Match Reports

I am pleased to report that the Club's performance in this aspect improved in 1987/88. It was not perfect, but it did improve. The Club continued good relationships with the ACTCA Cricket Committee in the running of the competition. Not all decisions taken were to our liking but unless we are prepared to provide some assistance to the ACTCA Committees we should not complain too much.

In conclusion I must again express my enjoyment of the season. It was a pleasure to work with such a talented and happy group of fellows on the Committee and my thanks to all of them. The Club is still not realising its full potential, but it is getting closer. With continued hard work off the field and an increase in commitment and dedication by some players I am certain performances will improve.

On that note I must indicate that I feel my time as an administrator must cease. In an endeavour to improve my handicap with the little white ball I will not be standing for any Management Committee position in 1988/89. Good luck to all in the coming season.

### FIRST GRADE REPORT

The first grade side performed soundly during the 1987-88 season. We never really 'set the world on fire' nor did we 'hit rock-bottom'. I believe it would be accurate to describe our performances as those which one would expect from practice or warm-up games.

We managed to reach the semi-finals in both the one-day and two-day competition. On face-value this would seem a creditable effort. However, the gap between what 'should have been' and what actually occurred, was enormous. In my opinion, there is no greater sporting crime, or indeed shame, than sportsmen who not only fail to produce to their optimal potential, but who feel satisfied with mediocre performances. Unfortunately, we did lose a number of extremely capable players before and during the season in Neil Davidson, Andy Butler, Mick Brady and Greg Besomo; but I believe the potential still existed to win the competition.

On the whole, the team lacked commitment in its approach to each game. Once again this year there were many theories put forward to explain our average performances, many of which were carelessly espoused while propping up a bar. In simple terms, too many first graders were not prepared to apply themselves; not only on the weekend but especially to training. It became too easy for individuals to lay the blame on external influences such as umpires, grounds, captaincy etc., instead of analysing their own performances and, as a result, working to improve their own shortfalls. There is only so much a captain, coach and/or administrator can do to motivate a mature individual. The most significant and influential motivation comes from within! If a player or group of players are not self-motivated initially then there is very little, if anything at all, an outside influence can do to make them produce the goods.

In briefly analysing the different aspects of our game, I believe our batting generally lacked discipline ... terms such as guts and determination, application, building an innings were not used in abundance to describe our performances; certainly not as much as aggression, power ... dare I say, slogging!

Our bowling generally lacked the basics of line and length. We lacked penetration early in the innings, as shown by the fact that we rarely had the opposition 2 or 3 for not much! Therefore we relied heavily upon the depth in our spin attack. The most remarkable transformation occurred in our fielding



throughout the year. We missed many chances early and in the middle of the season, including some 'sitters' and our confidence dropped profoundly. However toward the end of the season we managed to hold onto a couple and our confidence rose. At the end we took everything that went into the air with spectacular regularity.

It has been my approach this year and in previous years to direct my report to overall team performances. Indeed, cricket is a team game! However, at this moment I would like to pay tribute to Ken Norris whose commitment, experience and obvious ability (he even took a couple of c+b's); not to mention the time and energy put into 'off the field' necessities; was a shining example to us all! It was a great pleasure to play with Chuck this year, as it is every year. Furthermore, I feel that Col Rowe's approach to his coaching commitment within the club should be acknowledged. I found Col's approach and knowledge of the game extremely valuable.

Finally, I would like to thank those players who supported me during the season. It certainly makes a captain's job a great deal easier when he knows he has such support. My thanks are also extended to the competent administration of the club.

## SECOND GRADE REPORT

The 1987-88 season for second grade was like the billy goat - all but! We reached the final of the One-Day competition and in an amazing, high scoring game at ANU we managed to snatch defeat from the jaws of victory in the most remarkable manner. Likewise we narrowly missed out on qualifying for the semi-finals in the two day competition by using our final match against City, incidentally the only two-day game we lost all season. This was achieved with a side considerably weakened by injuries and withdrawals which resulted in our taking part with only 10 men. An unfortunate way to bring to an end a season in which much was achieved chiefly by virtue of the enthusiasm and cheerful application of all who played in the side.

Our batting at times was brittle and relied chiefly on the consistent form at the top of the innings of Graham Etherington and Rodney Ellis, who always looked a very good player in compiling 372 runs, while the lower order was bolstered by some aggressive batting from Mark Garland and several very strong knocks from Andy Harbick. However, batting was also at times spectacular with first Glen Croker and then Will Penny persuading the magpies to forsake O'Connor for the much more peaceful atmosphere of the Northbourne Avenue traffic.

Both players won matches for us with exceptional hitting and it would indeed have been nice to have had both of them together in the side for at least some part of the season. It was a pity that Rohan Pyne's appearances were limited as his contribution would surely have helped us into the semi-finals of the two-day competition.

The bulk of the bowling fell to Micky Barnes, David Metcalfe and Mark Garland all of who attacked the job willingly at all times. On occasions all these produced outstanding form but each was also at times wayward. Consistency comes with experience and I am sure that in time all these players will become fine bowlers when each comes to terms with his particular qualities. Each bagged over 28 wickets and were supported for most of the season by the slow-medium seamers of Andy Harbick and spin from Will Penny and Jimmy Shoulder.

With the odd aberration the bowling throughout the season was steady but we were unable to produce consistently the sort of strike bowling that wins matches. In addition plundering 254 runs and taking most wickets (23) Mark Garland also snaffled 15 catches - an excellent performance.

Our fielding was patchy with excellent performances, especially in the one-day matches, contrasting with a number of lack-lustre displays, lack of consistency again being the problem. Apart from Mark Garland, Ashley Weston and Rodney Ellis also fielded well suggesting there may be something in the Yass water supply.

At the end of the day it is a pity that the team didn't have a little more show for their efforts. However, I believe the 2nd Grade team performed its chief function well over the season, namely to provide the right sort of cricketing platform for those players on the fringe of 1st Grade, and to provide a good environment for the development of the younger, potentially 1st Grade players.

I think in the main we achieved those objectives and I would like to thank all those who participated for their unfailing cheerful efforts and I look forward with confidence to the coming season.

### THIRD GRADE REPORT

Unfortunately the 1978/88 season finished in disappointment for the Wests 3rd Grade side, as it once again narrowly missed a place in the final four. Although the side was successful in winning the One-Day Competition for the second year in a row, our goal at the beginning of the season was to win the Two-Day Premiership. Our inability to achieve this goal is extremely disappointing considering the talent and potential for good performance that the side possessed.

A lack of commitment and lapses of concentration from our batsmen early in the season, cost us games against sides who should have been "easy meat" for our line-up. These losses proved to be our undoing, as later in the season we were unable to make up the ground we lost to other sides before Christmas.

On a more positive note, a settled, more committed side fought back after Christmas and showed the type of cricket it was capable of playing. Unfortunately, after a string of sound performances, the side faltered at the death just missing a berth in the finals. However, the damage had been done earlier, and the players involved can be proud of their efforts towards the end of the season when they fought desperately for a position in the four. Let us hope we learn from the mistakes we made this season, and return later in the year better players for our experience.

The One-Day success was achieved after some ordinary form before Christmas which was followed by some awesome displays after the festive break.

Our lead up to the finals included a savaging of City, where we amassed 2 for 289 off only 47 overs. This performance was to be the platform for our assault on the One-Day Premiership, and the commitment and urgency which became part of our game was a delight to witness.

In the semi-final, we played the strong and experienced Easts combination; a cocky outfit, undefeated and expecting to win easily against the young team from Wests. However, after being sent in, Billy Simotas went off like a cannon, blasting 93 in 30 overs, and playing the wide array of aggressive shots we know he is capable of producing. The side did not waste this fine start and finished

with 8 for 244 off 49 overs.

When our turn in the field came around, the strong team effort continued with the bowlers performing tightly and the fielders responding. It was particularly pleasing to see four run-outs occur in the Easts innings as we applied continuous pressure to the opposition. We dismissed Easts for 204 giving us a win by 40 runs in what was truly a sweet moment for us all.

In the final we came up against ANU, and after losing the toss were asked to bowl first on a very flat O'Connor track. From that point on we never looked back, bowling well and fielding with desperation. Opening bowler Paul Roberts rose to the occasion in taking 3 wickets (2 in his 1st Over) and completing a direct hit run-out from the boundary. Paul was supported by all bowlers but especially Mick Le Riche who took 2 for 16 off his 10 overs and frustrated the batsmen into throwing away their wickets at the other end. (Yes Tinker, you may consider that a sledge!)

ANU were dismissed for 126 which was never going to be enough against our side who were determined to win. A solid opening partnership of 93 ensured the victory would be heading our way, with Bill Simotas again showing out with another half century. Unfortunately, the loss of 5 wickets for 4 runs while needing only 8 runs for victory, took some of the shine off our cup, but nevertheless, the One-Day Premiership was ours and the club and players involved can be proud of the efforts produced.

Looking at individual performances this season, there were many bright points to discuss, although inconsistency let most players down.

Bill Simotas had an excellent season in 3rd Grade and produced many fine innings. Although particularly starring in the One-Day Competition, Bill showed his power and range of shots throughout the season and only has to tighten up his defence and mental approach to succeed at higher levels.

Another player to blossom this season, and in particular after Christmas, was Simon Brady. Simon batted with a lot more confidence this season, and despite his life in the fast lane as a multi-media mega star, it was a pleasure to be able to rely on his batting each game as he proved to be one of the more

consistent performers.

A pleasing factor was the introduction of several promising younger players this season. Andrew Armstrong and Murray Eastman showed they have the ability and temperament to go far, performing well when their limited opportunities arose. Another young batsmen who showed he has a lot to offer the club is Rohan McDonald. I would suggest he is an exciting player to keep your eye on (if you can stomach it!), and will go as far with our club as his mental approach will allow.

To the bowlers none stood out more than legspinner Steve Broadbent. Steve claimed around 40 wickets, and while still having a lot to learn of his art, he progressed magnificently this season. Steve performed with distinction in both competitions, and his determination each week was an example to all.

Of the other bowlers, there were several solid performers, with Paul Roberts being the pick of the bunch. Paul in his first season with the club, produced many lion-hearted efforts, never giving in and producing pace and bounce which consistently worried the opposition. Shane Bellchambers bowled very well on a number of occasions, but generally lacked the control to be far more effective over the entire season.

Just before wrapping up, a point I would like to discuss is the make-up of the side, and for that matter the other lower grade sides. In 3rd Grade, it was usually a case of the men against the boys, and while I believe this in general is not a bad thing, I am sure had we possessed a sprinkling of "old heads", we would have been a far better performed side. Several of us were fortunate enough as youngsters to have played with the likes of Gerry Garrity and Geoff Gelding, and while players of this calibre and experience are not easy to find, we learned a great deal from them, much of which is only now becoming evident with the improving performances of players such as Simon Brady and Steve Broadbent. I believe the club is heading toward a position now where some of its more experienced players are approaching the end of their careers, and while of course there are commitments outside cricket, and players cannot be blamed for wishing to go out on top, I believe the club would benefit greatly if its younger players were given the opportunity to play alongside high quality players with such experience.



Finally, I would like to thank the players for their increased commitment over the season and the fun we had along the way. I am sure that all plyers can improve their games next season, and that the level and quality of enjoyment we experienced this year will not deteriorate next season with greater commitment and the winning of more games.

Two-day competition: Another one that got away.

With the exception of one hiccup, Wests proved themselves to be the best side in the competition but after seemingly home, lost the 1st semi-final in a nailbiter to a Tuggeranong team that had a providential escape.

The highlight of Wests (6/209) vs Norths (164) in Round 1 surprisingly didn't occur on the field. In an unfortunately well documented incident the captain (O'Lawry) wishing to have the half hour before stumps at a weary opposition battered by a chanceless club debut innings from Ian Shaw enquired of the scorer (who shall remain nameless) how many Ian was on at the time. Richard Wyche replied 97. O'Lawry against the best interests of the team, allowed Shaw to score another 4 runs and when the cheering and car-horns had subsided promptly declared the innings closed. History will show that Ian remained 96 n.o. and will also show that in Round 2 vs Weston Creek, R. Wyche was run-out for 26. The not out batsman at the time : I. Shaw.

Round 3 vs Woden produced some of the best individual performances of the season with Steve Matthews (122) and Chris Clapp (57 n.o.) boosting the score to 6/287. Richard Toomey put seven deliveries on the wicket and collected 7/45 and supported by Paul Roberts (3/39 and 3/19) routed Woden for 110; then narrowly failed to secure the outright with Woden 9/184 in the second innings.

Ginninderra were unfortunate to witness the debut of one of the most promising youngsters that this club has seen for years. Luke Healy blasted his way to 84 in around the same time that it takes Hendo to score a duck. Ably assisted by Clappy (55), who teamed with Damian Madden (7) in a 73 run opening partnership, and Craig Smith (37). Luke proceeded to destroy a few bowling reputations (K. Boyd 1-76 off 7 and N. White 1-41 off 4). David Middleton chipped in with 44 and the innings closed at 307. Ginninderra could only manage 91 and 152 thanks to Mick Molony (3-15 and 3-55), Middleton (2-28 and 4-29) and Clappy (3-21).

Round 5 vs Easts was a disgrace. Probably too cocky after the previous week we were unable to overcome their experienced accurate attack, and were carved up for 87 and 57 whilst Easts blazed away for 4/234. It was also unfortunate that with defeat imminent two of our batsmen failed to turn up on Day 2 (one of them was promptly promoted to 4th Grade for the next round).

Round 6 and again all the entertainment was off the ground. ANU needing to win to stake a claim for the finals made their desperation plainly obvious with a few home town decisions that would have embarrassed Barry Gomersall, and nearly earned Ironjaw O'Bradman a couple of stints in the sin-bin. Day 2 commenced with ANU 182 and Wests 3-60, the ground four foot under and the rain continuing to drench the oval as much as it drenched the ANU players who were taking turns to sweep the pitch. As it was as clear as the nose on Bill Simotas' face that even if it were to stop raining there was no possible chance of playing, the rest of the team retired to the club while the captain stayed with his sinking car. With great amusement we watched that academic genius Julian Oakley direct his fellow age-entry students, who armed with sponges and buckets and regularly wringing out their catweazle beards whilst standing in water lapping their shins above their sandalled socks, failed to stem the tide. Every 30 minutes for 3 hours they would slosh over to the slowly submerging SAAB, point to a spot of white cloud (in contrast to the black cloud overhead) on the horizon and gurlge "looks like it might break shortly".

Round 7 and another swashbuckling Luke Healy innings of 58 along with Shane Baird (33), Richard Wyche (29) and Mick Molony's season top score (6) gave us a solid 210 to defend. Adam Radford (2-23), Tony Williams (3-25) and John Fuller (2-22) wrapped up the Tuggeranong innings for 144.

Round 8 and with the distinct possibility of an understaffed team the selectors made the daring move of deciding to blood two unlikely but keen newcomers, and give them a chance to gain valuable experience alongside hardened campaigners such as Tenaglia, Wyatt and Moy. Stan Widera stole the honours from the other newcomer, Greg Besomo (who showed some ability) when resplendent in his blue shorts and Richmond footy socks he "aussie-rules style" leapt three feet into the air and took a screaming one-hander in front of his ankles. Beso however was more sedate when scoring his 48 runs in our total of 117 having overtaken Queanbeyan's 91, 8 wickets down. Batting a second time John Fuller's mates from Struggletown managed a respectable 136 leaving us with 110 to win in just over two hours. Luke Healy (63) and Chris Clapp (33) made it with just an hour to spare. 113 off 20 overs!

Round 9, sitting 20 points clear of second and playing the last placed team, City, was always going to be an anticlimax. But somebody forgot to tell Greg Besomo that. City began their 1st innings poorly (4-18) and ended it worse (5-10) but somehow ended up with 100 on the board. Luke Healy (64) and Damian Madden (4) put on 75 for the 1st wicket. Then the Greg Besomo show began. A 54

run partnership with Madden (24) a 33 run partnership with Fuller (0) and overnight he was 175 n.o. and the score 3-309. I should mention that at the club that night one particular bearded, left-handed Victorian, ex-batsman who at the time held the record at 178, was unusually generous with the shouts and attempted to convince me that the innings should close overnight for the teams benefit and that personal goals should run a distant second. His attempts to blackmail me failed however and Beso went on to blaze a club record 202 n.o. (after being dropped on 199) and the innings closed at 3-351. City understandably crumbled for 89.

The semi-final. 148; Clappy (31), Luke Healy (52) was never going to be enough however when seven wickets fell for 54 and Tuggeranong were 9-132 we were nearly home. A couple of snicks through slips, a couple more just over fieldsmens heads and the whole season slipped through our fingers.

A disappointing end but not a disappointing season. The conduct of each and every player that pulled on the 5th grade socks was only matched by the teamsmanship and spirit in which they played the game.

The talent that was unearthed will serve the higher grades admirably in future seasons. Ben Healy was consistently our best bowler, given experience he will give meatheads like Toomey and Barnes something to think about. Ben Houston and Mick Moloney gave 100%. Shane Baird and Chris Clapp (if they ever play a full season) will prove to be more than competent all-rounders and won't be playing 5th Grade. Ian Shaw and Richard Wyche will play in higher grades next season and if Luke Healy isn't shaking hands with the 2nd grade captain then I'm a poor judge. Hopefully it will be the West's 2nd grade captain.

To all who played and assisted the 5th Grade side, thank you for an enjoyable season.
