

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Gentlemen,

The 1977/78 season is now behind us and I think it is most important that we reflect briefly on the "debits" and "credits" of the Club's ninth season in A.C.T.C.A. competition.

Firstly, my congratulations are extended to the Second Grade side, under Gerald Garrity, on taking out the Premiership for 1977/78. It was a fine team performance from possibly the best Second Grade side the Club has fielded for many years, reflecting, I believe, the highly competitive situation that the Club was fortunate to experience in all grades during the season. It is heartening to observe the progress being made in the senior grades by "the younger brigade" and the Club's policy of blending youth and experience is producing encouraging results. I am sure 1978/79 will produce similar results.

I am sure it was apparent to most of you that cricket is no exception when it comes to "paying to play". Cricket is becoming increasingly expensive, as capital and other costs continue to impose considerable burdens on each of us. Your Committee was able to contain subscriptions at a reasonable level during the season, but this task will be much harder next season unless we all make a conscientious effort to support our fund raising efforts. I would particularly like to thank Treasurer, Gerald Garrity for astutely steering the Club's "budget" through a difficult year.

Next season will bring to an end the concept of District cricket as we have known it in Canberra for many years. While we as a Club expressed reservations to the A.C.T.C.A. on the appropriateness of introducing "non-district" club cricket in the ACT, it was decided to abolish district boundaries as from 1978/79. It is to be hoped that Canberra cricket is "mature" enough to accommodate this sudden change and that the standard of cricket and associated facilities do not suffer as a result.

Unfortunately the Club is losing the services of affable Honorary Secretary, David Munt who has emigrated back to Adelaide. My thanks are extended to David for a sterling job during the season and we wish him and his family the best of good fortune in their new endeavour.

The Club was fortunate to have the "backing" of Western District Rugby Union Club Inc. during the season. I sincerely thank our Vice-President, Bernie Ashmore and his Board of Directors for their generous support, particularly the "Happy Hours" after cricket on Saturdays.

It is important that we further develop our close affinity with the licensed Club on an ongoing basis. Most of you will be aware that we will be "bowling a few over" at the Club every Friday night during the "off" season - hope to see YOU AND YOURS there sometime!

Considerable effort again went into the preparation of both Aranda and O'Connor centre wickets, as well as, the Aranda practice strips during the season. This involvement taxed our limited resources to such an extent that the Committee agreed to recommend to the in-coming Committee that, in 1978/79, we direct our efforts to preparing wickets solely at O'Connor Oval. This move is seen as a positive step to ease the burden of wicket preparation, improve practice facilities generally and centralise our activities.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who contributed to the running of the Club during the season. As in most organisations, the work involved tends to fall on relatively few members. I trust that next season it will be possible to more equitably spread the "chores". While the A.C.T.C.A. is only as strong as the Clubs within it, similarly the Clubs are only as strong and active as their members make them.

I am confident that 1978/79 will be another successful season for the Westies. I thank the outgoing Management Committee for its support during the season and wish the incoming Committee and all members every success for the season ahead.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Gentlemen,

One of the early decisions which faced the Management Committee was the determination of the number of teams to be entered in the various competitions. In the past two seasons with the introduction of the sub-district competition, the club had entered five teams in all. With the failure of one of those sides in 1976/77 to meet its playing commitments, considerable thought had to be given as to the number of teams fielded this season. It should be realised by members that such a decision had to be made some weeks before the commencement of the season. At the time when teams had to be entered there were only 44 players known to be available to the club. It was assumed that possibly up to another 15 would become available even before the competition started, but to enter four teams there is a prerequisite that there must be fifteen players for each side. With some hesitation only four teams were entered. By the

time the first round was due the numbers had swelled beyond 60. However, for the first two matches some 18 players were unavailable and not only did this make selection difficult, with a constant revamping of sides, but, the club barely met its commitment for the first round.

Over the Christmas holiday period to get four teams on the field was a harrowing experience and selectors were virtually forced to go into the highways and byways seeking players. Clearly the decision to enter four teams was correct, for if we had registered five sides we would have had to forfeit several matches. Decisions of this nature must be a year-by-year proposition and players will have to be approached well before the start of a season as to their constant availability. The Management Committee is also of the opinion that too many players withdraw for lack of genuine reasons. It believes that players have a commitment to be available as much as possible.

The Grade competition was conducted with two complete rounds. A major departure from past practices occurred in the first match where first grade was played on a two-day basis over the long weekend in October while the lower grades were conducted as 38 over matches on the Saturday. This appears to be the first recognition by the ACT Cricket Association that there can be a need to cater for different situations for different teams, and the precedent that was created here might be considered a forerunner to what could eventuate in future where first grade matches may be played under different and longer conditions than for other grades. In the sub-district competition – one complete round and part of the second round were scheduled prior to the semi-finals.

A change in the club's consititution relating to the selection panels was made and some evaluation of the new system was sought at the end of the season. Disappointingly too few players took the opportunity to comment, though it seems that most favoured the new format.

The club entered a team in the twilight competition and won its first round match decisively, but was beaten on a count back in its semi-final against the ultimate winners Woden. The club won a minor prize in the competition conducted by the Ginninderra Cricket Club. The Committee congratulates these clubs on their enterprise in conducting these competitions.

At association level significant changes will be introduced in the 1978/79 season. The most notable of these is the abandonment of district boundaries, which is referred to in the President's Report.

The fourth grade competition is to be re-introduced in the coming season and new clubs Ginninderra and Weston Creek will participate in third and fourth grade.

The response to the start-of-season social was most discouraging to members of the Social Committee. Because of this lack of interest few activities were subsequently arranged. This perennial problem raises the question of whether members wish to hold specific functions or prefer to restrict their socializing to the weekly get-togethers after their Saturday cricket.



JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT

The commencement of the season was hectic - nineteen teams were registered, a record for Wests Juniors. They comprised four teams in under 10's, four in under 11's, two in under 12's, three in under 13's, two in under 14's, one in under 15's, and three in under 16's. Our Kit Officer, Terry Hudson, is congratulated for arranging the kits in time for the first matches.

It is the feeling of the Junior Committee that in the future the seniors could endeavour to play a more active role in junior cricket. This would encourage the building of our teams for tomorrow. It could be achieved with visits on a monthly basis by our first graders to either practice sessions or, maybe accompany a team on a Saturday morning game. Most of our coaches are parents, some with little cricket experience, and with this type of assistance not only would we be giving our young players enormous help but also building club spirit that would extend throughout our district.

On behalf of the club and Junior Committee I would like to pay tribute to the efforts put in by our coaches, managers and helpers, for without the dedication and the time these people put in a lot of boys would be missing out on their cricket.

The Coaching Clinic conducted by hard working club member, Gerry Garrity, was most appreciated. It assisted the new coaches with ideas on setting up their practice sessions and was good revision for our longer standing coaches.

Results

While the emphasis is on participating and sportsmanship, cricket is a competitive game and winning is part of that. Wests record this year is outstanding. We had ten teams in the semi-finals, three being minor premiers. However, good fortune was not to be all our way in the finals, as we could only manage two premierships — under 16 divisions 1 and 2. With the two under 16 teams winning their divisions it is guaranteed that Wests seniors will have some outstanding prospects for grade teams in the 78/79 season. Also, on the credit side, many of our boys made representative honours.

My appreciation is extended to the hard working committee. I was fortunate to have assisting me: Joan and Denis Coley as Secretary/Treasurer and result administrators; Ted Forster as Publicity Officer; Terry Hudson for giving up his garage and controlling the many pieces of equipment that are required for nineteen teams; Alan Heggen, our Registrar General; the co-ordinators, under 16 Tom Goynich, under 15 Ron Harris, under 14 Arthur O'Sullivan, under 13 Terry Hudson, under 12 Gerry Walsh, under 11 Gerry Garrity, under 10 Jim Eastman. I wish to extend to these people the club's and my congratulations on a job well done.

HON. TREASURER'S REPORT

Audited financial statements appear as a supplement to this report. They reflect a slight improvement in the club's financial position in the twelve months. Perusal of these statements should hardly cause complacency amongst the members.

In reviewing the accounts members should not lose sight of the fact that the club fielded only four sides this year and in so doing new equipment by way of bats, pads, and stumps was considerably less than in a normal year as reserve stocks from the fifth kit were utilised rather than new equipment obtained. The cost of equipment next year will be considerably higher if the club is to field more than four teams. Further it should be stressed that this new equipment will have to be procured in the last few weeks of September and unless there is a change in the due date for subscriptions difficulties in meeting these early payments can be anticipated.

In previous years the subscription payment has been by installments and this has resulted in two unsatisfactory aspects; firstly, income is not received when it is most needed, that is, at the beginning of the season, and secondly, there seems no great urgency for players to pay subscriptions by the due dates as no penalties for late payments are incurred. It is suggested that consideration be given to payment of the full subscription by 15 October with late payments attracting \$5 a month surcharge. Whilst this may sound harsh it should ensure that funds are available when

required and in addition it will eliminate the administrative inconveniences caused through numerous phone calls, posting of letters and the like to remind players of their dues. More than 25% of members were not financial at the end of February.

The President in his report emphasised the likelihood of the club preparing wickets at O'Connor Oval only in the coming season. This move which was discussed in detail by the Management Committee takes into account many factors one of which includes finance. The implementation of this recommendation would mean that an additional \$400 would have to be paid for ground rentals in the coming season. When the loss of revenue from ground hirings on Sundays is considered, the club will need to raise an additional \$600 overall to compensate for such a move; this amount will have to be borne by the members probably by way of an increase in subscriptions, and the present subscription is hardly an enticement to cricketers now that residential barriers have been lifted.

The club was indeed appreciative of the support given it by way of a donation from the Western District Rugby Football Club Inc. Our club donated \$100 to the ACT Schoolboys Team which toured New Zealand and gave \$20 to each of the four club members chosen. The Management Committee would be delighted in future years to increase these payments substantially; however, on present indications without an injection of funds from some source this does not seem feasible.

Club members should be aware that no direct appeal by way of raffles and the like was arranged within the club. The previous season, fund raising was disappointing but it would seem that unless there is sizable increase in members subscriptions next year, a positive fund raising campaign will be required. This matter has been suggested in the past but the enthusiasm and dedication of people has always wavered. I would suggest an all out drive be made next season. A form of sponsorship has been discussed by the Management Committee and some firm details should be available at the Annual Meeting.

FIRST GRADE

After winning successive premierships the 1977/78 season was a disappointing one when after scraping into fourth place we were beaten in the semi-final.

We started well winning the first round outright and winning the next two rounds on the first innings. From then on things started to go wrong. Our batting was brittle and while our opening bowlers often took early wickets we had trouble dismissing sides. With only fair fielding it was inevitable that wins would be hard to find.

I guess the writing was on the wall the season before, but in the flush of victory we failed to heed the signs. Our ability to apply ourselves in tight situations wasn't good enough and while we were all prepared to theorise few bothered to do the necessary "hard yacka" to alter the situation. "She'll be right" was a statement heard too often.

Both batting and bowling were to blame. It was particularly significant that only once in the season could we top 200. The semi-final showed that given reasonable scores our bowlers could dismiss sides for what should have been winning totals. Tony Irvine was easily the best of the bats with 385 runs at 25. There was little else to brighten the batting scene. We tried four openers losing Barry Andrews overseas (a severe loss), and David Munt to the seconds. Sid Smith and Alan Stephens opened from round six onwards. While they had certainly earned their places they rarely managed to click together. Alan's high spot was a century against his old club Norths. A fine effort! Greg Beacroft showed some consolidation after his blooding the year before but needs to curb early rashness to build big scores. He has the desire to succeed and will make it - fielding first class! The tragedies of the year were Russell Rogers and Col Rowe. Both had been our top batsmen the year before but had seasons they would both rather forget. Add Doug Osborne's poor form and it was easy to see why the side couldn't put together winning scores.

Wicketkeeper-batsman Bruce Willett showed glimpses of his batting potential, certainly sufficient to be given the onerous task of batting at number three towards the end of the year. Some technical problems to iron out and he'll be on the way. Behind the stumps he improved all the time and Bruce can be well pleased with his first season in first grade. Dene Moore finally made a few runs this season and helped lift some paltry scores to a semblance of respectability.

Of the bowlers Andy McDonald had his best season ever - 57 wickets at 14 apiece. Andy tried hard, his second innings effort in the semi-final was lion-hearted. This man showed what work is all about and his enthusiasm and drive both in a game and at practice earned their just rewards. Other players earned theirs in other ways! A back injury in the second half of the season didn't help Dene Moore who finished with 44 wickets at 10.2. Mal Hall took 27 wickets but sometimes found the going hard. His task was often made harder by the "uphill into the wind" role he played. Geoff Gelding took 17 wickets in a keen display and wasn't helped by poor fielding in some games. While the attack lacked penetration at times, it was rare for the opposition to completely dominate it.

In summary the season was bitterly disappointing and we will have to work a lot harder to recapture our former top position. The time has come for the easy-going attitude to be replaced by some dedication and enthusiasm, to replace excuses with some grit and determination. The skill is still there but some application is sorely needed.

My thanks to Lorna Hall for a first rate scoring job and to the side for their support. Thank you also to those who worked on wickets during the season.



SECOND GRADE

The second grade side broke new ground in winning the premiership for the first time since the club's inception. The side played positively throughout the season and much of its success can be attributed to its approach. The season started on a high note, with first innings points being obtained in each of the first four matches. Then followed a loss by four runs to South Woden, while in its next game a defiant 30 run partnership for the last wicket by Queanbeyan saw it overtake the West's score by a mere four runs. Thereafter the team did not look back. It was fortunate that in each of the five 48 over matches the side batted first - it won these and proceeded to win all other matches up to and including the final.

There were occasions during the year when matches hung in the balance, but thanks to the experience of many players and a positive team approach the side proved itself to be above average by winning even from unfavourable positions. An example of this was evidenced in the last round when, chasing 252 runs in three hours, plus the mandatory 15 overs, West's batsmen approached the target with only one thought in mind - a win - and this was achieved with a loss of only five wickets with eight overs still to be bowled.

The team was well served by opening batsmen and Alan Stephens and Sid Smith with partnerships of 101 against Woden, and 102 the following Saturday, set the standard. After their promotion to first grade others readily filled the bill. Alistair Meek and David Munt combined with stands of 94 (in the semi-final) and 90 against South Woden. On these, and other occasions, the batsmen did not grind out the runs but rather played in a natural vein taking the initiative from the bowlers. David and Alistair, each of whom played only in the latter part of the series of the season, were consistent run-getters. In his limited opportunities as opener, Bob Allan scored a personal half-century on two occasions.

The middle order batting was dependable with Steve Marshall and Vic Cristofani topping the three hundred mark. Vic's 92 made in 75 minutes against Woden speaks for itself. With Steve adding the necessary solidity, the side was able to build high scores. There were five new partnership records during the year and Vic and Steve figured prominently in some of these. The best was not seen of Doug Osborne though he played an important role against ANU with his 60 in that game virtually clinching the win.

In their limited appearances Martin Chambers, and Kevin Balkin batted reliably. Kevin's magnificent 60 not out in the semi-final was one which produced all the shots in the book. His effort in the final also proved most significant; in that match the batting contributions of our last four; Ron Winter (19), Kevin Balkin (15 no), Wayne Matthews (9), and Des Kiernan (13), should be seen in relation to the low scores by both sides. The purposefulness of this rear guard action was characteristic of the side throughout the year.

Due to frequent unavailability too little was seen of Murray Spinks. However, with both bat and ball he chimed in to play a decisive part in some of the side's wins.

Many bowlers were tried during the year and most achieved a reasonable degree of success. In the final Bob Allan and Wayne Matthews accounted for 8 of the 9 victims that fell to bowlers with Bob's contribution of 6 for 46 being the bowling highlight of the season. Wickets did not come as frequently as in previous years to "Lofty", but his 7 for 61 against Northern Suburbs was outstanding; and how vital it was that he wrapped up the final when he rattled the stumps of the last two batsmen. Phil Mitchell and Fred Peppinck shared the opening attack at various times with credit.

Spinners were a vital part of the attack and as revealed by the statistics accounted for more than half of the wickets which fell to bowlers. Gerald Garrity with 52 wickets produced the biggest haul though Geoff Gelding early in the season and later Kevin Balkin, Des Kiernan, and David Munt gave more than adequate support with variation and penetration.

No fewer than five wicket keepers (including Sid Smith on a parttime basis) were used including four in the last five matches. Tim Driscoll was behind the stumps in the first 10 matches and his keeping went from strength to strength. Unfortunately he contracted glandular fever and was unavailable for the remaining matches at a time when his keeping and determined batting were at their peak. Martin Chambers gave an excellent display in the semi-final taking two sharp catches while the performance of Steve Marshall in the final was outstanding. In the wicket keeping department the club lost nothing in comparison with other clubs. However, the fielding generally seldom rose to great heights with too many chances being put to ground.

But, over and above the actual cricket there were aspects which were indeed heartening and these included the co-operation and organisation needed to enjoy an afternoon's cricket. Everyone bought a "plate" for afternoon tea, and all players did more than their share of work in setting up the flags, scoreboard, scorers table, and stumps before the start of

a match. When players had to stand in as unofficial umpires or substitute in the field, there were volunteers. Many of these aspects are considered by too many cricketers as being a chore but this side had a spirit of co-operation and invariably there were many people willing to do their share.

I would also like to compliment the players on their attitude and unequivocal acceptance of umpiring decisions. It is inevitable that doubtful decisions will occur - it happens in test matches, it happens in shield matches, and it will happen in any level of cricket, and whilst there were many cases of players not agreeing with a decision there were no external exhibitions on the field and for this all players are to be complimented on their demeanour which reflected great credit on the club.

The side's appreciation is extended to Peter Bradley who filled in in the last match of the rounds and was 12th man for both the semi-final and the final. We were delighted to have Peter there for these games, and in the field he showed great agility including an outstanding catch in the semi-final. Greg Cristofani, when available, acted as scorer and for his part the team wishes to express its thanks!

Finally, I would like to express my personal appreciation to each and every member who played with the side during the season. The season was an enjoyable one - not merely because we took out the flag, but rather because it seemed that players realised that cricket can be both competitive and enjoyable.

Although the smallest player in the competition he was highly regarded by all opponents who saw him bat.

In summary, it could be said that with a little more application by all players a number of losses could well have gone in the team's favour. Although an enjoyable season played in the best spirit of the game, it could be said that the team never quite achieved what it could have or should have.
