PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

It gives me much pleasure to deliver my eighth Presidential report as a preface to our seventeenth Annual Report covering the 1985/86 season.

As we reflect on the highs and lows of the season, I believe the Club made encouraging progress in many areas during the season. While success on the field was not as pronounced as we might have wished, one cannot help but observe the 'intangible' successes realised in other areas. Firstly, it was encouraging to observe the further development of our junior brigade, both on the field and in the administrative arena. Given that a large slice of our senior base from 1984/85 were no longer with us, considerable pressure was brought to bear on our younger members - to their credit and in difficult circumstances, I believe promising progress was made.

We were unlucky to lose the services of many of our senior players from last season, and given the return next season of many of these members, it seems to me that the ingredients for success next season should come together.

This season was one of rebuilding for the club and what must be done during the off-season and next year is to fertilise the seeds that have been sown. It was evident at our Past/Present player function that there are past members who are prepared to devote a little of their increasingly scarce time towards the further development of the Club. This is exactly what the Club needs if we are to progress further. We must acquire greater professionalism through the services of non-playing administrators. The pressure on player-administrators must be alleviated if the Club, and for that matter the ACTCA, is to achieve its longer term ambitions. I believe it is imperative to redirect club and sponsorship funds towards a more professional administrative base. For example, we must consider devoting club and sponsorship funds towards the more efficient and professional delivery of:-

- . secretarial, promotional and communicative services
- pitch preparation, ground maintenance and services
- senior/junior club liaison and management
- inputs into ACTCA policy development and implementation

The upgrading of our scarce resource base will not be successful if we

refuse to recognise the need to attract our own additional sponsorship base. We have for too long, I believe, hung our coat tails on the generosity of Wests Club Inc. for sponsorship support. While much of this support has been reciprocated through our use of Club Inc. facilities etc. the time has come for us to reach further afield for support - and which can be justified on reciprocal grounds.

One of our eminent local cricket writers referred during the season to the fact that Wests are a 'proud' Club. While I would be the first to agree with this compliment, we must ponder collectively on the basis for the remark and the need for its perpetuity! We can be proud of the achievements of the Club since its inception in 1969 and this should be the benchmark for our ongoing growth - pride in playing for Wests and pride in our past and future achievements.

This inevitably gets us back to our own individual goals and longer term objectives - if we want to achieve these badly enough, we will achieve them and our pride will be further enhanced. Have you written down your goals for next season and beyond?

At this point, I would like to award my annual accolades to those members who contributed over and above the call of duty to the management of the Club:-

Michael Brady, as Chairman of Selectors, whose indefatigable resolve and patience deserve the highest praise and thanks

Peter Cook, groundsman superiere at Aranda, whose diligent efforts transposed the Aranda pitch from mediocrity to above average quality

Ken Norris, while ousted for the season through injury, provided great input towards improving our junior development and liaison

Marcus Cosgrave, the youngest social committee co-ordinator in the ACT, who did a great job in mustering a social programme together against difficult odds Gerry Garrity, who with Ken Norris, took a long hard look at the administrative structure of the Club, the fruits of which should be harvested at the ${\sf AGM}$

I would also like to place on record my personal thanks to the Board and Secretary/Manager of Wests Club Inc. for their valuable assistance over the years, particularly in regard to sponsorship assistance through Beazley and Bruce. This assistance has been instrumental in enabling the fee structure of the Club to be kept within reasonable limits and to help us provide better facilities for members. We must acknowledge this with a more unified effort in supporting our licensed club wherever possible.

As this may well be my final term as President for some time, I would like to thank all those members who have assisted in making my terms of office rewarding and fulfilling. I hope to be able to contribute in other ways towards the betterment of our club over the ensuing years and I would like to wish the incoming committee the best of good fortune.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The past season was reasonably successful with the Sub-district side winning the competition in the City and Suburban Competition and the First Grade losing on the last ball of the game in the Twilight Final. The Club did not maintain its own high playing standards and finished in its lowest position on the Club Championship for many years.

The Club experienced a greater than usual departure of players due to work transfers and illness. This, however, did not affect the social activities within the Club.

The social highlight of the year was undoubtedly the Reunion evening in March. Many former players enjoyed the evening at O'Connor Oval and it is to be hoped that these players will be willing to assist next season either as players or Administrators.

Already Wayne Boardman has expressed his intention to nominate for the Presidency following Geoff Gelding's decision not to seek a further term. The good news is that Geoff won't be lost to the Club as he has advised that he will continue as a player and has offered assistance administratively.

David Matthews and David Hunt have also indicated that they intend to seek positions on the Management Committee. Their experience will be invaluable in the coming season, and will take some pressure off current players serving on the Management Committee.

During the season the Management Committee has continued along the path towards incorporation.

For the first time the Club fielded a team in the City and Suburban Competition with great success.

Apart from some minor criticism of the O'Connor pitch the Club again was not involved with the Cricket Committee on disciplinary or other matters.

The Club again maintained a strong liaison with the Western District Rugby union Club Inc. While losing the direct contact with the Board through

not having one of our members as a Director, a number of other members maintained strong links with the Club Inc. It can be said that the liaison has been strengthened in 1985/86 as has been the liaison between the Club Inc. and the other affiliated clubs. The Cricket Club is once again grateful to the Club Inc., the Board, staff and members for its financial assistance, provision of Club facilities and its support of the first grade team at major matches. Unfortunately our Club will not be receiving an upfront grant from the Club Inc. next season. Rather we will secure a proportion of ticket sales to functions held by the Club Inc. This will mean that we will have to work harder to sell tickets in the future. The Club Inc. provided assistance for the purchase of a Bowling Machine for use at Aranda Oval. This facility, once operating, will be invaluable not only for this Club including its Juniors but possibly women cricketers who use the Aranda Oval practice pitches.

The collection of annual subscriptions and the incentive scheme introduced in recent seasons resulted once again to a good response from members. Most took advantage of the early payment incentive and so the Club had an ample cash inflow when needed early in the season. Even late subscriptions caused less bother than in past seasons. It is therefore essential to maintain such a system in the future.

The other fund raising methods during the season were meat tray raffles, ground hire and a cricket bat raffle. The meat tray raffles are a good money-raiser, however we had problems in arranging suitable rosters for people to sell tickets. This activity is a good fund-raiser and must be maintained.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

It is my pleasure to present the 1985/86 financial statements for the Western District Cricket Club.

While the objectives of the Club do not include the making of profits, it is considered prudent to budget for a small surplus each year. This allows the Club to maintain its sound financial position which in turn enables it to meet its financial obligations without struggling. Additionally, the Club isafforded greater flexibility to pursue initiatives for the benefit of members. An example of this was the purchase of the bowling machine this year. To assist in this purchase, we were advised that we had been allocated a grant of \$2,000 by the Western District Rugby Union Club Inc. out of sponsorship funds from Beasley & Bruce. However, Beasley & Bruce's sponsorship of the Licensed Club was withdrawn prior to the finalisation of the purchase with the result that we received only \$1,000 of the original allocation. That the Club was able to complete the purchase, at a cost of \$2,100 was due to its good financial position which is the result of sound financial management in previous years. For this we have much to thank previous committees. I think it would be fair to say that much of the credit should go to Gerry Garrity, who after 8 years decided not to seek re-election as treasurer for this year.

Additionally, the investment of the Club's funds provides income which is used for the benefit of members. If this income were not received then additional funds would have to be raised, most likely from members in the form of increased subscriptions.

The financial contribution of the Licensed Club should be acknowledged. This year we received what has tended to be regarded as an annual grant of \$1,000 as well as the special purpose grant previously referred to. The Committee has been advised by the Licensed Club that these grants will not be forthcoming in the same form in the immediate future due to continued depressed trading conditions. Nevertheless, we should be appreciative of the financial support given to us by the Licensed Club over the years.

In place of grants, the Club will receive commissions on various functions held at the Licensed Club as well as on new memberships from cricket club members (members will also not be required to pay nomination fees). It is

therefore up to us to support the Licensed Club for them to support us.

During the year the Club received \$240 in such commissions. These have been carried forward to be taken up as income next year when no grant will be received.

It is important for members to realise that, as previously stated, the Club is not out to make large profits at the expense of members. An example of this is reflected in the net cost of social functions this year of \$1,522. This includes a total of \$1,377 for the reunion barbeque and presentation night of which approximately half was provided by the social levy.

It may be considered that more could be provided by the Club, especially in the form of practice balls and equipment. Members are advised that while funds are available to upgrade these facilities, the Committee is not prepared to waste members' money buying equipment which is not respected by some members - practice balls have a tendency to "walk". Until members accept that they all have a responsibility for looking after practice equipment and organising the conduct of practice, this situation is likely to continue.

My thanks are extended to all those who helped throughout the year. This includes Jamie Clout for his duties as Assistant Treasurer, Marcus Cosgrave and other members of the social committee for collection of fees at functions, Craig Henderson, Phil O'Brien and Ken Norris for attendance at Friday night raffles at the Licensed Club, Eddie Wheeler for liaison with the Junior section of the Club and to Gerry Garrity for his helpful tips throughout the year.

Finally, I mention two matters which will come up for members' consideration at the Annual General Meeting. These are firstly, the issue of subscriptions for next season and secondly, the incorporation of the Club. In relation to the former, I will simply say that members have to decide whether to raise funds directly from subscriptions or to reduce the level of direct subscriptions by embarking on additional fund raising activities. Whichever course is adopted, it is important that all members contribute equally whether in time and effort or in dollars.

As far as incorporation is concerned, it is in the interest of members to vote in favour of adopting the new constitution and proceeding to incorporate. This will eliminate the possibility of liability for the Club's debts falling on individual members of the Club. In relation to this, the substantial efforts

of David Hunt, David Matthews, Ken Norris and Gerry Garrity in preparing for incorporation should be acknowledged.

JUNIOR CRICKET REPORT

The 1985/86 season, while in terms of premierships not as successful as previous years, was nevertheless successful for a variety of other reasons. The Under 15 Division 1 team was the only team to win a premiership beating the powerful Ginninderra side in a game in which Wests took control with a memorable bowling and fielding performance on the first day. This was followed up with a near 100 run partnership by Wests two ACT representatives, Mark Cooney and Mark Clapp, which clinched the victory with several overs to spare. Coach Tim Healy has every reason to be proud of this team, which will be a formidable combination in the Under 16's next season.

While this was the only premiership, two other teams made finals - the Under 16 Division 3 team coached by Derek Gould and the Under 13 Division 2 team coached by Graeme Bonnett. Both teams fought the good fight and made their opponents battle all the way. Three other teams had made the semi-finals in the Under 13-16 age group.

The real success story for the Juniors related to the Under 10 and 11 age groups. Even though these age groups do not compete for a premiership their competition is still very keen. In the Under 10's, the Division 1 team and one of the Division 2 teams only lost one and two games respectively out of 18 games. The Under 11 Division 1 team fared only slightly worse. This team was comprised entirely of boys from the school, coached and managed by some of the parents, but proudly wearing their blue Wests caps. So successful was the association of this team with our Junior organisation that there is a very strong chance that another team from the school will seek to play with us next season.

Finally a tribute should be paid to all the coaches who gave so much of their time in coaching and organising the teams. A special thanks is in order for Ben Healy and Paul Healy who coached an Under 10 and 11 team respectively when parental support could not be found. Without their generosity two teams of boys would not have got a game at all.

I have every confidence that the 1986/87 season will be even more successful than 1985/86 was.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

It was said at the beginning of the year and indeed throughout the year, that the first grade side consistently made the final four over the past few years. In that respect our performance in finishing fifth this year could be seen as disappointing. However, it also needs to be pointed out that never in the history of the club has a first grade side from one year to the next lost the services of six regular, experienced first grade players.

The relatively 'new-look' side was a young, extremely talented but nevertheless, inexperienced unit. Our lack of experience resulted in our playing inconsistent cricket. That is to say, at times we played 'unbeatable' cricket. Yet, on other occasions we played 'average' (and less than average) cricket, particularly when the pressure was applied, such as chasing small targets.

The long-term results of a youthful, talented side are that within the next couple of seasons, providing we maintain much the same side, we will have gained the necessary experience to play the consistent cricket we are capable of playing. In addition, next season particularly should see the return of a couple of 'old heads' whose stability, variation and experience we so dearly missed this past season.

Individually, there were only a few players who performed to their ability. Ashley Weston, Craig Henderson and Peter Shea had quite good seasons with the bat, while Glen Croker's ton was a gem. Our attack lacked variation this year, but still managed to dismiss oppositions relatively cheaply. Peter Shea's overall performance was very good and when he 'irons out' certain little inconsistencies he will become a devastating strike bowler. Darryl McDonald, Mick Le Riche and Mick Brady also chipped in with some useful contributions.

Our fielding this year was exemplary. I have no doubt this was a strong factor in our Twilight success. It was fitting that one of our members was awarded with the ACT Fieldsman of the Year and I congratulate Ashley for his performance. I believe the keeper sets such a standard and Hendo's glove-work was faultless.

Two individual performances require special recognition here. Mick Le

Riche proved he is a more than useful first grade bowler and his climb from seconds and thirds was deserving of his Most Improved Award. While I believe Glen Croker is still capable of producing more, I congratulate his efforts in winning the Club Champion Award. He secured the award from mainly first grade performances and everyone, including Glen himself, must now recognise him as a truly dominant <u>first</u> grade player.

As newcomers to the club, both Stuart Jones and myself would be the first to admit that our performances with the bat were less than satisfactory. The club has yet to see the best that we can produce, and I'm sure that next year we will more than 'pay our way'.

I look forward to next season.

SECOND GRADE REPORT

Wests second grade finished 6th on the 2-day competition ladder. I believe this is a fair result, but, considering some of our circumstances, this performance is better than it looks. We were a good chance for the final four with only two matches to go, (second on the ladder) but failed to capitalise on the opportunities that did come our way.

One of the team's attitudes that stood out this year was the fair but aggressive way we approached all games. We continued to try for victory even when the odds were stacked against us. On a couple of occasions this positive approach was the difference between winning and losing.

Our batting throughout the season was consistent. We had five or six regulars in the team who scored over 200 runs and averaged around the twenties. Steve Taylor, Warren Blackshaw and Greg Gill all displayed their own successful batting styles with all three playing valuable innings when the team needed it. Daryl MacDonald and Glen Croker, who captained the team for three matches, performed exceptionally well with both the bat and the ball and continued this good form through to first grade. Rod Ellis batted creditably throughout the season and shows a lot of promise and should have a big future with the club. Other batsmen who made the most of limited opportunities were Glenn O'Sullivan, Andrew Heath and Andrew Wilson.

Wests bowling was made up of four or five medium pacers and two spinners. Rod Blackshaw bowled well all year and demonstrated what could be achieved on pitches with nothing in it for the quicks, by perserverance and accuracy. Mick Le Riche played only a few games in seconds and has improved out of sight, due to hard work, throughout the year. Geoff McKinnon, Jamie Clout, Johnny Graham and Matt Hudson all contributed to the bowling attack and all could be top grade bowlers next season. Shane Bellchambers bowled intelligently, attacking when possible and tying up an end when called on. He is a solid batsman and one of the clubs top all-rounders. Steve Broadbent's leg-spinners were a welcome change. Steve has a good temperament and will be a bowler of the future. Leg-spinners need a lot of support in the field and this is where our youth worked to our advantage with outstanding fielding in most matches. Our ground fielding and chasing were excellent and Marcus Cosgrave was a fine example of this.

Being such a young side, and for that matter club, means the way is open to many more players to play a higher standard of cricket. We must take advantage of the extra enthusiasm and fitness that youth gives us. Wests is in the process of rebuilding and I believe that our performance this season gives a solid foundation to future success in the seasons to come.

THIRD GRADE REPORT

Premiers 1984/85! Wooden spooners 1985/86! Explanation please!

What else can you expect when you use 41 players during the season in 13 matches; there were 4 captains in eight 2-day matches. At the start of the season Geoff Gelding was appointed captain for the 2-day competition; the first match was washed out; he captained the side in the second match - and that was his last game in the 2-day competition!!

The lack of commitment by the players generally was appalling and was reflected in the results. The frequent changes of teams on Friday nights was a constant worry; there were so many changes one Friday that in all the confusion we finished up with only ten players that match!! The third grade side was never near full strength; if it had been it could have finished near the top. Teams were chosen more on the basis of availability than performances. Players from 3rd grade who failed sometimes moved up to 2nd grade to fill in! Bill Simotas who would have benefitted from a full season in fourth grade kept getting picked for thirds; for him it was a wasted year; there were others in the same category.

In what was a most forgettable season there were, however, a few encouraging points. Andrew Dawson in his only match made an immediate impact; on a soft pitch he scored a delightful 54 in our win against the premiers Northern Suburbs and left no doubt that, free of college commitments, he will be a 1st grader with this club. Andrew Wilson produced the consistency which previously had eluded him. Whereas in 1984/85 he ceded his innings on most occasions there was more application this season and the results were apparent. Without producing sensational figures, Rohan Pyne showed that one might expect a 300 plus run season from him in the future. Matt Hudson came of age as an opening bowler. His line and length were considerably improved - and also his attitude. He still needs, however, to apply far more thought to his cricket, both in preparation for, and during a match. In his few appearances, Steve Broadbent suggested that he is a spinner of the future and clearly there is an alarming shortage of spinners within this club; he must be encouraged.

Whereas in previous seasons I have suggested that part of the success of the team was related to the performances of Glenn O'Sullivan he must now bear

some blame for the side's lack of success. On three or four occasions he opened the batting and proceeded with no purpose at all placing an unreasonable burden on batsmen who followed. In the one 50 over match he scored 11 off the first 23 overs - the match being virtually lost at that stage. In a 2-day fixture he batted beyond tea for 24 runs! With Glenn batting, the bowling was always allowed to stay on top. He has the winter to rethink his whole approach. Matt Hudson aside, the team lacked a genuine third grade pace bowler. Tony Cowan gave glimpses of ability but a dozen no-balls each match speaks for itself. Jamie Clout and Geoff McKinnon, both very wayward, failed to add any thrust to the attack upon their demotion.

David Cook is still very much a learning wicket keeper and he continues to improve. The Club should look to providing its young wicket keepers with special coaching sessions. With such assistance and with another season under his belt, David could press claims for higher grades. Of the younger brigade Glen Eveston showed glimpses of potential while Bill Simotas, as mentioned, had one of those seasons he would prefer to forget.

The season had little about which to enthuse. It seems imperative, in view of the turnover of players, that in future provisional selectors establish the commitment of players in choosing sides.

If I can make a parting plea it is that this Club give particular thought to how it might approach the one day competition - so far the club has failed to come to terms with it. In three seasons it has only once had a team in the final in any grade. It is a distinct competition; one or two former players might be approached to bolster the lower grade sides; some of those experienced players might even captain these sides.

Rather than end on a despairing note there are three matters worthy of praise. The Club should be delighted with and appreciative of with the efforts of Peter and David Cook in their preparation of the pitch at Aranda Oval - it is quite outstanding and reflects great credit on the amount of work put into the pitch preparation. Thank you Peter and David.

Special thanks go to Michael Brady who undertook the thankless task of Chairman of Selectors with great drive and zest; faced with constant withdrawals which would have caused most to resign, he kept going. Thank you

Michael.

Finally I firmly believe there is more ability in the current young players than has been evident in any of my twelve seasons with the club. That ability needs leadership and guidance both on the field and at practice. I exhort the Management Committee to see how this outstanding potential can be developed.

FOURTH GRADE REPORT

Unfortunately the 1985/86 cricket season has come to an end. Considering the record of 4th grade this year it would not have been surprising to have wished an early end to the season rather than for an extension to it. However, if we had played a few more games we may have finally got it all right. At differing times of the season we were let down badly by our fielding, batting and bowling. No one in particular contributed to this lack of form. It was really a team effort. Once the rot started in a particular match it spread like an infection through the rest of the players.

Despite our lack of success, I think it was a rather enjoyable season. It was not that we did not care about losing, because we did (in fact we did the best we could to win each and every game), but rather that we did not get disconsolate when it became evident that we were not going to win. It is one thing to want to win but it is another to realise that it is not always possible given a particular set of circumstances.

I think it fair to say that it was not a particularly successful season from an overall Club point of view. Credit must be given to our 5th grade and sub-district sides which made the semi-finals. However, it is a reflection on the lack of depth in the Club that none of the higher grades were able to do likewise. This was a major reason for our lack of success this year. At no stage of the season were players in the position of having to perform to hold their places in a particular grade (there are, of course, exceptions to every rule and Rob Walker can be excused for feeling a little disappointed at having been dropped to 5ths after performing extremely well in his 4th grade debut towards the end of the season. To his credit he applied himself well to the task of helping 5ths into the semis and undoubtedly we will see more from him next year). In fact players were promoted to higher grades for moderate performances. That is not to say that those who were promoted did not deserve it, but that perhaps they would have had to serve more of an apprenticeship in the lower grades (which is usually more beneficial to the players development) if the higher grades were stronger..... (But then again maybe all of this is an excuse for bad captaincy?????)

The season was divided into separate 1 day and 2 day competitions (as it was last year). In relation to the 1 dayers, we finished with one win from the

five games we played. This bland statistic does not reflect the true situation. In all of our losing games we struggled to snatch defeat from the jaws of victory (not an original quote but an apt one), but we managed. The first of these games saw us fall 4 runs short of our target of 176. The target of 107 apparently has some "devils number' qualities for us. Twice in this competition we bowled sides out for 106 but failed in the chase. We failed by 16 at our first attempt and, instead of improving as should be expected, we fell 34 runs short second time around. The other of these games saw us post a "winning?" score of 223 for the loss of 4 wickets (and one of these was on the last ball of our 50 overs). Unfortunately, this was not enough runs for medium-pace bowlers who insisted on trying to bowl bouncers.

We were 5th on the 2 day ladder going into the final round with a chance of participating in the finals with a big win. As it was, we failed even to gain 1st innings points (we were chasing another huge target...144) and finished 8th in our grade. Our win/loss record for this competition was 3/5 (we salvaged a draw in the 1st game due to the timely intervention of the elements). Two of these wins were outright as was one of the losses (we don't do things by halves). It should be noted that our outright wins were achieved at the expense of the bottom two sides, but then the other teams had similar opportunities.

Our assault on the 4th grade premiership started in rather lacklustre fashion. As mentioned previously, the 1st match was washed out. However, this was not before we had managed to score 85 runs in 50 overs of a game reduced to a 1 day slog. Our scoring rate certainly did not reflect the common approach to this type of game.

For the next couple of games we had great difficulty in holding onto our catches. Some 4 or 5 (maybe more) catches were put down early in each game. Invariably we were made to pay for our mistakes. It was not until Jeff Clark's return to 4ths that we were able to catch more than we dropped. Jeff has a very good pair of hands and is an asset to any side even when his batting is a little inconsistent. (He also bowled a very tight 10 over spell in one of our 1 dayers). Even though Jeff did tighten up this aspect of our game to some extent, we did suffer relapses from time to time.

Another of our failings was consistency when batting. Over the season we scored 2,125 runs for the loss of 128 wickets. This represents an average of

16.60 runs per wicket lost. Scores of 6/85, 99, 123 & 131, 8/95, 6/151, 180, 182 and 0/19, 6/226 and 113 in the 2 day competition and 172, 8/162, 91, 4/223 and 73 in the 1 day competition do not reflect the performances of a team with semi-final aspirations.

One batsman to belie the general trend was Peter Cook. Peter managed to fit in 7 games with us when he was not on higher duties and scored 189 runs at a respectable average of 31.50. The consistency shown by Peter is indicated by the fact that this average was achieved with a top score of only 38. Despite his apparent inability to go on to a big score, Peter always made a valuable contribution with the bat. Another batsman to perform creditably (except for his 1st and last games) after a very slow start was Dave Burge. Unfortunately for Dave his 1st game in 4ths for the season was forgettable. This was not due to his failure with the bat but because he was relegated to 12th man on his late arrival at the ground. His 2nd game was not that much better as he only scored 2 runs batting at No. 9. Dave recovered from these setbacks to become one of our regular openers and to finish the season with 189 runs at 47.25, including an unbeaten century.

Rory Goodsell, as well as being our wicketkeeper, was our regular opener throughout the season. His record of 254 runs at an average of 21.17 was a good effort from an opener. Rory did have a habit, however, of hanging his bat just outside off stump and this brought about his dismissal on numerous occasions. He will score many more runs in future years when he corrects this. Rory's efforts behind the stumps are also deserving of mention. During the season he took 19 catches and effected 1 stumping (the latter being a reflection of lack of opportunity rather than any deficiency standing up) and let through very few byes in a good display behind the stumps.

Mention should also be made of Chris Clapp who, after scores of 1 and 5, scored consecutive 50's before he became unavailable. Additionally, few who witnessed them will forget his 2 exceptional catches in the game against A.N.U. Hopefully next year will see Chris with more time for cricket.

Another to have only a limited time with us during the Christmas holiday period was Andrew Dawson. During his stint with us Andrew showed that he has plenty of talent with the bat as well as being an exceptional fieldsman.

Undoubtedly the star performer of our bowling attack was Tony Williams. Tony took 26 wickets at the excellent average of 9.08 in 122.2 overs. It should also be noted that Tony was the leading wicket taker for the Club with 31 wickets in total (the other 5 were taken in 3rd grade). Tony's ability with the ball did not emerge until round 5 when he bowled us to outright victory with match figures of 12/52. Scott Wallace was another to perform well with the ball to finish with 15 wickets off 84.3 overs at an average of 13.80. His figures could have been a lot better had he not suffered so much at the expense of dropped catches. Unfortunately Scott has a habit of bowling short at times and becomes a little expensive (but then most of our bowlers had their moments during the season). Greg Lalor also bowled well on occasions in his limited appearances for us (which is just as well as he failed to score a run in his 4 attempts at batting).

Unfortunately for us Matt Hudson's bowling ability was recognised early in the season and he was promoted before we got to see the best of him.

Without a doubt, the failure of the season was Ajay Mehta who, after being crippled by injury in his 1st match of the season (in 3rds), made a premature comeback in 4ths. Ajay was confident that he could perform well after his forced layoff. However, his score of 0 was enough to convince him to take the rest of the season off.

Stephen McLennan obviously has ability with the bat, but his enthusiasm needs a bit of a boost. - . not only rarely having change rooms but no toilet facilities either
- . the lack of organised club training
- . not having a "home" game
- . the lack of competition provided by 4th Grade in our twilight match.

I hope in the next season the positive aspects of the club continue to flourish and that the negatives are addressed by the Management Committee. Thank you to those who participated in or assisted in any way with making the season such a thoroughly enjoyable one and I wish every club member the best towards a successful season 1986/87.

Yet there was a plethora of 4 wicket hauls; Andrew Black 4/13, Leo Wyche 4/11, Shane Baird 4/12, Greg Weller 4/12, Bill Wallace 4/13, Paul Neeson 4/25. The last was Shane Matthews who took 4/24, 2 in his 11th over of a match. Many of the other bowlers had good games but failed to capture any large number of wickets.

However, the real strength of the team was its batting, best shown in the final that even after being 3 for not many both days we still managed to compile winning scores. Much thanks should be given to the opening pair for the last five games Andrew Black and Richard Wyche who generally got us off to a good start on which we were able to build good scores. Andrew scored some 367 runs during the season followed by Bill Wallace with 270.

Even though some players featured prominently in batting and bowling the real heart of any team are those who always try, turn up each week regardless of whether they get a bat or bowl, players like Robert Lamb who kept trying even when the team is in trouble. Many thanks.

For myself I enjoyed my season as captain. I made my share of mistakes and learned a lot as well, about a different side of the game I had not truly experienced before. I know some people may not have liked some of my decisions but they were all made for the good of the team, with the intention of winning the game in question. I hope the thrill of winning the competition makes it all worthwhile.

I hope most of us can get back together next season and hopefully do the same thing.
